Making Choices

"But if serving the Lord seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served beyond the Euphrates, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you are living. But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."

- Joshua 24:15

The people of God have come into the land. Moses has died, it is a new day, and Joshua is their new leader. It has been a forty year journey from Egypt through the wilderness and now across the Jordan to their new promised home. They have come to Shechem, that ancient city where



long ago their ancestor Abram build an altar and first called upon the name of God in this land that God had showed him. Joshua and the people of the exodus have come here to renew the covenant God had established with father Abraham. Joshua recounts for them the mighty deeds of God in delivering them from slavery in Egypt and defeating the enemies that they encountered along this journey. Now, it is time to make a choice. It is time to re-up, to recommit, to rededicate themselves to the covenant God made with them, or to make another choice.

There is always a choice. Joshua proclaims that he and his household choose to serve the Lord. Others may find that undesirable or at least less desirable than some other option like serving themselves or serving another god. Martin Luther is credited with say "Whatever your heart clings to and confides in, that is really your god." Accordingly, whatever our hearts cling to and confide in, that may be what we serve. It may be wealth or desire for more wealth, accomplishments, intellect, and reputation, some movement or philosophy of life, or some other human leader to whom we affix our hearts and dreams. There are many gods to choose from. The choice is made not once, but repeatedly whenever a choice is made. In our choosing, who we will serve?

Recognizing all that God promised them has come true and all that has been given them has come from God, Joshua chooses where his heart will cling and confide. I imagine there were moments for Joshua, as there are for all people, when the temptation and opportunity came to choose another god. Covenant renewal is necessary because we fail. Covenant renewal is necessary because we want to begin again. Everyday is a chance for covenant renewal, for making another choice, maybe a different choice, and then practicing that choice in who and how we serve.

As we enter this stewardship season, I ask that we all consider our choices. Who is the God we serve? How do we allocate our personal and communal time, talent, and treasure and what do our choices say about the God we serve?

Good Shepherd Welcomes New Music Director

Good Shepherd is delighted to welcome Teresa Lemaire as our new music director. Teresa brings a wealth of experience, a joyful spirit, and deep passion for both teaching and performing music.



Teresa lived in Atlanta prior to 2020 but also owned a cabin in Murphy. Just as she was preparing to rent it out—new mattresses, stocked supplies, even 62 rolls of toilet paper—the world shut down. Instead of finding renters, she decided to ride out the pandemic in her cabin, and she hasn't looked back since. "I love it here," she says, "and cannot believe I ever sat in three-hour traffic!"

Music runs in Teresa's family. Her mother, Janice, still lives in Woodstock, Georgia, and is a talented musician herself. Her late father was a flautist who played an important role in shaping Teresa's early musical journey.

Teresa holds a Bachelor of Music from Southern Methodist University in Dallas and a Master of Music from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. She works as a music teacher and freelance performer, playing at weddings, parties, and services of all kinds. She especially loves teaching middle school students.

Over the years, Teresa has served Baptist, Methodist, Lutheran, Catholic, and Unitarian Universalist congregations, and she continues to sing and play flute at Immaculate Heart of Mary in Hayesville. At Good Shepherd, she is excited to work with a choir that she already describes as "fantastic."

"You care about the music and about each other," she says. "The welcome I have received is so warm. Thank you." Her goals for the choir include building confidence in reading and sight singing, always keeping service to the music as the highest priority.

Outside of church, Teresa's love of music continues to flourish. She has a special passion for Brazilian *chorinho*, an early 20th-century jazz style that combines technical skill, improvisation, and community. "Music is universal," she says, recalling her time making friends in Brazil despite speaking only limited Portuguese. She also enjoys singing in different languages, which she finds to be a wonderful way to learn them.

Locally, Teresa plays flute and tenor saxophone in the Tristate Community Band and participates in productions at The Peacock Playhouse.

We are grateful to have Teresa sharing her gifts with us, and we look forward to the ways her leadership will inspire and enrich our worship.



The Marvelous Medical Loan Closet

We all experience times in life when we get a little banged up, worn out, something breaks... and the ordinary tasks of life are suddenly not so easy to achieve. All kinds of physical helpers have been invented to make daily functioning a little easier. When you get well and you no longer need them, what do you do with them?

A couple of years ago Helga Reaves helped establish a Medical Loan Closet in an unused office in the undercroft at Good Shepherd, modeling it on a much larger operation at First Methodist in Franklin. In fact, Mary Williams from that organization recently gave us two transfer chairs when we had none, for which we are deeply grateful.

All that is required to use the closet is to check the inventory to find the equipment you need and then fill out a simple form indicating what you borrowed and when. According to Helga, you will be amazed at what you can find – crutches, canes, shower seats, bed rails, potty seats, rolling walkers, knee scooters, ice machines, even bed pans!



Helga is anxious to give away some items that require too much space, for example, extra rolling walkers. Nearly all items are in excellent shape and fully functional. There is a motorized scooter looking for a permanent home with anyone who can find batteries for it.

Is the Closet only for use by Good Shepherd members? She says No; friends and neighbors are welcome to use the closet as well, as long as their name and number are on the form so we know where everything is.

Thank you, Helga, for initiating a ministry which has helped many Good Shepherd members and friends, and will continue to give service as long as generous donors continue to recycle unused medical supplies through Good Shepherd's marvelous medical closet!
