Pastor John’s Reflection



People of Peace,

In his book *Everything Must Change*, Christian writer Brian McLaren writes, people and societies operate out of a framing story, a story that gives them direction, values, vision, and inspiration by providing a framework for their lives. He suggests, the most common framing story in our world today is deeply destructive to our global community—it’s about greed, materialism, environmental abuse, and power in violence. It’s the same framing story held by the Roman empire in Jesus’ day. But Jesus confronts that framing story and offers with his life an alternative one—the kingdom of God. What’s it about?

- + It’s not about violence and worldly power—they don’t ultimately prevail.
- + It’s not about competition, but community.
- + It’s not about the love of power, but the power of love.
- + It’s a vision of peace and justice for all, and forgiveness, and serving the other.

In Jesus’ kingdom, the king gives all he is, his whole self, for all people, opening his arms in death to embrace the world in love without condition, without reservation. It’s ironic, at the center of the framing story Jesus brings is his suffering and death on the cross. Sounds at first like weakness, failure, and an utter waste, but through the eyes of faith, it’s the power of God revealed for life, salvation, and peace.

That’s the mystery of Lent and Holy Week we’re invited to explore. Jesus invites his followers (us!) to let his framing story shape our lives—his way of loving, serving, dying and rising to new life in God.

Lent is here. Lent is a season of 40 days leading to Easter Sunday. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday February 18 (worship at 7 pm). Lent is a journey with Jesus to his death on the cross, and so we begin by reflecting on our own mortality and sinfulness and God’s deep love for us in Jesus and God’s power for life and forgiveness over death and sin. You’re invited to practice the three disciplines of Lent—prayer, fasting, and almsgiving (acts of service). Prayer connects us with God in conversation, fasting helps us give up what distracts us from a deeper relationship with God, and almsgiving helps us take on what brings us closer to God and others through service. When we intentionally walk with Jesus to the cross in Lent, the Easter promise of resurrection is much more meaningful! Here are some ways to make your Lenten journey richer:

- + **Midweek Gatherings in Lent.** Five Wednesdays in Lent beginning February 25, come to a soup supper (6 pm), intergenerational activity of prayer and service (6:30 pm), and Holden Evening Prayer or children’s faith activities (7 pm). Worship will be a rest stop on the journey, a time to pause and contemplate the goodness and love of God for us. We incorporate all three Lenten disciplines—prayer (worship), fasting (simple supper), and acts of service.
- + **Sunday Morning Adult and Older Youth Class.** During the Faith Education Hour (9:45-10:45 am on Sundays), we explore the six church seasons (a different season each Sunday) and how God meets us in the seasons of our lives on our journey of faith. Prayer, confession, reflection, and action will be a pattern we use together.
- + **Lent Devotional Resources, New Peace Devotional Book, Christ in Our Home Daily Devotional.** These are resources to use regularly on the Lenten journey.
- + **Centering Prayer.** On Saturdays from 12-1 pm, the sanctuary will be open for a time of quiet centering prayer for our community, as we find solace in the grounding presence of God in this time of anxiety and heaviness.
- + **Micro Actions.** Commit to take on some of the micro actions suggested by our Anti-Racism Work Group. These are everyday actions each of us can take to make a difference in the fearful environment in our country.
- + **Holy Week Worship.** Let the story of Jesus’ passion resonate in your life as we gather to worship on Palm/Passion Sunday (March 29), Maundy Thursday (April 2), Good Friday (April 3), and Easter Sunday (April 5).

My prayer for us this Lent is that the framing story of Jesus will shape our lives in community, and that God will give us strength, courage, and energy to live together into God’s vision of peace for our world!

Youth Ministry

A Season of Becoming: A Reflection on Youth Ministry at Peace

This Lent with our youth has felt like a quiet, beautiful awakening. We are entering a rhythm of listening and gathering, making an effort in discovering not just who our young people are as individuals, but who they are becoming together.

