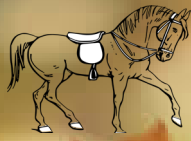

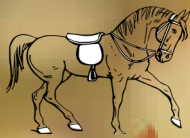

Education Corner

Goldilocks and the Twelve Riders

Goldilocks and the twelve riders sound like it could be an equestrian-themed fairytale. Well, if you have been fortunate enough to ride with or audit a Daniel Stewart clinic then some of your dreams may be coming true. Daniel has a way of creating enthusiasm and telling a story to provoke focus and learning and to inspire the desire to “make the rest of the ride the best of the ride”.

Harts Run Hunt and Rolling Rock Pony Club hosted the animated clinician at Double Springs Farm for a “Pressure Proofing” clinic over fences. Daniel began the clinic addressing all of the riders and auditors with his goals and expectations of the clinic. He explained how pressure affects our memory and we are good at panicking. His goal was to help the riders find the “Goldilocks” zone where things are just right but that requires us to leave our comfort zone to get there. Our comfort zone is a beautiful place but nothing grows there.

As Daniel started explaining how riders were to jump the 4 small Xs on a circle he also doled out information about accumulating faults and the associated points. I admit, in my mind I thought he was joking when he said that a chip or long-stride was 1 fault, crossing one’s path was 5 faults, a wrong lead over fences was 5 faults, etc. but figured there was some reason to his approach. Well, he was serious. For those of us who don’t jump and prefer a 20 x 60 sandbox, please keep reading as the overall message does apply to all riders.

Daniel was allowing each rider to learn by making mistakes and watching others all the while a scribe was keeping track of each rider’s accumulated points. Generously he considered it a successful clinic if the rider finished their session with 30 faults or less. I certainly don’t have the ability to deliver his message with the same gusto but my take is that by assigning fault points he was increasing mental pressure on the riders to demonstrate the importance of being mentally focused and prepared for our sport.

Sports psychology, the study of mental factors as they relate to sports, is a niche in which Daniel has found much success. He has been an Olympic coach for the US Equestrian Team and the US Pentathlon team and a well-received author so I decided he was an authority on the subject and I should heed his advice. He addressed a mental lapse in which I often fall. I’ve been pondering his view of being an athlete. I started thinking, “how often in my riding career has a non-equestrian commented that riding is not a sport”? Honestly, a fair amount to which I usually reply something about having a thousand pound teammate, weight-lifting with 40 pounds bags of grain, tossing hay bales rather than a kettle ball, etc. But truth be told, as an Adult Amateur I am constantly trying to find time between work, kids’ activities, volunteering, and housework to make it to the barn. My mouth defends riding as a sport yet I don’t consider myself an athlete. Not only does Daniel emphasize mental strength but also physical strength. Did I mention that there were sit-up involved in his clinic and that was just on day one? I’ve

watched my daughter and another auditor practice the exercises presented on day 2 of the clinic with a smile as they get a short work-out in prior to grooming their horses.

I've seen Facebook posts touting strength-training or yoga geared towards riders. WPDA, recognizing the benefit of cross-training, has hosted some rider fitness clinics. In less chaotic seasons I find myself making it to the YMCA a couple days a week for a class or watching a YouTube yoga series at night to augment my riding. Unfortunately those seasons are short and haven't become an ingrained habit. Riders accumulating too many points found themselves seated on the mounting block doing canter-sit-ups. Picture yourself sitting on the top step of a mounting block with your upper body slightly reclined and your legs bent with your toes up and out like you are riding. The difference is that you bring your legs up to form one portion of the V and your body the other (for those who work-out it reminded me of the crunch-position I see when one is not doing a full sit-up). The position requires balance and core strength as you bring your legs into and away from your body (opening and closing the V) while your arms are bent and in front of you as if holding the reins. My challenge to myself is that each time I pass the mounting block by the entrance to the barn, I will stop and do canter sit-ups. If I can fit in sweeping the aisle and a few extra minutes hand-grazing my horse then I can create a new healthy habit with a few minutes of time.

Augmenting the fact that riding is a sport he had us laughing when he said that "riding is a lot like a sport, only harder". He questioned if we had ever heard a skier yelling at her skis for spooking at a mogul or a tennis player fussing at his chestnut-mare racket for not cooperating.

I have pages of notes in regards to the exercises and the desired results. The gist was we are all good at making mistakes when we are rushing or panicked. He showed riders how they could slow down to evaluate a scenario and he discussed the difference between mental shifting and chunking. Essentially when one learns a new task they have to mentally shift between each portion of the task until it is repeated enough that the brain chunks it all together. For example, when learning to tie shoes, a child has to think about making a loop with the right lace, making a loop with the left lace, crossing the loops, bringing one loop up through the hole, and pulling tight. After enough repetitions the brain chunks those series of movements together into tying shoes and the child no longer has to think about the individual parts. In the jumping portion a rider needs to focus on picking up the correct lead, having the right approach, counting down strides in an authoritative voice, jumping, and checking the lead upon landing. By shifting from each of these steps to the next repetitively it eventually becomes a habit. The rider no longer will have to think to check for a lead, it will become automatic. While learning these skills he reassured riders that they can make mistakes and still be successful and was great at praising riders for accomplishments.

