## A Message from our Rector

Advent 2020

*...give us grace, that we may cast away the works of darkness,  
and put upon us the armor of light...*

Dear Friends,

These are words from the collect for the First Sunday of Advent written by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer for the first Book of Common Prayer (1549). Rooted in Scripture, these words remind us that this season of the Church year calls us to seek out the One who is the Light more than any other season.

As a community, I dare say that we are more in need of the message of God's Light shining the darkness this year more than any most of us can remember.

The world around us seems dark, at times it even is: a global pandemic, political and civic divisions, unemployment, loneliness – the list goes on. But, the Light of God still does shine in the darkness! We are to embrace the Light and then ourselves be light and love to others. Remember what St. Augustine said: "Without God, we cannot; without us, God will not."

Since 1662, it has been instructed that this prayer should be read each day during the Advent. (You can find it in our prayer book on pages 159 or 211.) It has long been a part of my Advent discipline. And, I hope you will join me in this devotional practice as we look to greet the One who is Light, Joy, Hope, Peace, and Love.

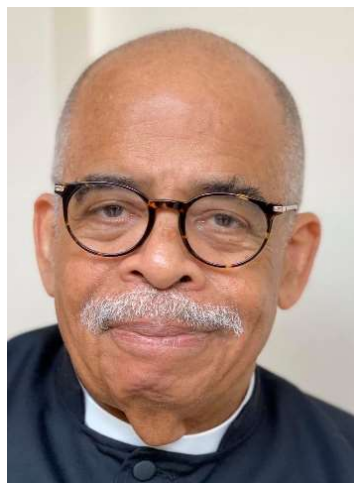

