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

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Voxxy Lady Goes to Europe, Part I: Holland

My friend, good harp man, Mark "Bird" Stafford, recently returned from Europe. He was there mostly for family visiting reasons, but was ever-prepared to sit in if the situation presented itself. In Glasgow and Amsterdam he found it tough to sit in, saying that it's much the same everywhere if you don't know anybody. True words.

Bird's trip made me think of my own three weeks in Europe this past December. As a young woman, I lived and worked in Holland for two years. My sweetie was a Dutch jazz pianist. I had a visitors visa but wasn't legally allowed to earn money, so I worked under the cloak of "The Nicki Harlem Quintet". We were poor--of course--living La Vie Boheme in a two-room zolder (an attic apartment) in a centuries-old building in Leiden. Every morning I got up, lit the kacheltje (little heater), warmed the dishes in hot water, and made breakfast. Our kacheltje was the kind

of small barrel-shaped ancient heater found in out-dated Dutch buildings, especially in studentenkaamers (student housing). Every year, several people died of asphyxiation from these Co2 producing devices. Not ones to take chances, we turned off our kacheltje each night. I know that the temperature was below zero those two winters I lived in Holland because the canals froze for two

record-breaking years in a row. That hadn't happened since WWII. The word kacheltje is so difficult for nonnative Dutch speakers to say, it was apparently used as a way to screen German imposters during the war. They would be ordered to say 88 kacheltjes or "achtentachtig

kachetjes". I loved practicing saying that.


So we were poor, we were cold, but we had the time of our lives. It was so fun to be young working musicians. We hung every night. There seemed to be nothing but socializing and playing back in those days. One day I was riding the tram in Amsterdam and heard singing way at the back. I fought my way through the end-of-the-work-day crowd so that I could see who was making the music. It was Canada's own Shuffle Demons. I brought them all home to the zolder and made them Italian vegetarian soul food. For years afterwards, Demons drummer, Stych Winston, reminded me of how good that food tasted. I got the Demons a gig at our local jazz joint, "The Duke", and the Dutch audience loved them. In fact, our guitarist, Jeroen Koning, who has a memory like fly paper, started singing the lyrics of "Spadina Bus" at our next gig.

> The Duke (now a sports bar) was our local headquarters. The club's owner. Dick Wansink, loved musicians. We would rehearse in the unheated club during the day with Dick supplying us endless cups of horrendously strong coffee. At night, musicians--both emerging and some of Holland's greatest players--would play until 1:00 a.m. On occasion, after Dick kicked out the general populous, he'd lock the doors and let us musicians jam

and party until 4:00 a.m. The police would ultimately rap on the door, but that was just protocol. The jamming continued after they

So, this trip last December was a walk down Memory Lane--a persistent itch that wouldn't leave me however many years went by. I found many of my old musical buddies in December. Being with them again and

Tanika Charles

For this year's Women's Blues Revue, Soul will meet Blues. Another worthy addition to the roster of featured performers is Tanika Charles. She entered the international music scene in 2017, and has been on an ascending trajectory since. She was just awarded the Polaris Music Prize's first-ever artist residency for her latest album, *The Gumption* (released May 10th, 2019). For this edition of Notes & Quotes, Tanika Charles offers her thoughts on her newest release, her music, and the upcoming Women's Blues Revue.

On the back of winning the Polaris Music Prize's first residency, the release of *The Gumption* last spring, and being on tour to support the album, Charles was asked what she thinks it is about the newest offering in particular that has brought her current success. She offers this;

"You create, you record, and then you release; and you hope to connect – and you're proud of it no matter what happens. I'm not sure what it is about this album in particular – it's hard to say. Maybe it's timing, maybe

it's the fact that I took a much more hands-on approach in the studio. I just had to embrace being in the studio and really embody the music, and I think I did it more for this album than any of the other studio work I've done before."

For those who want to know the details of the Polaris Prize's residency, the winner (Tanika) will have a five-day residency at Studio Bell in Calgary. Charles will have full access to the studio facility, as well as a vast array of instruments. The work from the residency will then be recorded and pressed on vinyl (courtesy of Lixar). The residency starts in January of 2020.

