As I write, it is one of our cold but sunny days in the Columbia River Gorge. I am struck by the beauty of the brilliant blue sky framing the bright white peak of Mount Adams as I drive toward work. I am awed by the view of the bluffs of Washington towering up from The Columbia looking out the windows from the Museum's River Gallery.

In Case You Missed It Looking Back at 2024



In November, the Columbia Gorge Discovery Center & Museum was awarded a 2024 Gold Medal for Best Museum in the Gorge and a 2024 Silver Medal for Best Place to Get Married in the Gorge! Thank you to all who voted for us! We are deeply moved and will aspire to live up to these awards in the year to come. The Awards event was hosted in the beautiful River Gallery at the Museum. We were so honored to be included as an awardee.

The past year was a whirlwind of enlightening and delightfully FREE events at the Columbia Gorge Discovery Center & Museum. The year began with an opening celebration for the new exhibition, A Century of Wonder: 100 Years of Oregon State Parks with the stunning photography of Peter Marbach. We were dazzled by the opening of the annual GORGEous Art Quilts exhibition. We celebrated Spring during Happy Hatch Week and hosted a pop-up Sense of Place lecture about foxes, wolverines and other rare carnivores of the High Cascades. In July, we celebrated Smokey Bear's 80th Birthday Party and reckoned with the consequences of forest fire with the art exhibition Wildfire In The PNW, featuring paintings by Ann Rutan. We learned about searching for Big Foot with Sasquatch Chronicler, Cliff Barackman during his lecture for the visiting exhibition "We Believe In Sasquatch." Guests welcomed fall with the Harvest Moon Walk, made corn husk-dolls and fresh-pressed cider, gazed at the stars and moon and learned about the change of seasons with Forest Service Rangers. We got messy during Gossology Stem Night, making fake scat, gooey slime and homemade flashlights. We celebrated the Native American regional community during Indian Autumn with The Little Swan Dancers, award-winning flautist James Edmund Greeley and storyteller Ed Edmo while sharing a fresh salmon bake by King Salmon Fisheries. Local artists offered their crafts for sale. In collaboration with Friends of the Gorge, we honored long-time museum friend and partner Barbara Robinson with a showing of the short film Wildflower Woman celebrating her life of dedication to restoring and preserving native plants and wild flowers throughout the Gorge. We are forever grateful to Barbara for spearheading and maintaining the native plantings on the Museum grounds! We played raucous indoor games during the Backcountry Film Festival night to support the Snow School program. We practiced atlatl spear throwing, tasted camas root and learned about ancient foodways during The Archeology Roadshow's - Archeology of Food. We danced to the magnificent Native American drumming and singing of Charles Wood III in collaboration with The Dalles Overground. Finally, we made Native Botanical Wreaths in an aromatic, indoor evergreen forest. And to top it all off, 11 magical, romantic weddings flowered in the River Gallery. What a beautiful and wondrous year!

Educational Programs

Volunteers Sharing Their Passion for Learning

This fall and early winter, the Education Department experienced an incredible season of growth, engagement, and celebration—all made possible by the enthusiasm and dedication of our amazing volunteers. These individuals bring diverse skills, interests, and passions that elevate our programs and help connect the community with the beauty and importance of the Gorge's natural and human history.

A shining example of this collaboration was our *Grossology* event. Held in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service, this candy-free Halloween event brought families with costumed kids to see our Museum in a new light through daring flashlight-lit tours of our darkened exhibits. The kids made the flashlights themselves with one of our terrific volunteers, Mike. Long-time volunteer Billy O'Keefe, brought his collection of creepy crawly beetles, insects and spiders to share, and the slime table was heroically manned by another long-time volunteer and Board Member, Bill Weiler.

Visitors learned to identify wild animal scat and then made fake skat themselves complete with bits of fur or feather pieces with the guidance of US Forest Service Rangers, along with other hands-on touch tables and STEM activities. The turnout exceeded expectations, and it was the hard work of our volunteers that made *Grossology* such a success—they truly went above and beyond.

We hosted a wreath-making event in December, where participants created wreaths using boughs clipped from a small forest of pine, fir, and cedar, infusing the museum with the festive scent of the holidays. We are already planning for next year, and envision volunteers joining us in the woods with loppers, saws, and USFS collection permits to help establish this new holiday tradition!

Looking ahead, our SECRETS school-based Columbia Gorge Ecology program will launch new sessions in January and again in March. SECRETS takes us into fifth-grade classrooms throughout Hood River County, The Dalles, and Washington, helping students connect with the ecosystems surrounding their homes and schools. Volunteers play a vital role in creating the one-on-one moments that are so powerful in sparking curiosity and engagement.

We also have a unique opportunity for volunteers with a creative flair—specifically, anyone with costume design skills! Each SECRETS lesson opens with an educational skit, and we need help creating costumes to bring these lessons to life. Imagine transforming a fifth grader into a woodpecker, a staff member into a mighty oak tree, or even bringing a fungus to life! If this sounds like something you'd enjoy, we'll provide materials and collaborate with you to design fun, imaginative costumes that will captivate and educate our students. Collections

It Takes a Village

It has been a busy year in Collections. We have continued updating our records and processing new, and sometimes very large donations. The help of volunteers is critical to keeping up with the workflow.

Our W.G. Dick Research Library volunteers, Susan Munger and Georgia Foster have done an excellent job of updating the records to improve access to researchers who are tracking genealogy or topical information.

Team member, Adriana Thompson, has put her skills to great use in Collections. She has done an excellent job in taking on many of the tasks that make a big difference – making more efficient use of our storage space, updating catalog records, helping to process some of those large donations - all in addition to her work in maintaining our exhibits.

We ended 2024 with an exhibition titled "We Believe in Sasquatch" on loan from the North American Bigfoot Center. Our plan for 2025 is to showcase Native American Artwork in the Kuck Wing. And we are working toward a new exhibition opening mid-year.

Managing our collections — the objects in our care — is an involved process. We regularly monitor the environment: temperature, RH (relative humidity), and lumen intensity (light) that affect our artifacts.

We also keep an eye on what pests are finding their way into the museum. Most bugs are harmless, but a few can damage delicate artifacts.

Thanks to our volunteer, retired entomologist Billy O'Keefe, we have an expert eye on what's bugging us.

The question I hear most frequently is "When are the photo archives going to be back online?" It was a frustrating experience to have our photo archives go offline in 2022 due to an undiagnosed computer glitch. It required us to completely rebuild the database, and relink all 29,000 photos.

Volunteer Tami Quinton has been updating our databases toward that goal. Now our only barriers are finding funding and a skilled programmer to get it back online.

We hope that 2025 will allow us to provide a more transparent glimpse into what our collections hold and to provide more content to researchers and history lovers.


