Luke 16:1-13

Then Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, "What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, "What will I do, now that

my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, "How much do you owe my master?' He answered, "A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, "Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, "And how much do you owe?' He replied, "A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, "Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

"Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

This is the Word of God, for us, the People of God. Thanks be to God.

Monday, September 22 — Luke 16:1-15

The Parable of the Dishonest Manager makes a stealthy shift from the lesser to the greater. We *think* it is about money, but in Luke's Gospel, Jesus makes clear that blessed are those who love God, and who understand that relationships between people are more valuable than accumulated wealth. Just so, those who are not faithful in handling the things of the world, says Jesus, are unlikely to be faithful in tending to what God actually holds dear.

- Reggae legend Bob Marley once said that "some people are so poor, all they have is [their] money." Does his aphorism accord with this parable? If so, how?
- Prayer: Lord Jesus, I want to be faithful in matters small and large. But I also know the pull of expediency, impatience and sometimes anxiety.
 Today, steel my resolve to bring glory to you in all my little ways and dealings. Amen.

Tuesday, September 23 — Matthew 24:42-51

Matthew does not have a version of Luke's Parable of the Dishonest Manager. Instead, he recounts in Jesus' farewell discourse a parable of a rather nasty one (!), to impart the urgency of remaining prepared for Jesus' return.

- When Matthew wrote his Gospel (in about the year 85), nearly all Christians expected Jesus' return to be imminent. In the centuries of waiting since, how do Christians use the time well and prepare for his coming again in glory? In what ways do you do so?
- Prayer: Come, Lord Jesus, come! We say that in Advent. But I wonder what about my life, my values and decisions would I wish were different if I knew you were coming today?

Wednesday, September 24 — John 13:1-17, 34

The Gospel of John puts special emphasis on Jesus' farewell to his disciples. In this reading, the intimacy and urgency of embodying the love of the Servant comes to the fore. Indeed, Jesus says that the world will know Christians by the distinctive and otherworldly way that we love one another!

- Today, is the impression that outsiders have of life in the church one of otherworldly love? What makes it hard for us to love in a self-giving, unselfconscious way?
- Prayer: Some of my most indelible memories are of being loved, and loving others, in a gentle and whole-hearted way, Lord. Lead me in making more such memories in my life to come. Amen.

Thursday, September 25 — 2 Corinthians 9:6-11

Paul calls upon the Corinthians Christians to be generous in support of the Church in Jerusalem, and its sending out of missionaries. In v. 8, he says that by God's grace to us, we may always find that we have "a sufficiency in everything," so that we too can participate in God's generosity on earth.

- In what season of life did you feel you had a 'sufficiency' in all things?
 When did it seem you did not? Was the difference in the amount you had or something else?
- Prayer: Lord, I don't always want to find myself wanting more. Unless it is
 of You. Amen.

Friday, September 26 — John 6:1-14

According to <u>John</u>, Philip once reckoned the daunting cost of feeding a large crowd. Then, a small surprise: a child offered a handful of loaves and two fish – a pitifully small offering. And in Jesus' hands, something remarkable happened to that gift.

- What may have motivated the boy who gave over his food that day? How might we as Jesus' followers receive and respond to such an example today?
- Prayer: Lord Jesus, I would imagine that such little gifts, like those of this
 boy and the elderly widow with her copper coins, delighted you when you
 struggled to find inspiring faithfulness around you. How can I manage
 what is in my little mission field, and bring to you that same pleasure?
 Amen

Saturday, September 27 — Proverbs 22:7-9

In this brief cadence of proverbial wisdom, we both see the world the way it is and hear a cautionary word about the ultimate outcome of perpetrating injustice. Then comes a peculiar commendation about having "a bountiful eye," and what that makes possible.

- How do you think those with "a bountiful eye" experience life? How does it manifest in their lives before others?
- Prayer: It's a new turn of phrase, Lord, this "bountiful eye." I wonder how
 the world looks to those who have it, and likewise how your Kingdom
 coming among us would seem. If I pray for a bountiful eye today, and
 each day, would you grant me such vision? And if you did, would my
 stewardship of your grace and provision for me be different? Again, I
 wonder. Amen.