Knowing that Charles is classified as an artist whose sound is firmly rooted in the genre of Soul, she is described as someone who creates classic Soul music but uses modern production values. The question resulting from this is whether she is seeing the Soul genre re-emerge on a more contemporary level. She offers this thoughtful reply:

"I feel like Soul music is very consistent. That old school Mowtown feel that I'm trying to achieve will be around for a long time. It has always been consistent, and I think it will always stay that way. If you go to Europe, it's absolutely prevalent. It's everywhere in Europe, and people want to hear it. I think it depends on where you are in the World as

to whether or not you see that prevalence."

Since her international debut, Tanika Charles has added eight countries to her tour outside of Canada. When asked what people can expect to experience at one of her live performances, she says;

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

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To Chiles Corner. Long-time volunteer Zoe Chilco is in the spotlight this month. Despite recent health challenges that she discusses frankly below, she is still making music (she just released her 10th CD - now available from fumblingforchange@hotmail.com) and fighting the good fight. Here's an update from one of TBS' most beloved volunteers.



Exactly six months ago trouble jumped on me. I didn't see it hiding behind that tree; didn't ever expect to be 'buried alive in the blues'. Bad enough cancer, but then the 'immunotherapy' drug I was given made it all a thousand times worse, causing heart inflammation, muscle destruction in my whole body, no breath in my lungs, and a cracking voice that sounds like I'm 110 years old.

Da blues big time. Good thing I've listened to a lot of songs, covering a

lot of misery, with all those troubles transformed to beautiful music, putting problems in perspective.

Oh, I hate this situation, I'm not trying to pretend, but it's my life now, and having the blues is part of life. Singing about it is healing. I'll be damned if I'm going to stop singing or living or planning another big night with some of the great musicians I have met over the years.


Starting back in the late 80's, when I first went to the Black Swan for the Saturday afternoon blues sessions; the Clinton, where I met Brian Blain, just arrived from Montreal, or Jerome Godboo, in from Ottawa. Chris Whiteley at Albert's Hall, and where later I was inspired to write my first blues song when Danny Marks announced a contest at the Twelfth Fret guitar workshop and the speaker talked about the pick-up first being born. Of course, I made it a lament about a different kind of pick-up (and that song later was voted a listener favourite in Germany - but that was a few years later.) I had bought my first LP waaaaay back in high school - Jimmy Reed, a favourite album I still have - but it had been a while, and I was rediscovering those late-night sounds I had loved, broadcast across Lake Ontario via American radio stations.

From that rekindled interest, I was in - big time. I joined the Toronto Blues Society, went to performances and festivals, and started performing myself with my own blues band. I volunteered for events, then for the local radio station in Haliburton, Ontario, hosting the first blues show in that region and continuing until the end of July, 2018, interviewing various luminaries, learning and listening to the wide range of blues styles. Met James Cotton, a sweetheart. Blues was a huge part of my life, and the immense roster of musicians I met through TBS and the 'circuit' were people that have remained in my life, as inspiration and as friends.

The blues is in my soul, and although activities, including volunteering, have been curtailed by my inability to travel outside of my little room at home, or my rounds of hospital visits, the music continues to give me strength, and people I've met through the blues continue to contact and support me, helping me through the Ry Cooder kind of trouble that somehow did fool me.

"Don't Turn Your Back", as John Mayall sang. And Muddy Waters says you can't be "Standin' 'Round Cryin'". I could use some Johnny Laws' "Bad Bad Whiskey", but I'm not supposed to drink. Dang!!



He burst onto the scene with one of Toronto's seminal R&B bands,

Mandala with Domenic Troiano and Whitey Glan and went on to play and record with Bush, Lou Reed, Alice Cooper, Parliament Funkadelic and a few blues bands along the way. He formed the Lincolns in 1979 and they became a fixture on the Toronto R&B scene for decades. Also inducted at the same time was Bon Jovi's quitarist Phil X, another Mississauga native (who knew?). 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