From Table Talk to Vision

The heart of this season’s planning took root on Sunday, January 25, when we gathered at Pam Asadi’s home for an Idea-Generating Luncheon. Between bites of shared food, our youth began to articulate how Peace can truly show up for them.

We looked outward, too, discussing needs of our Hilltop neighbors and how our collective passions might meet those needs. There is a burgeoning excitement about what we can do through **Thrive International** and upcoming **SLAM Trips**. Whether it’s through new Bible studies, worship nights, or regional Lutheran gatherings, the youth are discerning a collective identity that is rooted in both faith and action.



The Power of Shared Stories

We saw a glimpse of that collective identity during our Youth Dessert Walk. There is some special mystery in the unity of a drive together from house to house. As families opened their doors, our youth received stories and sweet treats. By sharing desserts and hearing about the traditions that ground different households, our young people experienced the depth of history and love that exists within the Peace community. Those miles walked and stories heard have helped knit this group together, providing a foundation of belonging that will support everything we do next.

Looking Toward the Horizon

As the Lenten shadows give way to Easter light, the momentum from Pam’s luncheon is already taking shape. We are moving into a season of "Passion-to-Mission" projects—initiatives born directly from the hearts of the youth. We are looking forward to:

- **Local Service:** Deepening our footprint in the Hilltop through intentional neighborhood presence.
- **Worship & Study:** Developing a youth-led worship night and a consistent rhythm of spiritual practices that resonate with their daily lives.
- **Global Connection:** Finalizing plans for regional engagement and our continued partnership with Thrive International.

This is a season of discovery, of gifts, of community, and of calling. I am continually moved by the way these young people are growing into the people God is shaping them to be. Thank you for your prayers, your open doors, and your constant encouragement. Grace and peace,

Community Engagement and Outreach

Dear People of Peace,

As we enter the sacred season of Lent, I am reminded that this is a time of both honest reflection and renewed commitment. Lent invites us to slow down, to examine our hearts, and to realign our lives with God’s call toward justice, compassion, and love. It is a season that does not rush past suffering but sits with it, trusting that God is still at work, forming, healing, and preparing something new.

This Lent, I am deeply grateful for the work unfolding through our Affordable Housing Feasibility Team. Their faithful commitment reflects a theology that takes flesh, one that understands housing not merely as shelter, but as dignity, stability, and hope. In a time when so many families face uncertainty, this team has leaned into the hard questions with courage, wisdom, and collaboration. Their work reminds us that Lent is not only about what we give up, but also about what we choose to take on, the call to advocate, to plan thoughtfully, and to imagine a future where all can thrive. This is holy work, and I am thankful for every person offering their gifts, expertise, and prayer to this effort.



I am also filled with gratitude for the blessing of Peace Café. What began as a vision rooted in hospitality and healing continues to grow as a sacred gathering space for community. Peace Café embodies the spirit of Lent by creating room for honest conversation, mutual care, and shared nourishment, both physical and spiritual. It is a place where barriers are lowered, stories are honored, and relationships are formed across difference. In a world that often feels fragmented, Peace Café stands as a living reminder that God



meets us at the table, inviting us into deeper connection with one another.

As we look ahead to the rest of this year, I am encouraged by the ways people are leaning in to ministry with renewed energy and purpose. There is a quiet but powerful movement happening, folks showing up, offering their time, their voices, and their faith. Lent teaches us that transformation often begins in the wilderness, in moments of sacrifice and discernment. Yet it also assures us that we do not walk this road alone. Together, we are learning how to be a community that listens more deeply, serves more faithfully, and trusts more fully in God’s leading.

My prayer for us this Lent is that we remain grounded in hope, even as we confront hard realities. May we continue to see God at work in affordable housing conversations, in the life giving presence of Peace Café, and in every person who feels called to step forward in ministry this year. May this season shape us into people who carry resurrection hope, not just for ourselves, but for our neighbors and our wider community.

