Scripture Luke 14:25-33 Hough

Now large crowds were traveling with him, and he turned and said to them, "Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, saying, 'This fellow began to build and was not able to finish.' Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? If he cannot, then while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions.

Grow — Pray — Study

Things I'd like to remember from today's message:	
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Monday, September 5 — Luke 4:16-22, Luke 5:27-32

During his earthly ministry, Jesus said many things that challenged the conventional wisdom of his day and upset many people. Sometimes we struggle to understand the meaning of Jesus' words for our lives. If we're honest, we wonder if he really meant some of the things he said. Was he exaggerating to make a point or trying to shock his hearers into doing something differently? Or, was reaching out to people on the margins of society really his primary purpose?

- How do you feel when you read Jesus' challenging statements?
 How do you interpret their meaning for your life? Do you believe that Jesus speaks for God? How does that affect the way you understand his words.
- Prayer: Eternal God, thank you for sending Jesus to teach me your ways and to help me understand how you want me to live my life. Give me the faith I need to trust him. Amen.

Tuesday, September 6 — Luke 6:20-36

Conventional wisdom in both Jesus' time and in ours says that health and wealth are signs of God's favor and blessing. So when Jesus says that, in God's Kingdom, the first shall be last and the last shall be first (see Luke 13:30) and that we should love our enemies, he confronts our understanding of what's right and true. In other words, he redefines what it means to be successful. The question is: will we accept Jesus' definition of success or will we stick with ours?

- How do you define success? By what criteria do you evaluate your life? How do you know when you are doing well? In what ways might your definition of success differ from the one Jesus embodies in the Gospels?
- Prayer: Gracious God, forgive me for failing to live up to your expectations for my life. Help me to believe that Jesus is the ultimate example of a successful life. Amen.

Wednesday, September 7 — Luke 9:18-27

The death and resurrection of Jesus is the lens through which we view the ministry and teaching of Jesus. It is no accident that Peter's announcement that Jesus is the Messiah is followed by Jesus' announcement about his death and resurrection. Jesus insists that if we trust that he is the Messiah, we must be willing to leave everything behind and follow him (see Luke 5:11, 5:28, 18:28). Being a disciple of Jesus comes with a cost – but it is worth it.

- How far would you go to follow Jesus? Would you leave everything behind? Would you give up the good life you enjoy today to serve God?
- Prayer: God of Love, Jesus' words are often hard to hear and hard to understand. Help me to know what they mean for my life and give me the courage I need to act on them. Amen.

Thursday, September 8 — Luke 12:49-53

We usually think of Jesus as being kind and compassionate. At Christmas we call him the Prince of Peace. But in Luke 12, he says that he has come to bring division. These are striking words and in order to understand them better, we need to examine the context of his teaching, which is the necessity to be prepared for God's judgment. In other words, he is saying that we need to make a decision about whether we will trust God and follow Jesus, with the knowledge that our decision will have consequences in all aspects of our lives, including our relationships.

- Jesus asks us to make some potentially difficult decisions. By what criteria do you make big decisions in your life? How much of your life are you willing to give up so that you can follow Jesus to the end?
- Prayer: God of Compassion, thank you for the promise of salvation and life with you always. Let your Kingdom come and your will be done in my life today. Amen.

Friday, September 9 — Luke 14:25-33

Jesus' words hit very close to home when he suggests that what we hold most precious can be – and often are – impediments to faithful discipleship. On more than one occasion in the Gospel accounts of his ministry, Jesus challenges us to count the cost of following him. He asks us to let go of everything that holds us back and keeps us from living faithfully and obediently.

- Have you given one hundred percent of your life to Jesus? If not, what are you holding back? What parts of your life are you unwilling to give up?
- Prayer: Merciful God, I am aware that there are parts of my life that I am unwilling to surrender – even to follow Jesus. Forgive my unwillingness to trust you completely. Amen.

Saturday, September 10 — Luke 18:18-30

The story of Jesus' encounter with the rich ruler works on three different levels. First, there is the rich man who wanted Jesus to affirm his "goodness." Then there are the disciples who wonder, "Then, who can be saved?" Finally, the story challenges our understanding of what is right and true. Like Jesus' first disciples, we have a hard time believing that Jesus would ask anyone – especially us – to "sell all that you own and distribute the money to the poor" (Luke 18:22) to follow him.

- The question we need to answer for ourselves is this: what is Jesus asking of me?
- Prayer: Almighty God, open my eyes to see and my ears to hear your truth for my life. Show me what you require of me and grant me enough faith to obey. Amen.