Big Dave McLean Pocket Full of Nothin' Black Hen

As our first bluesman made a member of the Order of Canada, Big Dave McLean's new album was highly anticipated. It turns out that it is the first one devoted almost entirely to his own songs. His versions of other people's songs have always been a treat but we now have this new facet of his career. He wants us to know that it's not a straight-ahead blues album, although truth be told, it's not that much different from his earlier ones. Part of the reason for this is that multi-instrumentalist Steve Dawson is the producer once again. Big Dave has a horn section this time and it's used to good effect on the rocking opener "Songs of the Blues", where Big Dave answers the question of why he loves the blues. A blast of rage at a bully is something different for the usually easy-going Big Dave but that bully gets an earful in "Don't Lay That Stuff on Me", driven along by Dawson's electric slide. A slow blues called "Backwards Fool" sees Big Dave on harmonica in a song about a particularly hapless fellow, with solos from banjo, trumpet & sax. "All Day Party" is a stop time jump blues opus with a wailing horn section. There are a couple of covers and **IB Lenoir**'s "Voodoo Music" is one of them - a great groove, with Dawson on tremolo guitar. "Baby (You're Driving Me Crazy)" has Big Dave on lead cigar box guitar on an attractive horn-less uptempo rocker. He always does a Muddy Waters song and this time it's an atmospheric "Just to be with You" and a fine version it is. "You've Been Told" is a lovely acoustic song about another man attempting to muscle in on his girl. Big Dave is on his


National, Dawson picks a fine solo, there's great piano & tasty horns, it's a keeper. The best song here, though, is the first single, a tuneful tribute to his home called "Manitoba Mud". He should get the key to the province for this one. He ends with a plea for optimism in the face of misfortune, "There Will Always be a Change". It fits very well with the sentiments expressed in "Manitoba Mud". The band that Dawson assembled deserves special kudos: Gary Craig on drums, Jeremy Holmes on bass, Chris Gestrin on keys, Malcolm Aiken on trumpet, Jerry Cook on baritone and Dominic Conway on tenor. Big Dave's web site is at www.blackhenmusic.com and it shows him staying out west for now.



Myles Goodwyn and Friends of the Blues 2 Linus

Myles Goodwyn has been busy: celebrating the 50th Anniversary of his band April Wine at the Ex in August, an appearance with his blues band at the Southside Shuffle and now with the release of his second blues album. Friends of the Blues 2 does carry on from the first volume in format with a star-filled list of Friends but has even better songs than that **IUNO-nominated album.** Most of the songs feature Russ Billard on keys, JR Smith on drums and Bruce Dixon on bass. They supply excellent support for Goodwyn and his cast of Friends. Special mention should be made of Reeny Smith and Lisa MacDougall as these two wonderful singers supply background vocals on many of the songs. The opener is a rocking delight: in "Hip Hip", Goodwyn recalls his introduction to the blues travelling through the states as a young man, name checking Buddy Guy and with an absolutely superb piano part played by Kenny "Blues Boss" Wayne. A creative arrangement graces the Womack's "All Over Now", making it rather different from the Stones' version you might remember. This one has a solid

harp solo from Mike "Shrimp Daddy" Reid who hasn't been heard from much since his move to the east, "You Got it Bad" channels Sonny and Brownie in a well-sung leaving song featuring Matt Andersen on acoustic guitar and Dewey Reeds on harmonica. "Fish Tank Blues" is built on an especially raunchy slide guitar part by Halifax guitarist Will Van Hansolo but little else. "Daddy Needs New Shoes" is a great little rocker featuring Jack Semple on guitar and John Campbelljohn on slide - Daddy is sending the wife out to work. "Being Good" starts with a slow introduction by Angel Forrest before the band kicks in with Goodwyn's verse. Angel returns and Martin Davidson gets a nice sax solo - a marvelous duet performance. "I Love my Guitar" is exactly what it says: no guests, just Goodwyn celebrating and playing. His romping "Help Me Baby", is a jump blues that features Joe Murphy on harp and Bill Stevenson on piano, Montreal's Steve Segal solos on electric guitar. The acoustic "When Your Ship Came In (I Was at the Airport Drinking) features Jack de Keyzer on bottleneck and Sherman Doucette on harmonica - our narrator has a problem. "I Saw Someone That Wasn't There (And it Was You)" has David Gogo as the featured lead quitarist - his partner is long gone but not for him. Goodwyn's Friends all contribute to making topflight albums for you to listen to at home but the fine players from the Maritimes he brings with him for live shows are special too. You can see, and hear, for yourself at The Revival Bar on November 15. The official release date is October 25 and his web site is www.mylesgoodwyn. com.



