



## FROM THE PASTOR

Within a ten month period (1997-1998) Neil Peart's\* only child (Selena, 19) was killed in a traffic accident and Jackie (spouse of 23 years) passed away from terminal cancer.

Peart reflected: *How does someone survive something like this? And if they do—what kind of person comes out on the other end?*

He decided to find comfort in *motion*—riding his BMW R1100GS motorcycle 55,000 miles over fourteen months—searching for a reason to carry on.

*Ghost Rider: Travels On The Healing Road* records Peart's pilgrimage.

The first leg of journey brought no relief:

“I didn’t have much interest in the world around me. I didn’t like anything, didn’t care about anything, and didn’t want to do anything.”

Peart was sitting on a dock and reviewing familiar scenery on the other side of a lake.

Two triangular rocks were sticking out of the water, near one of the islands.

Saying to no-one in particular:

“Those two rocks always reminded me of baby ducks staring at one another—and I still *like* those rocks.”

This gift of “simple” grace gave birth to hope. He was astonished to actually *like* something.

A moment of clarity:

“From that pair of rocks, I’ll begin to build a whole new world.” Peart’s life began to resonate: “*I’m curious about what the next line in the map might look like.*”

The travels on the healing road caused Peart to change his “callous, shallow world-view”.

He enjoyed family and friends but others written into his story were interruptions and annoyance—everyone *wants* something from you.

Peart was unable to cope and deal with everyday issues of life—forced to accept assistance from friends and family. The interactions with strangers encountered on the road—instead of irritation—was transformed into an occasional healing balm.

He quotes Steinbeck:

“Sometimes the nicest thing you can do for someone is to allow them to do something for you.”

Are you traveling on the healing road?

God will reveal to you, at most unexpected moments, glimpses of hope—enough fuel to carry on.

And God will also write weary, worn out pilgrims into your story.

The gift of your time and listening ear—can re-awake and re-energize another to discover *what the next line in the map might look like.*

The Apostle Paul established communities of Jesus-followers in Corinth—and all arrived at faith in Christ—from a wide variety of destinations.

Paul continued an extensive and contentious correspondence with Christians in Corinth—brothers and sisters—*no matter how you arrived—you must travel down a healing road of love.*

I pray Paul’s note of encouragement to Corinth’s beloved community will guide you in a directionally accurate manner:

*Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who **comforts us in all our affliction**, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God.*

*\*Neal Peart was the lyricist and Hall of Fame drummer for the rock group, Rush. For their achievements in music, Rush received the Order of Canada, the country’s highest civilian award. He eventually remarried, “joined the local YMCA, stopped smoking and cut down consumption of alcohol”. His final years were spent happily married to Carrie and daughter, Olivia, whom he grew to adore and the feeling was mutual. Peart passed away from brain cancer in January 2020. He was 67.*

# Musical Notes

During the month in which we consider stewardship, much of the music enhancing our worship will explore the concepts of legacy: what have artists bequeathed us, how are we to honor their gifts, and in what ways can they enhance and enrich worship?

Two of the greatest Christian classical musicians of history are Mendelssohn and Handel. Both actively wrote for the Church, and Mendelssohn even served the Berlin Cathedral as its director of music. So, on **October 16<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>** much of our musical offerings will be taken from their output. By contrast, **the first two Sundays of October** will feature Contemporary Christian music by two very familiar names, Ken Medema and Andrae Crouch, while our commitment to women composers will remain firm through piano works from Dobrinka Tabakova and Sasha Johnson Manning.

Most notable in October will be our service on **October 22<sup>nd</sup>**, which sees the culmination of the annual conference of the Midwest Kodaly Music Educators of America. Following their concert at TBC the night before, on Sunday morning a number of these teachers will join with our musicians to present works by Zoltán Kodály for our worship, while Brent Johnson and Gary Pedersen will play some of his keyboard works.

Kodály is one of the most important composers of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. With his fellow countryman, Bela Bartók, he collected thousands of folksongs from his native Hungary, arranging many for orchestral and choral ensembles. Yet even more significant was his creation of a national curriculum for schools that trained children to read and create music; this ‘method’ was so successful that it has been adopted around the globe, and thousands of American teachers employ its techniques in their classrooms. Kodály may be mentioned in the same breath as other educational pioneers like Maria Montessori and John Dewey, and Third is honored to play a part in this year’s MKEA gathering.

All members of Third are invited to attend the concert of the Midwest Kodaly Music Educators of America that will be presented in the Sanctuary on Saturday, **October 1<sup>st</sup>**, at 7:30 pm. Performers will include a 100-strong choir, some of whom will join our choir the following morning for worship.

On **October 2<sup>nd</sup>** the Saint Louis Chamber Chorus opens its 67<sup>th</sup> season with a performance at the St. Louis Abbey, located in West County. This year’s theme is ‘Progressions’ and the first concert is titled ‘Darkness to Light’. Notable works on the program include the world premiere of a new Mass setting by the Anglo-Bulgarian composer, Dobrinka Tabakova, whose piano music we will hear at Third that same day. Several of TBC’s musicians, including Philip Barnes, are members of the Chamber Chorus.