Wednesday Evenings in Lent



Starting **Feb. 25, for 5 Wednesdays until March 25**, here’s the schedule:

6:00 pm	Simple Soup Supper
6:30 pm	Intergenerational Activity of Prayer and Service
7:00 pm	Holden Evening Prayer (adults & youth), Faith Activity (kids)
7:30 pm	Depart in peace...

Simple Soup Supper: At 6 pm, we will gather in the multipurpose room to share fellowship and a simple supper, a modified fast for Lent. **To help with the supper:** Sign up at the Welcome Table to provide a soup and bread one Wednesday. We also need folks to volunteer to host the meals.

Intergenerational Activity: At 6:30 pm, from the youngest to the eldest, we will join together in activities that help us reach out to our neighbors in prayer and service, concerned about those who are vulnerable. Here is the schedule

for the intergenerational activities:

Wednesday February 25. Activity: Prayer Walk. Groups will gather to walk together in the neighborhood, read scripture, and pray needs and thanksgivings.



Wednesday March 4. Activity: Micro Actions to Make a Difference. We will consider suggestions from our Anti-racism Work Group of micro actions for justice we can each take, make personal commitments for Lent, and do an action for justice together to support the vulnerable in our community.



Wednesday March 11. Activity: Learning How to Communicate with No Harm. We will learn about Retreat Home (a network of people and homes offering hospitality to those in need of temporary housing) and practice a short listening skill featured in Retreat Home's Trauma Informed Approach workshops.

Wednesday March 18. Activity: Supporting Immigrants and Refugees. We will learn about challenges faced by refugees and immigrants in Tacoma, pray for our immigrant neighbors, collect and sort Halal food items, and write cards to support Muslim families.

Coming soon: separate list of suggested Halal food items we’re collecting. (Food items due Sunday March 15 in the church office or kitchen refrigerator/freezer if perishable, or bring items March 18 evening.)

Wednesday March 25. Activity: Prayer Walk – Hilltop Neighborhood. Groups will gather to walk together in the neighborhood and pray for the Hilltop community.

Faith Activity for Kids: At 7 pm, children are invited to go on a **Journey of the Heart: Walking through Lent Together**. Children will learn and participate in activities as they hear the story of Jesus’ journey to the cross and resurrection and his deep love for us. Youth are invited to help children or go to the Holden Evening Prayer service.

Holden Evening Prayer: At 7 pm, adults and youth are invited to the sanctuary for a beautiful sung evening prayer service that originated at Holden Village, a Lutheran retreat center in the Cascade mountains. There will be an opportunity for candle-lighting and silent prayer. Come, quiet your hearts, and connect with God.



From the Church Council

Dear Peace Family,

Your 2026 Church Council is in place—nominated by the Nominating Committee last fall, voted into office at the Annual Congregational Meeting in December, and installed and blessed during worship in January. Our first meeting is January 20th and we'll soon begin planning our annual retreat. Now and throughout the year we're seeking to support the life and ministries of Peace with the help and guidance of God. Now and throughout the year we ask for you to pray for us as your council, for our staff, and for our whole community at Peace.

Maybe you're wondering what a church council is meant to do? Peace's Constitution gives us guidance on this. The council has "general oversight of the life and activities of this congregation, and in particular its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the Faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America." Among the specified duties of the council, a few stand out to me:

- The council takes a lead in stating the mission of the church and in long-range planning, and we're meant to evaluate the congregation's activities in light of our mission.
- We're encouraged to involve the whole Peace community in worship, learning, and service.
- We have a duty to maintain supportive relationships with the pastor(s) and staff.
- We're asked to promote peace and goodwill in our church, and we're meant to be part of fostering mutual understanding when there's conflict.

That's work we share as a whole council, and individual council members also relate to and support certain aspects of life at Peace such as worship, education, or stewardship.

