

# MARYSVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT



**We staff 1 engine  
24/7/365 days a year with:**

- 1-Fire Captain
- 1-Fire Engineer
- 1-Firefighter

**Calls For Service Response**

- 2,999 calls in 2018
- 1,375 calls in 2019  
(so far)



# Concurrent Calls

Concurrent calls are considered to be “back to back calls” while the City’s single staffed engine is committed to an emergency incident and an additional emergency call for service occurs.

- In 2018, there was a total of 357 concurrent calls.
- As of June 26<sup>th</sup> 2019, there has been 300 concurrent calls.
- Currently, Fire Department staffing levels do not allow for responding to concurrent calls.
- FD is unable to respond to ~ 20% of concurrent calls.



# Fire Apparatus Challenges

- Current Fire Trucks have surpassed service life standards.
- Fire Trucks longevity is not more than 20 years; FD exceeds that by several years.
- Current safety standards are lacking including airbags and safety features.
- Mechanical failure is common and costly.
- Long periods of downtime exist with mechanical failures.
- The cost of a new Fire Engine is \$750 K.

# Coming Soon! New Fire Apparatus

- Fire Department currently has on order:
  - A New Fire Engine;
  - A New Quick Attack – Better Response for Medical Emergencies and Concurrent Calls; and
  - A New Utility Truck.



# Cost Recovery Efforts

In an effort to improve staffing levels, apparatus and response times, the Fire Department is undertaking the following cost recovery efforts:

- Charging insurance for emergency medical services;
- When negligence can be proven, charging individuals or organizations for starting a fire;
- Reviewing and increasing service contracts;
- Reviewing and charging more to the State for administrative costs; and
- Increasing Fire Inspections.



# Improving Programs & Services

- Partnering with other fire districts and seeking shared service agreements;
- Ramping up the City Weed Abatement Program;
- Developing a Vegetation Management Program;
- Increasing Fire Prevention;
- Building up the Reserve, Intern and Volunteer Program; and
- Increasing Public Education.



# EQUIPMENT

- FD equipment is outdated and requires replacement.
- The major areas of concern are:
  - Communication equipment including radios,
  - Self Contained Breathing Apparatus, and
  - Small equipment and tool items for apparatus.
- Many equipment replacements cost more than \$200 K.



# Grants & New Equipment

- Fire Engine Grant - \$560 K.
- Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus - \$260 K
- New Radios - \$220 K – **JUST AWARDED!!**
- Personal Protective and Apparatus Equipment - \$40 K