### Mary at the Beginning: The Annunciation & the Mystery of Salvation

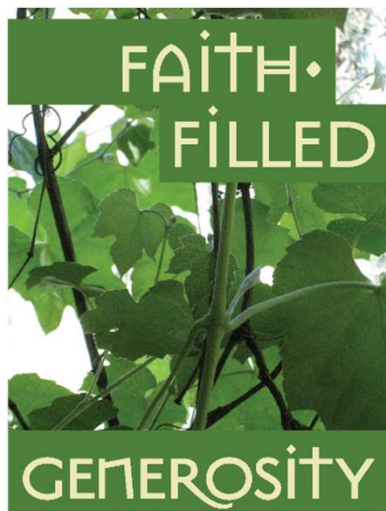
Tuesday, December 8, 7:00 P.M. via Zoom

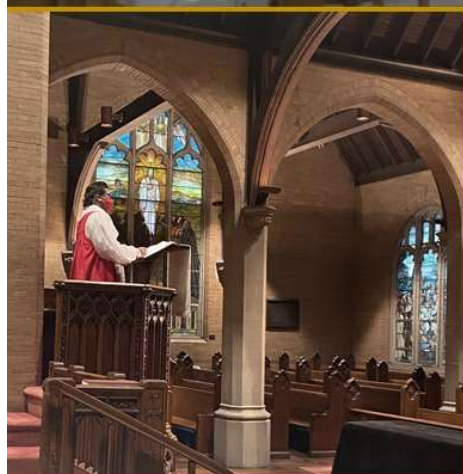
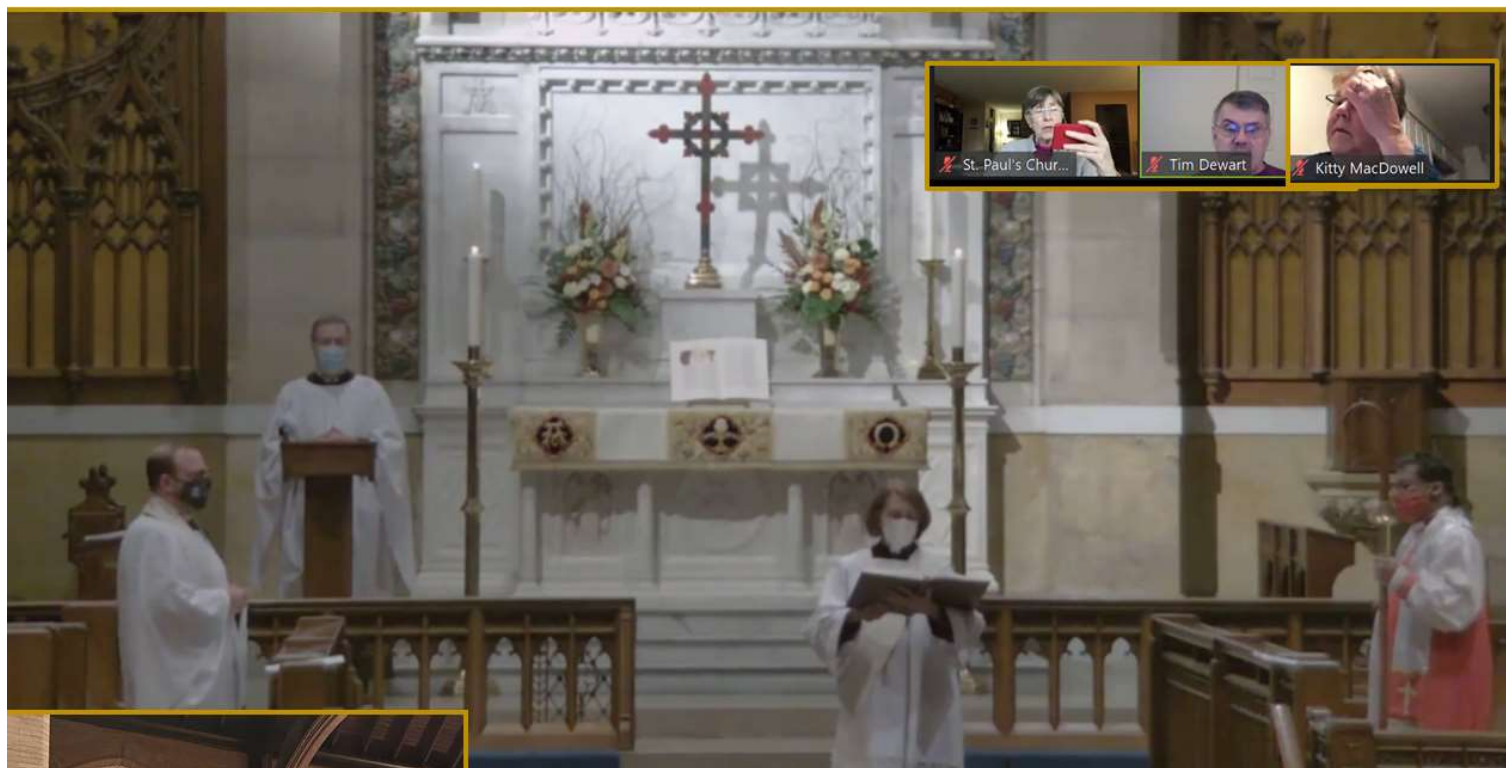
### Diocesan convention

## Compline

Weekly Compline has been offered each Tuesday since September 29. The service is available to watch with a video link at the viewer's convenience.

Compline (BCP, p. 127) is descended from the night prayers said at the end of the monastic round of daily prayer. It includes confession of sins, one or more psalms, a scripture reading, versicles and responses, the Lord's Prayer, collects, and the canticle *Nunc dimittis*. The collects are followed by a time of silence for private prayer.

### Noonday Prayer

Since the pandemic closed St. Paul's doors to most gatherings for worship, clergy and staff have led Noonday Prayer on Facebook from a variety of settings every Monday through Friday. Leading the discussions was Carl McColman, a Lay Cistercian and Centering Prayer presenter. He has practiced Christian complete prayer and meditation for more than 30 years, and has authored a number of books on the topic.

## Hebrew Bible Meets Gospel Writers

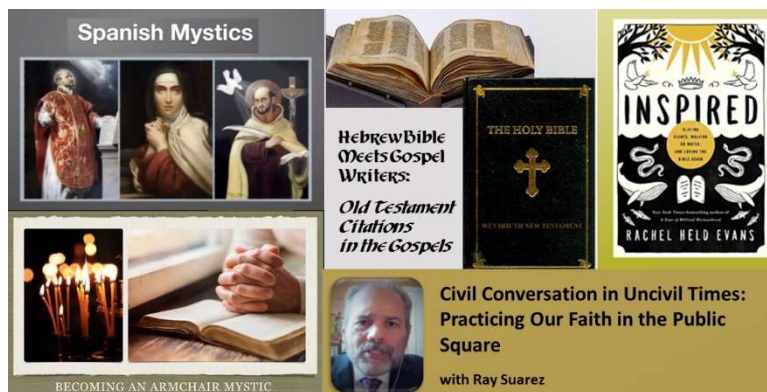

Evans was raised in an evangelical family but became an Episcopalian as an adult. In *Inspired*, she explores 'the great chasm between Scripture as learned and Scripture as what is actually is.