During the exit briefing I had a chance to talk with him about how he organizes a dressage clinic. His answer intrigued me as it involved dressage movements and a stop-watch. Harts Run Hunt Pony Club is planning on bringing Daniel back to the area in 2020 for sessions over-fences and for dressage and my name will be on the sign-up sheet for the dressage portion.

The amount of information he provided during the exit briefing is enough to fill a few more pages. I don't want to spoil the clinic for you so you'll have to register to ride or audit his clinic. I'll leave you with a few memorable quotes from Daniel.

"Never a wrong time to do the right thing"

"What you want in your horse you have to create in yourself"

"Set-backs create come-backs"

"Adversity creates strengths and resilience so struggle well"

"The older we get the more we tend to evaluate ourselves by our mistakes"

"Define yourself by effort made and not the outcome"

"When you can't do everything, do everything you can".

"Always be happy in your happy place."

“Always On My Calendar” – Regional Championships Get Underway on the Road to the 2019 US Dressage Finals Presented By Adequan®

Lexington, KY (September 10, 2019) - He's grumpy. She's always cleaning up after him. They have spats, then make up. But when it's all on the line at the US Dressage Finals presented by Adequan®, the self-described “old married couple” of Kristin Herzing of Harrisburg, Pa. and her Hanoverian gelding Gentleman find a way to put aside their differences and work together to find success. Having traveled to Lexington four times in the last five years, the pair's persistence paid off last November with their most successful Finals to date, earning Reserve Championship honors in both the Grand Prix Adult Amateur division and the Freestyle. And now the pair is headed to the Great American Insurance Group/United States Dressage Federation (USDF) Region 1 Championships to hopefully qualify for yet another trip to Lexington.

Herzing believes that the US Dressage Finals should be on every rider's bucket list. “There is magical quality to the venue, and the US Dressage Finals is our Super Bowl, our

World Series,” she explained. “If you are a serious adult amateur rider who truly wants to get the most out of yourself and your horse, this is the ultimate test. You may win or you may not, but the results are not the true payoff of this adventure. The payoff is finding something in you, and your horse, that you would have never imagined was there: the drive, the spirit, and the confidence to compete against the best riders from all over the country.” ***Read more about Herzing and Gentleman as well as other competitors from across the country in USDF’s new series titled “Why I Love the Finals”, featured exclusively on <https://yourdressage.org/>.***

Many other riders share Herzing’s enthusiasm, reflected in what has been described as a “trickledown effect” from the Finals to the Regional Championships and other licensed dressage competitions. In 2018, Regional Championships saw as much as a 23% increase in entries from the prior year, and that growth trend seems to be on track once again for this year’s events. With entries now closed for the first five of the 2019 Regional Championships (2, 5, 6, 7, and 8), four of those competitions show an increase in entry numbers, with three of those regions (5, 7 and 8) reporting an impressive double-digit rise in Regional Championship participation.

Anticipation will only continue to build as all nine Regional Championships are scheduled across the country over the next five weeks, kicking off with Region 2 on September 11-15 in Michigan. The following week from September 19-22 will be a whirlwind of intense competition as Regions 5, 6, 7 and 8 all occur at the same time, followed by Region 4 on September 26-29. The 2019 Regional Championship season then wraps up with Regions 1 and 9 on October 3-6, and finally Region 3 on October 11-13 in Georgia. Now with more than \$240,000 to be awarded at the Regional Championships, prize money will be divided evenly among the nine regions and 35 divisions that are offered at each, allowing every region to present competitors with over \$27,500 in prize money and awards.

Despite some “bumps in the road” and minor surgery for Gentleman over the summer, Herzing still plans to head to North Carolina for the upcoming Region 1 Championships. “We haven’t missed the Regional Championships in nine years and since we are already qualified again this year, we do plan to go to Regionals and hopefully be back in Kentucky,” Herzing explained. “My horse and I have conquered many obstacles in our long time together and I’m not counting him out. Regionals and the Finals will always be on my calendar!”

The Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional Dressage Championships are about to get underway – don’t miss your chance to qualify for the US Dressage Finals!

As a reminder for all competitors, a horse/rider combination must declare their intention to participate in the US Dressage Finals by completing the Declaration of Intent form by midnight on the day prior to the first day of their Regional Championship competition (including any open class day before the start of championship classes). There is no fee to declare, but horse/rider combinations must declare at the level(s) and eligible division(s) they intend to compete in at the US Dressage Finals. Submit your declaration today at www.usdressagefinals.com, and then remember to submit your nomination (the next step of the qualifying process) immediately following your Regional Championship show!

