



FROM THE PASTOR

Aaron Judge is an instant celebrity. He is a 6-foot, 7-inch slugger - breaking Roger Maris' American League home run record last month, an American League Rookie of the Year, and a four time All-Star.

Judge is a celebrity in a city that worships its sports heroes.

But he has no interest in exploring the night life of New York City.

The introduction to his twitter account reads:

Christian. Faith. Family, then Baseball. If what you did yesterday still seems big today, then you haven't done anything today!

And the top of his banner quotes Paul's letter to 2 Corinthians—“For we walk by faith, not by sight.”

Judge was adopted at birth by two middle age educators in Linden, California—Wayne and Patty Judge.

At the age of 10—they informed Aaron he was adopted—which he began to suspect—“I just didn’t look the same as my parents.”

Judge has always seemed larger than life—setting a school record for touchdowns, leading scorer in basketball and a pitcher with an 0.65 ERA and .500 batting average.

And throughout these accomplishments, Judge has maintained humility and a spirit of gratefulness.

Judge's high school coach said, "the kind of person Aaron is now, that's exactly who he was in high school. He hasn't changed."

Patty told the New York Post, "Wayne and I are more blessed than he is, words can't describe how proud of him we are."

The Apostle Paul spent 3 years in Ephesus—planting and nurturing the church. And the first part of Paul's *Letter to Ephesians* reads like a theological treatise—containing an overview of God's plan and purpose.

Paul, after a brief salutation, searches for a metaphor to describe spiritual blessings in Christ:

*Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ, with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, just as he chose us in Christ Jesus, before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. He destined us for **adoption** as His children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of His will.*

Paul urges Christians to remember the source of their spiritual blessing—adoption as His children—because of the saving work of Jesus Christ. It is a relationship so intimate—adopted sons and daughters can say "Abba" (father, daddy).

And the values of adoption are impressed upon us by the Holy Spirit—guiding you to cultivate the fruit of the Spirit and form yourself into the image of Jesus.

Aaron Judge's trajectory in life was changed because of adoption and values instilled by Wayne and Patty Judge.

The direction of your life is forever influenced by "your adoption as His children through Jesus Christ."

And as you turn to this season of Thanksgiving, you are joined by all adopted children—sitting around an abundant table of grace, enjoying spiritual blessings in Christ.

Families, I will continue sharing “Faith Family Talks,” a ministry of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship’s Children’s Ministry Network as you talk, listen, read, and pray together at home and as we prepare ourselves for Advent.

In reflecting on the year, as we near Advent, I encourage you to practice a daily examen prayer.

Daily Examen Prayer

End each day remembering moments that gave you hope and happiness.

Express thanks.

Ask for the Spirit’s guidance to see your days honestly and fully reflecting on the entirety of the day.

Remember the faces you saw today, the places you were, the things you thought, said, felt, and think about when you experienced joy. When did your heart grow bigger and lighter?

When did you experience anxiety and fear? When did your heart grow smaller and heavier?

Ask for forgiveness for what was done that shouldn’t have been, and for what should have been that wasn’t.

Pray for tomorrow with hope and confidence in what will be God’s gift of a new day.

Close with the Lord’s Prayer.

Missions Moment


Pastor,