## 2020 Faith in the World program: *Unsettling Truths*

On October 24, about 200 online participants met with Mark Charles and Soong-Chan Rah, authors of *Unsettling Truths*. The book describes how European settlers used white supremacy, their Christian faith, and the Doctrine of Discovery to justify slavery, to decimate the native cultures in the Americas, and to continue the same racial caste-ism today. They recommended a time of lamentation for the church as well as the development of a counter message of inclusivity.

## Salva Dut a finalist for the Elevate Prize

Salva Dut, founder of Water for South Sudan, was one of 20 finalists worldwide for the first Elevate Prize which awards \$5,000,000.00 to 10 changemakers tackling global challenges. The Elevate Prize Foundation is sponsored by MIT Solve, an initiative of MIT. Salva Dut founded WFSS in 2003. He had been separated from his family during the Sudanese Civil War as a child and after living in refugee camps, came to Rochester. Years later, he learned that his father was still alive and suffering from a disease caused by waterborne parasites. This inspired him to create Water for South Sudan to drill fresh-water wells in an arid country with often contaminated water. WFSS drills 40 wells per year at locations selected by local leaders, then trains villagers to operate and maintain the wells, which become their property and responsibility. Since its initiation in 2003, WFSS has drilled 457 freshwater wells, and provided other services, including emergency COVID-19 hygiene education training to more than 17,000 people this spring. ## A PROPERTY UPDATE

In September, asbestos abatement took place in Stone Hall (former Spanish Chapel in the Parish Hall basement). This was the next step in the Parish Hall restoration process following the completion of the major water-proofing project. The abatement followed strict safety protocols and didn't impact our operations or those of the childcare center.

The Vestry has reviewed bids from contractors for the complete restoration of the space that currently houses the parish archives and is home to most of our 12-Step groups. The project will include the creation of a new youth group room, refurbishment of the kitchenette, repair and addition of restrooms, restoration of a room for the archives, and an office for our school tutoring program.

Thank you to Bob Potter and his team, as well as to our parish archivists, for the many hours of work it took to get the space cleaned out for this project. Work is scheduled to begin in early December to enhance our space for our current ministries, extend hospitality to our 12-step groups, and enable us to expand our mission.





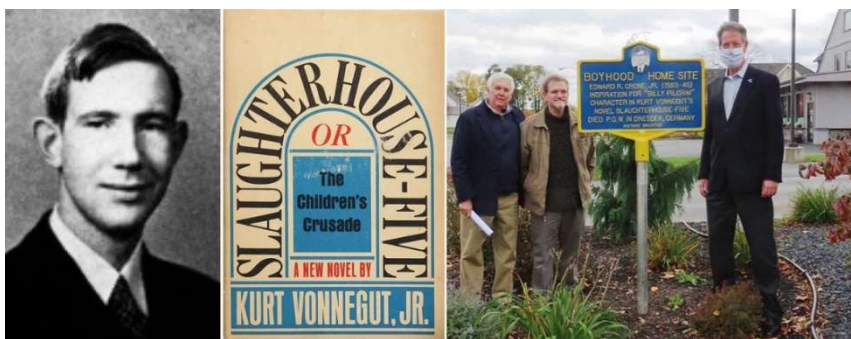
## Tips for Year-end Giving

## Former St. Paul's parishioner remembered

A former St. Paul's parishioner, Edward Reginald Crone, was remembered this past fall in Brighton where he spent his childhood. He graduated from Brighton High School in 1941 and attended Hobart College until he was drafted into the Army in 1942. He was captured and kept in a prisoner-of-war camp in Dresden, Germany, where he met Kurt Vonnegut, who was also a prisoner there. Crone, who died in the camp in April 1945, was the inspiration for Billy Pilgrim, the protagonist in Vonnegut's anti-war epic *Slaughterhouse-Five*. On October 25, a historic marker recognizing Edward Crone was dedicated at the site of his childhood home at 1627 Monroe Avenue.