Entries

All horses/ponies entered must show proof of negative Coggins test dated within 12 months, proof of Flu/Rhino within 6 months, and proof of Rabies within 12 months. Out of state travelers must provide a Health Certificate dated within 30 days of travel before the entry will be accepted. Likewise, all non-showing horses brought to the show facility must show the same health documents to the show secretary before unloading. No numbers will be released until payment, proper credentials and all signatures are in order.

\$20.00 Non-showing horse
\$8.00 Per bag for shavings
\$10.00 non-WPDA member fee
\$20.00 late fee for entries received after September 23

Stabling

Permanent 10 X 10 stalls are available. Shavings will be available for purchase at \$8.00/bag and requests should be included on your entry form. Stabling is limited and must be reserved in advance. Overnight stalls have priority over day stalls. **Stall reservations will not be confirmed until full payment is received.** Stall fees are not refundable. Stalls will be available on Friday, after 2 p.m. for overnight stall requests. A special area will be designated for day shippers. A day shipper fee of \$20 will be charged to all entries showing off their trailer.

Parking

Please be advised that all parking is on grass. Trucks, trailers, and cars must park in designated parking areas in the grass field. Please follow signs and directions of the parking staff. Wet ground conditions may prohibit or limit parking. A special area will be designated for those showing off their trailer. A special area is provided for those using living quarter trailers overnight. Electricity is available, if needed, for a \$35.00 fee.

Management

The horse show management reserves the right to refuse, accept conditionally, or to cancel any entries, disqualify any riders, or exhibitors, and to prohibit exhibition of entries, without claim for damages; to combine, add, divide, cancel or delete classes if insufficient entries warrant or to reschedule classes after due notice to exhibitors; to add or substitute judges, or make any changes required by scheduling circumstances. **Warning: The show will be closed prior to the closing date once the schedule is full.**

Attire

Riders must be neatly and appropriately attired when entering the show ring. Please refer to the USEF rulebook for permissible tack and equipment.

Refunds

The show secretary must be notified immediately if you cannot attend the show. A full refund will be issued less the office fee if the secretary is notified before the closing date. After the closing date, one half of entry fees, less the office fee, will be refunded with a vet certificate presented within 3 days after the competition. No stall fee will be refunded.

Hazardous Weather/Act of God/ Accident Policy

Management reserves the right to cancel any class due to hazardous weather, Act of God, or accident. Every effort will be made to reschedule. No refunds for cancellations due to this policy. If the entire competition is cancelled due to a storm, accident, or other emergency, entry fees minus office fee will be refunded.

Schooling

Schooling will be permitted in the main ring, weather permitting, after 3:00 p.m. on Friday until 7 p.m. and in the warm up ring after 2:00 p.m. on Friday until 7:30 p.m. Lunging in designated areas only. No lunging in show arena or warm up arena. Schooling will be permitted in the warm-up ring on Saturday beginning one hour before the start of the show until one hour after the last class. No schooling will be allowed in the main ring on Saturday.

Prizes

Six ribbons will be awarded in all classes.

High Point and Reserve High Point Score Ribbons will be presented for the show. The awards will be calculated by averaging together the test scores per horse/rider combination. A special prize of \$25.00 will be awarded to the winner of the walk/trot/canter bareback equitation class. Ribbons not picked up at the show will **not** be mailed to the winner.

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Please Note

- USEF/USDF guidelines will be observed.
- Maximum of 3 classes per horse. An exception will be made for a maximum of 4 classes per horse only when that same horse is being ridden by a second rider and only if at least one of the four classes is in an intro level test.
- A 20 X 60 meter competition arena will be used for all tests unless entries warrant. Due to the spacing around the arena in the competition ring, riders will be permitted to enter the ring, make one pass around the inside of the ring, exit, then enter when the judge signals the start of the test.
- All riders must wear protective headgear while mounted.
- Concession stand food will be available for purchase on-site Saturday (not Friday).
- All dogs must be kept on leashes. Please clean up after your dog. Show management has the right to ask that disruptive dogs be removed from show grounds.
- All riders must be neatly and appropriately attired when entering the ring.
- Non-negotiable or NSF checks will be charged \$40.00 plus collection costs.
- No alterations are to be made to the permanent stabling or other facilities by exhibitors.
- All horses/ponies brought to the facility (whether showing or not) are responsible for providing the show office with a signed entry form, payment of owed fees, proof of negative Coggins test dated within 12 months, proof of Flu/Rhino within 6 months, and proof of Rabies within 12 months. Out of state travelers must provide a Health Certificate dated within 30 days of travel.
- Ride times will be posted on our website after 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday before the show.

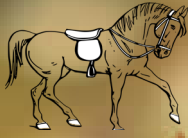
