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### **Sunday, September 12**

*Acts 5:34-42 And every day in the temple and at home they did not cease to teach and proclaim Jesus as the Messiah. (v.42 NRSV)*

In the time of Covid-19 lockdown, we found new ways to teach and proclaim the word of God. I was used to using the Mission St. Clare app on my tablet to lead me through daily morning and evening prayer. I noticed that the app was linking to live and recorded video services across the United States and abroad. I enjoyed sampling the services offered. My home parish quickly adapted, and our priests lead morning prayer with a homily six days a week for six months on YouTube. This proved to be an essential tool for coping with fear and isolation for many in the parish. As live services resumed with restrictions, those needing to stay at home could watch the video feed from the Sunday Holy Eucharist. A pandemic may alter the way in which we worship, but it cannot prevent us from worshiping our Lord.

**Friday, September 17**

Sometimes the third try is the charm. Two captains of fifty men each are sent by the king of Samaria to tell the prophet Elijah to come down from the hilltop. One after the other delivers the message to Elijah that he has to come down. Each captain and his company are smote in response. Finally, the third captain of fifty does something different.
