With the alarming increase in suicides in the United States, it is critical that all clinicians be prepared to engage with suicidal clients using evidence informed screening, assessment, and treatment modalities. - Perform a hierarchical suicide screen

- Describe the CAMS assessment and treatment framework and the need for increased clinical capacity in the outpatient management of suicidality
- Identify best practices for engagement, assessment, and treatment of suicidal clients
