In response to [an article written by J. Herbert Nelson](#), the Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and published in the October 18 issue of EMerge, I share some thoughts. I've never responded to anything from the EMerge newsletter that gets emailed to me every other week, and I'm saddened that our first communication would be one of disagreement and contention. "It is what it is," an over-used cliche it might be, but often it's "spot-on."

Mark Twain is known for saying, "Get your facts first and then you can distort them however you please." In today's world of "information over-load," it can be difficult to know what the facts actually are. In particular, I'm concerned with Rev.