Jennis The Mirror Self

The name Jennis combines Jen Gillmor and Dennis Gaumond. Gillmor is a veteran of our Indie scene and Gaumond is a veteran Guelph-based guitarist with several pre-Jennis releases in his discography. Gaumond writes the songs, handles the lead vocals and plays various guitars. Gillmor sings harmony vocals and provides many of the sounds that make this band unique: cello, didgeridoo, flute, electric bass, jaw harp and something called a wazinator. They have now added **Tom Wolf**, who also appeared on 2014's The Current, on drums & percussion plus some guests as well. Gaumond avoids the relationship wars in his lyrics, preferring instead to sing about more intellectual pursuits.


The album's title comes from the song "Sneak Past the Mirror" which deals with looking in the mirror, seeing yourself as a child and taking an inventory on your life so far. That's them as children and adults on the album's cover. The opener though is "You Never Know", a pleasing reggae-styled plea to treat the future with optimism. It also introduces the album's main theme of being aware of what's really important. A bluesy "Go Viral" deals with our world of constant change. "Wide Awake" points out that we are no longer fooled by much that's on the mass media or in Hollywood movies or in politician's speeches, a theme further pursued on the anti-consumerism promoted in "Too Much Stuff". This latter one features some fine harp from Gaumond. "Prison for Myself" describes a life for those who aren't wide awake. "There's Only Love" deals perceptively with various losses, sensory and otherwise, always finding a way to cope and concluding with the title. Citing the stories of various oppressed peoples, "Family Tree" is a well-written plea for togetherness. Gillmor gets the lead vocal for a very good song about an abused woman running away, "Running with the Wolves".

Cécile Doo-Kingué guests on lead guitar on this one. Two live songs end the program with a jazzy, almost instrumental "Mountaintop" and Bob Marley's "Get Up Stand Up", for just banjo and cello, with Jen Gillmor and Dennis Gaumond adding verses that refer to and reinforce the themes of the previous songs. With backing ranging from acoustic duos to full electric blues bands, with well-written, thought provoking lyrics and memorable melodies, this is one enjoyable album. They rode The Current to a nomination in the New Artist category for the MBAs, this one should lead to more nominations.

Arsen Shomakhov Rain City Blues Rain City Blues

Arsen Shomakhov's last album, Dynamic, got him a nomination for New Artist in the Maple Blues Awards. For his new one, this Russian-born Vancouver resident went to one of the hottest studios in blues today, Kid Andersen's Greaseland in San Jose CA. Andersen is the superb lead guitar player for Rick Estrin & The Nightcats but here he wisely leaves the guitar playing to Shomakhov. Instead, he handles bass, keyboards and background



vocals. While sticking close to traditional blues themes, Shomakhov has come up with some attractive ways of expressing them. The toe-tapping opener, "Full Time Lover", departs from the usual in that our narrator has too many women in his life, he wants just one. Guesting on harp is Aki Kumar, who hails from India but plays pure Chicago. Much faster is "No More!", a slice of bluesabilly promising to party less hard - he may even mean it. Andersen tears it up on piano. "Rain City Blues" channels Elmore James' "Dust my Broom" in fine fashion. He's fallen for a woman who's taken everything he has. "Sitting on the Fence" is a tuneful song on the advantages of not making a decision with some useful examples to prove the point. His guitar skills get shown off in four instrumentals, of which the concluding slide workout "Hello, Little Bird" is the best. The web site is www. arsenshomakhov.ca.

Toronzo Cannon The Preacher, The Politician or The Pimp Alligator/Fontana North/Universal

Toronzo Cannon is as good a representation of Chicago blues today as you're likely to find: born and raised in the projects on the south side near Theresa's Lounge, playing in blues bands behind local players **Tommy McCracken**, **Wayne**

