

TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME OCTOBER 15, 2023



Scripture Reflection...

The passage from Isaiah depicts a scene of permanent victory, abundant feasting, and life without end. The setting is a high mountain from which the power and the munificence of God are made manifest, and a sumptuous eschatological banquet is prepared. The rich foods mentioned are symbols of the fullness of life. It is also on this mountain that God destroys death, along with the pall and shroud, symbols of death. This is a time when all promises are fulfilled, a time of ultimate salvation. This eschatological fulfillment embraces not only the entire human race, but the natural world as well. Finally, on that day of eschatological fulfillment, the people acclaim the God to whom they looked for salvation.

The responsorial psalm, one of the most familiar and beloved psalms of the Psalter, paints vivid pictures of carefree existence, peaceful rest, and abundant fruitfulness. Although “shepherd” suggests a flock rather than merely one sheep, here the focus is on the individual. The magnanimous care shown by the shepherd flows from enduring righteousness rather than from some passing sentiment of the heart. The divine shepherd's tender commitment to the flock, and to each individual within it, is as lasting as is God's covenant commitment. The psalmist claims to be unafraid, for the presence of the Lord is reassuring. In addition to this image, God is characterized as a host who supervises a banquet, and within whose house the psalmist ultimately dwells. Paul is not referring to the ordinary trials and sufferings of life. He is talking about the tribulations that will engulf all people at the onslaught of the endtime. This suffering, known as the “birth pangs of the Messiah,” stems from the apocalyptic conclusion of this age. The avenue through which Paul enters this time of tribulation is the burdens of the ministry. The help offered by the Philippians was not merely philanthropic assistance. They participated in Paul's ministerial endeavors and his distress, the tribulations of the endtime. Therefore, they are promised a share in the glory of the new age. Paul concludes by praising the glory that has been God's from the beginning and that will continue to be God's from age to age.

Jesus uses a parable to illustrate the severe consequences of refusing the invitation to a royal wedding banquet. The culpable negligence or indifference of those originally called was tantamount to political insubordination. The wedding garment probably represented some aspect of righteousness. The banquet is a metaphor for the delights of the eschatological age of fulfillment (see Is 25:6). The time between the initial invitation and the announcement that the banquet is ready resembles the interim between the invitation to participate in the age of fulfillment and one's entrance into it. Finally, the punishment meted out by the king suggests the final judgment and the distress that will accompany it.

"Laudate Deum" – Pope Francis' new Apostolic Exhortation

Eight years have passed since I published the Encyclical Letter *Laudato Si'*, when I wanted to share with all of you, my brothers and sisters of our suffering planet, my heartfelt concerns about the care of our common home. Yet, with the passage of time, I have realized that our responses have not been adequate, while the world in which we live is collapsing and may be nearing the breaking point. In addition to this possibility, it is indubitable that the impact of climate change will increasingly prejudice the lives and families of many persons. We will feel its effects in the areas of healthcare, sources of employment, access to resources, housing, forced migrations, etc.

This is a global social issue and one intimately related to the dignity of human life. The Bishops of the United States have expressed very well this social meaning of our concern about climate change, which goes beyond a merely ecological approach, because "our care for one another and our care for the earth are intimately bound together. Climate change is one of the principal challenges facing society and the global community. The effects of climate change are borne by the most vulnerable people, whether at home or around the world".

No one can ignore the fact that in recent years we have witnessed extreme weather phenomena, frequent periods of unusual heat, drought and other cries of protest on the part of the earth that are only a few palpable expressions of a silent disease that affects everyone. Admittedly, not every concrete catastrophe ought to be attributed to global climate change. Nonetheless, it is verifiable that specific climate changes provoked by humanity are notably heightening the probability of extreme phenomena that are increasingly frequent and intense. For this reason, we know that every time the global temperature increases by 0.5° C, the intensity and frequency of great rains and floods increase in some areas and severe droughts in others, extreme heat waves in some places and heavy snowfall in others. If up to now we could have heat waves several times a year, what will happen if the global temperature increases by 1.5° C, which we are approaching? Those heat waves will be much more frequent and with greater intensity. If it should rise above 2 degrees, the icecaps of Greenland and a large part of Antarctica will melt completely, with immensely grave consequences for everyone.

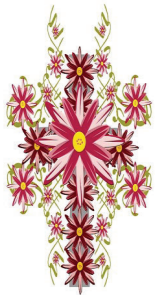
