Parking

W&M parking pass is not required to park on campus Friday through Sunday of Family Weekend. You may park in any regular Faculty/Staff, Day Student, or Resident Student space on campus, unless otherwise indicated. Handicapped spaces are available throughout campus for those with an official state-issued handicapped license plate or hangtag.

NO PARKING is allowed in fire lanes, No Parking zones, "Official Vehicle" spaces, "Service Vehicle" spaces, "Reserved At All Times" spaces, other specially reserved spaces, handicapped spaces (without appropriate documentation.) Parking meters are enforced at all times, unless the meter specifies otherwise.

Special Parking Advisory: Saturday Afternoon

Due to the football game on Saturday, several parking areas will be closed starting at 7:00 am through the end of the game.

Vehicles parked in these areas during restricted hours will be ticketed and/or towed: Zable Stadium/Bryan lot, Sadler Center lot, Old Dominion lot, Yates lot, James Blair lot, spaces on James Blair Drive, Kaplan Arena lot*, rear Frat lots, spaces near Alumni House, spaces on Harrison Avenue, Laycock Center, designated spaces on College Terrace and Dawson Circle.

Handicapped Accessible Parking

Handicapped parking spaces are available at parking lots throughout campus. A state-issued license plate or hangtag is required to park in these spaces.

Several campus parking areas must be cleared by 7:00 am Saturday in preparation for the football game. For guests attending the football game, a limited number of handicapped parking spaces are available at the Zable Stadium lot for \$10. These spaces will be filled on a first come first served basis. Additional parking for the game is available at the Kaplan Arena lot for \$10. A golf cart shuttle will transport guests with limited mobility from the bus shelter in the Kaplan Arena lot to the football stadium starting 90 minutes before kick-off. The shuttle will make return trips to the Kaplan Arena lot for up to 30 minutes after the game ends.

* *Parking attendants will be on-duty at Kaplan Arena lot starting at 7:00 am on Saturday, 10/05. Visitors may park in the Kaplan Arena lot for a fee of \$10 (first come, first served).*

Football Tickets

Tickets purchased at least 10 days prior to game day can be mailed to you for a convenience fee of \$5. Tickets can also be picked up at the main box office during normal business hours at Kaplan Arena. Game day Will Call for football is the Gate 1 ticket booth, located on the west side of the stadium. Game day Will Call for football will open 3 hours prior to kickoff. Questions about football tickets should be directed to the Tribe Ticket Box Office (757-221-3340). Football tickets are not available at the Family Weekend check-in site.

Open Classes (Friday only)

You are welcome to attend any open class on the list, even if your student is not in the class. Please do not attend a class that is not on the list. The classes listed are those designated by faculty to receive visitors. Remember to observe appropriate classroom etiquette—turn off cell phones and refrain from having private conversations during class. In the event a class is full, allow students registered in the course available seats.

Weather Related Most outdoor activities are moved indoors if the weather is bad. Rain sites are listed next to each event in the schedule, as appropriate via the email and mobile number provided in your registration. Weather related updates will be communicated via the email and cell phone number listed on the registration form.

Football Tickets Football tickets are handled by the W&M Athletics department. Questions about football tickets should be directed to the Tribe Ticket Box Office (757-221-3340). **We do not have football tickets available for purchase or pick-up at the Family Weekend check-in site.**

Praise the Sun: The Quest for Solar Energy

Dr. William R. McNamara, Associate Professor of Chemistry

Integrated Science Center, Room 1127

With rising global energy demands and the widespread consumption of non-renewable resources, it is critical to find ways to power the planet using renewable energy. Wind, hydroelectricity, geothermal, biofuel, tidal, and wave energy are all promising methods to harness renewable energy. Unfortunately, the widespread application of these energy sources is often limited by geography. Luckily, a massive nuclear reactor in the sky has been powering the planet long before modern civilization. Solar energy can be converted into thermal, electrical, and even chemical energy (fuels). We discuss the advantages and disadvantages of solar energy while highlighting current innovations on our quest for renewable energy.

Game of Cancer: The Search for Novel Strategies to Defeat the Disease

Dr. Doug Young, Associate Professor of Chemistry

Integrated Science Center, Room 1221

Cancer is a highly pervasive disease, having dramatic global impacts on our society. In 2018 over 1.7 million new cases of cancer were diagnosed in the United States and over 600,000 deaths can be attributed to this disease. However, through understanding the biological underpinnings of the disease, new mechanisms for treatment can be discovered. This talk explores how cancer cells develop, and how obtaining a better understanding of these mechanisms can lead to improved treatments. This includes current research occurring at W&M involving the development of new chemistries to develop drugs that specifically target only cancer cells, preventing the unfortunate side effects of traditional therapeutics.

Speech Sound Mysteries: What Hidden Information Listeners Subconsciously Hear in Vowels

Anya Lunden, Associate Professor, Linguistics Program Director; Dept. of English

Because we say vowels in a stream of connected speech, rather than individually, they are affected by their surrounding sounds. For example, try saying "the beet" and "the gauze." It sounds like the vowel in the word 'the' is the same in both phrases. However, we can acoustically measure real differences in how the 'uh' in 'the' is pronounced depending on whether the following consonant is a 'b' or a 'g' and further variations depending on whether the vowel following that consonant is an 'ee' or an 'ah' because our mouth is already anticipating making those further sounds. We'll look at the results of eye-tracking studies that show listeners can actually use the hidden cues in vowels to subconsciously anticipate what's coming next. We'll also look at a case of an ambiguous speech sound—is the word 'patio' pronounced 'pat-ee-o' or 'pat-ee-yo'? If you ask someone else to pronounce both versions, can you tell them apart? Why does it seem like the 'y' is there regardless and how can we tell if there's a real 'y' in such a word? In this talk I will discuss several different aspects of acoustic and perceptual investigations of vowels articulations.

Remaking the Federal Judiciary

Christine Nemacheck Associate Professor and Director, Center for the Liberal Arts

One of the greatest successes of the Trump Administration to date has been the president's appointments to the federal courts. Although President Trump often remarks on his two appointments to the U.S. Supreme Court, his influence on the federal judiciary is far more profound than those two appointments alone suggest. In this lecture, I discuss the Trump appointments, changes in the appointment process, and implications for the federal judiciary.
