EMBRACING AWKWARDNESS

As a youth minister, I deal with a lot of awkwardness. The definition of awkward is “causing difficulty, hard to deal with” or “causing or feeling embarrassment or inconvenience.” Many youth have a constant sense of feeling awkward about themselves, about how they interact with each other...everything always feels uncomfortable and cringey during their transition and growth into adulthood. We like to think of Jesus as this perfect, divine, super-saintly person from birth to adulthood, but we don’t usually imagine Jesus dealing with the awkwardness and discomfort of adolescence.

In Luke 2:41-52, the only story in the Bible about Jesus as a young person, his parents can’t find him in the caravan on the way back from the Passover festival. They double back to Jerusalem and find him teaching the priests and elders in the temple and as his exasperated mother and father approach him he casually says, “Didn’t you know I’d be in my father’s house?” I know most parents can understand the awkward and uncomfortable silence between parent and child that likely lasted for the days-long journey on foot back to Nazareth between Mary and Jesus.

The apostles experienced awkwardness too. In the Gospel of Luke, the women came to the tomb to anoint the body, and they expect to see a closed tomb. Instead, they find the tomb’s stone rolled away, the tomb empty, and two men in dazzling clothes saying “Why do you look for the dead among the living? He is not here but has risen.” The women then go tell the apostles what they’ve seen. The apostles don’t believe them. The same apostles who dropped their fishing nets to follow Jesus around Galilee for three years, listened to Jesus’ teachings and saw him perform miracles STILL did not believe that what Jesus LITERALLY told them would happen actually happened. Peter even had to go and see it for himself. Imagine having to tell Jesus that when you were told of his resurrection that you did not believe it. AWKWARD!

Awkward moments and discomfort are a big part of growth and change. Rabbi Dr. Abraham Twerski in his youtube video* discusses how lobsters grow, since they are mushy animals that live inside rigid shells. As they grow they begin to feel uncomfortable, constricted and stressed, so they go under a rock, shed their shell and grow a new one. Then that shell gets too tight, the lobster feels stressed again, so it goes back under the rock and repeats the process. The stimulus for the growth is stress and discomfort! So, this Easter season I challenge you to embrace the awkwardness and lean into it because when we work through the discomfort and adversity of life, there’s growth on the other side. Amen.

In the fading light of dusk, twenty-six souls, representing fourteen different countries in the Anglican Communion, held candles at the altar of a darkened Canterbury Cathedral and recited the Lord's Prayer. Tribal languages from various African countries blended seamlessly with French, Korean, English, and Hindi. Voices merged together rhythmically, echoing throughout the hollowed spaces of the cathedral, filling the emptiness with unified prayer, and illuminating the darkness.

Such a moment captures my experience in summer 2012 as a Canterbury Scholar. The program, hosted by former Archbishop Rowan Williams, focused on ordination and how the call, regardless of one's culture or nationality, creates both challenges and opportunities for engaging God's work. A primary aim of the course was seeking out and knowing one another within the Anglican Communion.

One of the presenters, the Rev. Dr. Michael Battle, Director of the Battle Peace Institute, and presenter here at Ascension back in March, quoted the Roman Catholic Cardinal Leo Joseph Suenens' observation: "In order to unite, we must first love one another. In order to love one another, we must know one another." Dr. Battle added, "But before we can know one another, we must seek one another."

The engaging classroom discussions about our understanding of ordination carried over into hiking excursions across the English countryside, afternoon tea in the terrace gardens, and evenings in the pub. As the three-week seminar progressed, cultural chasms transformed into bonds of affection that endured long after the program ended.

Several months later, one of the participants from South Africa tragically died. The group connected over Facebook, expressed their grief, and organized a memorial service in her honor in each person's respective worship space. During a designated time, we offered prayers derived from a common liturgy honoring the life of our friend. Such an experience revealed to me the Anglican vision—a vision that seeks unity through common worship aimed at upholding one another despite differences of culture and language. I became enamored by this vision so elegantly demonstrated at Canterbury.

Although we live in a divided world, the meeting of radically different cultures through common prayer opens up pathways for genuine friendship that have transformative effects. Such exchanges not only illumine more brilliantly the presence of God, but also give a foretaste of a heavenly life yet to come.

Friends of the Music and the Arts is fortunate to host another first-rate choir on **Tuesday, April 2nd**, when the Choir of New College, Oxford, performs here at **7:30 pm**.

The relatively low \$15 ticket price (for a choir of this caliber) is possible because of a fee that was discounted due to a gap in the choir's touring schedule. The boys will be every bit as well trained as their Viennese counterparts last month, and they will be augmented by thirteen men singing alto, tenor, and bass with them. Together there will be 28 singers and two organists, all under the direction of Robert Quinney.



The submitted program, entitled "Treasures of New College," has a bit of everything: music of the Renaissance (Palestrina's "Sicut Cervus" and Allegri's "Miserere"); music from the Romantic era (Parry's "Hear My Word, Ye People"); modern classics (Howells's "Like As the Hart" and Walton's "Jubilate Deo"); and contemporary works (Matthew Martin's "Ave Maris Stella" and Paul Drayton's Magnificat from the New College Service). British choirs sing where the organ is, and this concert will be performed from the choir loft. It is typical

for British choirs to take a moment of respite during an organ solo on each half, and during those pauses the organists will perform the *Toccata* by Flor Peeters and the *Folktune* and *Scherzo* by Percy Whitlock.

With these March/April concerts, lovers of the choral art have the good fortune to behold in a relatively short period of time a continental approach to sound (Austria) with the British ideal. Both schools of thought cultivate clear, bell-like head tone from choristers, and I'd be curious to hear audience members' thoughts about any potential differences. Picayunish comparison would be odious, as both of these groups are the sonic equivalent of caviar.

Being president of the optimists' club (figuratively speaking), I continue to hope that there might be available hospitality for an overnight stay for the young choristers from St. Peter's in Charlotte who sing here on June 14th. Do call me if you need particulars about that potential opportunity. Meantime, I thank caterer Julie Teglas and the hosting families in the parish who are showing trademarked Ascension hospitality to the altos, tenors, and basses of the New College Choir during their stay here in Knoxville.
