

The Ruffled Mango

From A Child of Good Shepherd: A Church Whose Soul is Generosity By Kathy Wright

I just had the privilege of interviewing Becky Ledford Van Gorder about her experiences growing up as the daughter of one of the 4 founding families of Good Shepherd Episcopal Church. I had a wonderful time hearing about the early years! I asked Becky to share how she feels now about this long association with Good Shepherd. Her reply was simple and profound: "It gives me so much pleasure to be among the Saints of this church; to see how it has grown from a small seed into a Living tree." She was talking about all of us — then and now, and who will come later.

Becky talked about how early on they met in people's homes on Sunday afternoons. The whole family would come. They would worship as a group and then the hosts would serve some coffee or tea, and a special dessert. The grown-ups would sit and talk, and the kids would go outside to play. We still do it now - worship, eat, and talk. We have deep roots at Good Shepherd in how we do Sundays. It is not much different now.



After some time and with the addition of a couple of new families, the group began to seek out a place to meet that was larger. They found rented space and continued to grow. There was an established church in Murphy – Messiah – so folks from Hayesville traveled occasionally to Messiah to worship. The priests, seminarians, and Lay Readers traveled to Hayesville occasionally to touch base and offer support. It was the association with Messiah that firmed up the connection to the Diocese.

As Good Shepherd continued to grow the congregation began to talk about building their own church. With approval of Diocese, Rufus Vick located three tenths of an acre on Meyers Chapel Road West. The new 960 square foot cinder block building housed one large room, a small kitchen with a serving counter, a unisex lavatory, and a small room that could be used for vesting and meetings.

Becky remembers this building fondly. The room was furnished with gifts from individuals and other churches. Becky speaks with great awe of the kindness of those other churches.

The Diocese was also generous with a loan and a grant to purchase and build the building. The Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd became a Mission Congregation of The Church of the Messiah. They did many things together. Becky remembers with great fondness the Summer Youth Program at Messiah. The churches also had an annual picnic together at the lake.


"Care of Good Shepherd was exclusively volunteer," Becky said. The women of the church each took a month, in rotation, when they would be responsible for cleaning the entire building, making sure the altar linens were clean and ready to use, provide flowers, and anything else they could do to keep the church a shining testament to God.

Once a month, the church was converted into a Parish Hall. Pews were pushed back, and tables and chairs were set up for the monthly Potluck Supper. Everyone brought their favorite dish and a feast was enjoyed by all. When the last morsel was eaten, everyone would pitch in and clean up, put the tables and chairs away, uncover the altar, and put the pews back in place ready for the next service. Does this sound familiar?

There was a Church Bazaar that later grew into a big 3-day Country Fare. Betsi Wilson remembers Becky working inside the semi-trailer storage unit during the early Country Fare. The Bazaar/Fare included a bakery that had a good county wide reputation. Early on, the ECW ladies would do needlework during their monthly meetings to sell at the Bazaar, and later there was a fashion show displaying contributed clothing preceding the Fare. I quote Becky: "People were generous in their giving, and good hearted, and the church kept growing."

Toward the end of our conversation, we grew philosophical: So many homeless and hungry people. Good Shepherd has given to our community a food bank, the first in Clay County. We have worked with and contributed to the homeless shelter, the only shelter in a 150 mile radius. We took a leadership role in founding DeSoto Square and are still on the board. We are now supporting a Dental Clinic for Children and have weekly breakfasts for school youth during the school year. We are working with others to address housing insecurity.

Becky says: "There is so much to do. There are answers. We can find them. We will work hard to make it happen."



Influenza, COVID and RSV (Respiratory Syncytial) Season is here!



For Prevention-

Wash your hands! Utilize Hand sanitizer. Avoid touching your face.

Increase air movement, via purifiers, open windows and outside time.

Recognize crowd size and close quarters. Masking is an option.

Consider receiving the new Covid vaccine when you are getting your annual flu shot. They can be given the same day. Have you had the Pneumococcal vaccines?

For Exposures-

Monitor yourself.

Please consider others if you have been exposed to illness. Increase your prevention measures. If you have cold symptoms, wait 3-5 days before home testing for Covid. Testing earlier than that may not detect the virus, giving a false negative.

For Infected-

Stay at home out of consideration for others and yourself. Rest.

You are especially contagious while febrile and until 24 hours after your fever is normal without taking medication to reduce the fever.

Contact you health provider to see if medication is indicated to moderate your illness, if you test positive. CDC is not recommending a negative test to resume normal activities. Masking is recommended for at least 5 days after you are well enough to be around others because you are still "shedding the virus" Please be mindful of others.




