

PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

APRIL 10, 2022



Scripture Reflection...

Holy Week begins each year with our Palm Sunday (a.k.a. Passion Sunday) liturgy. In this liturgy, our procession starts with the reading of the triumphal entrance of Jesus into the city of Jerusalem on a humble colt. Here Jesus is proclaimed by those on the way as “the king who comes in the name of the Lord.” Words of “hosanna” rise out from the multitude of his disciples, praising God with joy.

Yet, there is no liturgy starker in contrast of tone than Palm Sunday. Just as shouts of “hosanna” and praise of the messiah and king of the people fill the road along with palms and cloaks, the liturgy swiftly turns towards the Passion narrative. How quickly the crowd’s chants of “hosanna” become chants of “crucify him!” How quickly the cloaks become nails to a cross. How quickly does waving palms become waving fists.

What does this contrast reveal to us about Jesus and ourselves? The close connection between the welcoming of their king and the death of Jesus presents an insight into Jesus’ reign: complete self-emptying, sacrificial love, and in stunning vulnerability. Jesus’ triumphant throne as king is not gold, but the wood of the cross. The reign most deeply felt and profoundly expressed is in this moment of laying down his life for his friends. There is no greater love than this. Despite the fickleness of the crowd whose tune changes so suddenly, Jesus’ reign remains ever among us – undeterred and ever constant – a sacrificial love so unjustly crucified by the broken world for the new life of the world.

In Luke’s passion account proclaimed this year, note how this sacrificial love still brings about reconciliation despite such suffering to Jesus. Luke makes the fascinating point of reconciliation between Herod and Pilate after years of being enemies. Also, Luke uniquely mentions Jesus’ forgiveness of the repentant or good thief crying out next to him. May our journeying with Christ this Holy Week, from “hosanna” to “crucify him,” renew our faith in the reign of God among us, despite our brokenness. With war, suffering, illness, and estrangement so vividly around us, may we notice the sacrificial love of God’s reign that continues to bring about reconciliation in our hearts, homes, communities, and world – hopefully with our help, but, thankfully, sometimes despite it.

How many times have you heard someone make a disparaging comment about God or our Catholic faith? How did you react? Do you remain quiet not to cause a disturbance? 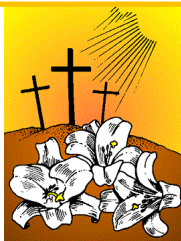

**CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES (CRS)
SHARES STORIES FROM UKRAINE**

Tatyana left her home in Ukraine in early March, walking the last 10 miles to reach Moldova. She says the people of Chisinau have been good to them, but hopes to go home soon. "I wish this would end, so that there is peace and we can return...and live as before," Tatyana said. More than 3.9 million Ukrainians have fled Ukraine since the war started over a month ago. Connor O'Loughlin, the lead coordinator of emergency refugee services for CRS, spoke to USA Today about the situation: "For many, many people, those who are staying in Moldova, they want to be close to home and return when it's possible. 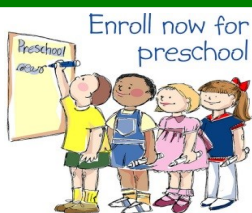

**Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line
An Affiliate of Family Promise — 30 Years of Transformation**

IHN-ML Celebrates 30 Years of Serving Families

Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line (IHN-ML) served its very first family in May 1992 when staff and parishioners at Our Mother of Good Counsel, Bryn Mawr, welcomed a mother and her two daughters to their campus for shelter and support. All went well that first night and 30 years later, OMGC and a network of local congregations are still opening their doors to provide shelter, meals, and hospitality to families experiencing homelessness.
