





Guru Gobind Singh Birthday



Epiphany


January 6


January 7

Makar Sankranti(Hindu)



New Year's Day for Trees, and traditionally the first of the year for tithing fruit of trees. Now a day for environmental awareness and action, such as tree planting.


Mahayana New year(Buddhist)

International Holocaust Remembrance Day January 27




February 25-March 1




Holi is the Hindu festival of colors. It marks the beginning of spring and all that spring symbolizes.

Genocide Awareness month


April

Ramadan


April 3 – May 3

Day of Silence


April 8

Palm Sunday


April 10

Rama Navami


April 10

VAISAKHI


April 14

Holy Thursday


April 14

Good Friday


April 15

Pesach/Passover


April 16 – April 23



Festival of Ridván


April 20 – May 1

Vesak (Buddhist)


May 16




DECLARATION OF THE BÁB • Bahá'í

LGBTQ+ Pride Month Begins





Loving day






DHARMA DAY • Buddhist

ULLAMBANA (also known as Obon) • Buddhist



Hispanic Heritage Month






Filipino American History Month

Shemini Atzeret



Simchat Torah








Diwali is the festival of lights for Hindus and Sikhs, celebrating the triumph of good, light, and knowledge.

Thanksgiving day



Our Lady Of Guadalupe


December 12

Hanukkah


December 18 – December 26

Christmas


December 25