Baker Brooks, L.V. Banks and Joanna Connor, the singer/quitarist formed his own band in 2003. He sees a Chicago that few people see because he's CTA bus driver. That perspective has informed his songs through five albums now. As you might have guessed from the album title, he doesn't shy away from social commentary. In a contemporary R&B setting, "The Preacher, The Politician and The Pimp" points out the similarities of each in modern society with unerring accuracy. A fast boogie groove underlies his definition of the way things are done in "The Chicago Way". This is the first single from the album, the name of his last album and the name of his band now too. The high cost of medical "Insurance" is more of a traditional blues, with Billy Branch on harmonica. Label



prez Bruce Iglauer gets to play the feecharging doctor. It's not all serious though, "Stop Me When I'm Lying" has a series of vignettes, for some of which he might not be lying. He has a horn section on this one and Roosevelt Purifoy gets some solo time on piano. "The Silence of my Friends" is a powerful song, Cannon bemoaning the fact that his friends stay silent when someone says something that's plainly unacceptable. He picks up his National Steel for "The First 24", another powerful song comparing his life to that of his ancestors who lived through slavery and lynchings. He has a couple of more humorous songs including "Ordinary Woman" but concludes with the most ambitious of his serious ones."I'm Not Scared (of the heartache)" features guest vocalists in various family settings: Lynne Jordan as an abused wife, Cedric Chaney as a gay son and Maria Luz Carballo as a recent refugee. Cannon lets them tell their stories with former employer Joanna Connor questing on slide. Cannon's voice and guitar are highlighting subjects that need to be addressed and doing it the Chicago way. seeing them play was like a wonderful dream--a reminder of those halcyon, carefree, music-filled times.

Big band and swing jazz still seem to take centre stage in Holland and it's come full circle to become a craze again as it has in most of the world. Dancers flock to the clubs, clothed in suits and dresses, standing outside during the breaks to smoke and speak English to one another. There's also a big modern jazz movement, dominated by the students being cranked out by the Dutch conservatories. You can hear serious composers and players working out at Amsterdam's famous Bimhuis. As is typical of the esprit in Europe (and why jazz and blues musicians have always converged there), Bimhuis packs the room with standing room only--actually sitting room, as young people sit cross-legged on the floor, shoulder to shoulder, devout and enraptured. Don't be surprised if a draft is dropped on you if you're unknown and ask to sit in at the Bimhuis. The smaller clubs, though, are usually laid back and welcoming. In Leiden, there's a jam session every Monday night at 9:00 at De Twee Spiegeltjes. In Amsterdam, there's one Mondays at Cafe NEL from 9:00-1:00 and every Sunday from 4:30-7:30 at de Engelbevaarder. Farther south, in Breda, there's a welcoming venue called Het Hijgend Hert (The Panting Deer) that has jam sessions every Sunday afternoon.

Do put The Netherlands on your list of blues destinations. You'll find steeped tradition in Dutch blues bands such as "Stackhouse", led by harmonica player and singer Machiel Meijers, and "Barrelhouse", featuring vocalist Tineke Schoemaker. Barrelhouse is still going strong after 45 years with the original band members.

Probably the most interesting blues scene in Holland is The Holland International Blues Festival. Musician Harry Muskee (1941-2011) put a population 800 village called Grolloo on the map when he moved to a farm there early in his career and "brought the blues to Holland". Now each June, Grolloo is transformed from agrarian village to blues mecca.

After two and a half weeks of reuniting with my beloved Dutch stomping grounds and friends, I set out to explore the blues scene in Copenhagen. I'd always wanted to go there. It turned out to be a star-crossed trek, but I gathered a lot of intel along the way. I'll be filling you in next month, so be sure to check your next issue of Maple Blues!

"At my shows, in addition to performing songs, I like to tell stories - there's a lot to tell. I like to tell a brief story about a song I've written - why I wrote it, or what it's about. There's a brief explanation, a bit of comedy, and a bit of banter. It's an inclusive show where anyone who is there can have a great time."

With the picture painted of what a Tanika Charles show is like to experience, the next obvious question is about the Women's Blues Revue. When asked what it feels like to be one of the featured artists, and what she is looking forward to the most, Charles' answer echoes answers given by other featured artists;

"This is my second time being a part of the Women's Blues Revue. The first time was absolutely incredible, and I expect that this time will be just as incredible. I am grateful and very excited about it. Playing music and having fun with these super talented women is amazing. I'm really looking forward to it!"

The Women's Blues Revue is an annual event, presented by the Toronto Blues Society, which features an all-woman, all-star group of musicians. 




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