You are invited to reach out to me as Council President, or to any member of council if there's something you'd like us to consider, or a concern you'd like us to include in prayer at a council meeting. We meet on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. Serving on council is meant to be just that, a service. As a council we discuss and vote on certain Peace business, but council meetings are also an opportunity for us to widen our knowledge of what's happening in the Peace community, to deepen our capacity to serve alongside the whole church, and to pray together as we try to know where God is leading. We welcome your guidance and encouragement, your questions and your prayers.

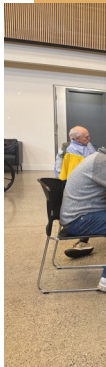
However, the end of the year made us say goodbye (for now) to the woman who fueled, orchestrated and transformed so much of women's ministry — Charissa Carroll.

Peace Community Center Update

As many of you know, Peace Community Center is working to complete a new strategic plan. Below are drafts of the Center’s new mission and values statements (along with our vision statement that has not been changed), and the proposed strategic priorities. If you have any questions, please reach out to a Center Board member.



MISSION: Peace Community Center, a faith-rooted, community-led organization, works alongside Hilltop youth and families to build pathways to stability, opportunity and housing security.

VISION: We envision a thriving Hilltop where youth and families belong, experience stability, and use their diverse gifts to shape a just and loving community.

VALUES:

Faith-Rooted Justice: We are guided by a faith that calls us to love our neighbors, pursue justice, cultivate hope and joy, and honor the dignity of every person. Our faith shapes why and how we work—creating a place of inclusion and belonging for all people, not exclusion or division.

Community Led Listening & Learning: We listen first, learn continuously, and adapt in accountability to the Hilltop community. Listening is an ongoing practice, not a phase.

Belonging & Place: We are rooted in the Hilltop and committed to cultivating spaces of belonging and joy across generations. We move at the speed of trust and build with relationships, not programs alone.

Collective Action & Partnership: We believe lasting change requires collaboration, mutuality, and shared leadership. We work alongside others, not above or apart.

Note: The Board will work in the near future to draft statements on how the Community Center will act based on the approved values.

STRATEGIC PRIORITIES: Please note that the following three priorities have been separated for clarity, but each intersect, interact, and build off one another. Each of the goals under the priorities have a period for focused development to reach specific targets, many of these goals (for example building partnerships) will have ongoing components to them once the time of period is complete.

Priority A: Strengthen and Develop Hilltop Partnerships

Why This Matters: Partnerships are the foundation of community impact and an integral part of the Center’s values. Peace Community Center exists in an ecosystem of non-profits, schools, businesses, and other organizations who are working to positively impact the community. We can have much greater impact when we work in collaboration rather than silos.

Outcome: A strong, foundational partnership with Peace Lutheran Church, strengthened connections with other Hilltop community partners, and long-term Hilltop residents are built as the foundation to building the Center’s new programs and their impact.

Priority B: Develop Programs and Services grounded in the relationship building outlined in Priority A and Peace Community Center’s New Mission, Vision and Values.

Why This Matters: Peace Community Center’s impact on the Hilltop community will be a direct result of the programs it develops, and they are developed alongside partners and the community it aims to serve.

Outcome: Peace Community Center has a strong working relationship with Peace Lutheran Church, neighborhood partners and community members to develop meaningful mission-aligned programming that positively impacts Hilltop young people and families. Programming is relevant to our community and those we serve both participate in programs and help to design them.

Priority C: Build Peace Community Center’s Capacity to Further Mission (Board, Culture, Fundraising)

Why This Matters: Creating a strong foundation to grow the organization’s new mission is critical to sustainable impact. Organizational culture, the board of directors, and fundraising efforts are three critical components for building a healthy organization on which programs can flourish.

Outcome: Hire an initial organization leader who has the experience to grow the organization’s programming and fundraising efforts and build the organization culture and collaborative partnerships with the Hilltop community. Strengthening the Board of Directors and its ability to fulfill its governance role in alignment with the organization’s new mission and values.
