A Note from Fr. Joe....

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus challenges us in many ways – and one is his directly asking us to examine how we share what we have; our things, our money, but also our time, our talents, our mercy and compassion. Do we only help those who can help us? Do we only love those who love us? Do we “love with a hook,” giving with the expectation of getting something in return? Do we maintain what I call “an accounting ledger attitude?” “I won't ask him if he needs anything because he never asks me.” “I'm not going to tell her I'm sorry because she still owes me an apology.” “I sent them a card, a gift and they never gave me anything.”

According to St. Paul in our 2nd Reading, this thinking is the result of our bearing “the image of the earthly one,” Adam. It's the result of sin, of fallen human nature. Nevertheless, Paul also tells us that, because of Jesus the Christ's death and Resurrection, we “bear the image of the heavenly one,” as well. By virtue of our Baptism, we each are capable of being like Christ, of being ‘merciful, just as our Father is merciful.’ Jesus repeatedly tells us in the Gospels to “do good,” not as some unachievable task, but as something that's possible with his grace; to “do good” not just to those we know or like, not just to those who've given something to us – and not because we expect anything in return.

Moreover, Jesus even takes it a step further – challenging us to ‘love our enemies,’ to live out of a generous compassion. As our 1st Reading recounts, it's the kind of compassion, mercy that led David to spare Saul his life, despite what had become an adversarial relationship. In referring to Christ's command, Martin Luther King, Jr. put it this way, “I am not speaking of love in a sentimental or affectionate sense...When I refer to love in this context, I mean understanding good-will – we must in strength and humility meet hate with love.”

God knows we can't do it on our own! That's why Jesus suffered and died for us. That's why he gives us the ongoing grace of the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Eucharist. As we prepare to begin another Lent in just a week and a half now, it is the perfect time to consider how we're responding to Jesus' challenges. For forty days, we'll have the opportunity to focus our lives so as to mature beyond our earthly image and grow more deeply into our heavenly one; to renew our baptismal commitment and our stewardship. Lent is not simply about giving things up, but giving of ourselves, in love, to God and others – even those who seem to make that difficult. Our own St. Augustine advises, “Keep trying and do what you can...Let us practice these two sorts of almsgiving, namely giving and forgiving, gently and generously.” May Christ's great love for us move us to go out into our often-divided world and bring his healing touch – always remembering that “the measure of our love is to love without measure.”

One of the ways that we can share what we have is by giving generously to this year's Archdiocese of Philadelphia's Catholic Charities Appeal – “Giving Hope to All” – that kicks off in our parish this weekend. If you didn't receive a direct mailing, envelopes will be available in both the Rosemont Chapel and the Villanova Church. The Appeal ensures that vital ministries across the Archdiocese can continue to serve those in need. Thank you for all that you do!

Stewardship Thought for the Week

“But rather, love your enemies and do good to them, and lend without expecting anything back...” - LUKE 6:35

Easier said than done, right? But, if we are to imitate Christ, most of us need to practice mercy and compassion more frequently. Start with the little daily annoyances that we experience, the unkind word or hateful glance we receive. Instead of plotting revenge on that person, try saying a quick prayer for that person. Praying for our enemies doesn't change them, it changes us. Mercy and compassion will keep us on the path to holiness.

FAST AND ACTS OF PENANCE FOR LENT

The Bishops of the United States prescribe, as minimal obligation, that all persons who are fourteen years of age and older are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, March 5, 2025 and on all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. Further, all persons eighteen years of age and older, up to and including their fifty-ninth birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, while the other two meals on those days are to be light.

All the faithful are encouraged, when possible, to participate at Mass and to receive the Holy Eucharist daily, to celebrate frequently the Sacrament of Penance, to undertake spiritual reading, especially the study of the Sacred Scriptures, and to participate in parish Lenten devotions as well as Lenten education programs. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is especially recommended.

All are encouraged to participate in Operation Rice Bowl which has aided countless hungry persons here in the Archdiocese as well as throughout our nation and the world.

A SEASON FOR SLOWING DOWN

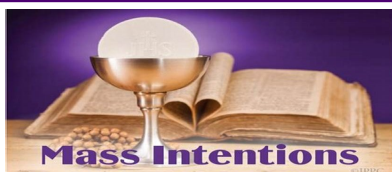

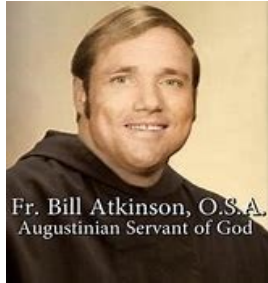

STV Food Pantry NEEDS your HELP!

The Parish food closet accepts donations of non-perishable foods on a weekly basis. The items collected are then delivered to our sister parish, St. Cyprian's in West Philadelphia, where approximately 300 families are assisted on a monthly basis.

Items most in need are:

powdered milk, canned fruit and 100% fruit juice, peanut butter and jelly, tuna, canned chicken, cold cereal, oatmeal, pasta and pasta sauce, rice, stew, chili and soup, toilet paper and diapers.

Food may be dropped off Monday-Thursday, 9:00am to 4:30pm and on Fridays from 9:00am to 1:00pm. Please drop off at the Parish Center and on weekends to the back of the Rosemont Chapel (around Mass times when the Church is open.) Please be mindful of expiration dates. We cannot deliver food items which are past their expiration dates. Thank you.

If you would rather not shop, please know that financial contributions are welcome and will allow parish volunteers to buy items for the parish food closet that directly benefit the food pantry at our sister parish, St. Cyprian. You may either send a check made out to St. Thomas of Villanova (with "Parish Food Closet" on the memo line) to the parish office or drop a check in the collection basket.
