PRAY FOR THE CCCC



RON HAMILTON, CCCC CONFERENCE MINISTER

The first Guiding Value of the CCCC is a "culture of believing prayer and intercession". We provide the annual CCCC Prayer Calendar to help us remember to pray for the ministry of the Conference. There are several key issues in the CCCC at this time that need our prayer support.

The proposed name change, introduced at the 2024 annual meeting, will be voted on at the 2025 meeting. An entire business session was devoted to this matter in 2024 and the same space will be given to this matter in 2025. The Board of Directors proposed a name change to "Centerpoint: A Biblical Congregational Conference" in April 2024. The leaders held two open forums prior to the 2024 annual gathering and one more at the gathering. There were two non-binding votes taken at the 2024 meeting.

The first vote was to change the name of the Conservative Congregational Christian Conference. This vote passed by acclamation. The second vote was to change the name of the Conservative Congregational Christian Conference to Centerpoint

Biblical Congregational Conference. This vote was approved by a ballot vote of 100 "yes" votes to 29 "no" votes, with one abstention. A proposal to amend the constitution to change the name was presented at the end of the business session. The proposed amendment will be voted on at the 2025 annual gathering. A two-thirds favorable vote of the delegates is required for adoption.

We ask you, as members of the Conference, to prayerfully consider this proposed name change. We have planned an extended business session on Wednesday, August 6, for this vote. We encourage member churches to discuss this matter with their members and instruct their appointed delegates how to vote on the proposed name change.

We also need to pray for the appointment of Rev. Dr. Marc Gauthier as the next Conference Minister. After a careful search process, the Board of Directors unanimously approved Marc as the nominee for this position. We need to pray for Marc and his wife, Christa, as they prepare for this new venture. They plan on relocating to Minnesota in September to serve in this important role.

It is also important for us to intercede for our member pastors and churches as they minister in the season of Lent, Holy Week and Easter. The Gospel message is summarized in 1 Corinthians 15.

"For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures...Thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." (1 Corinthians 15:3, 57)

This season provides many opportunities to proclaim the Gospel message in public services and in our private conversations. Let's join in prayer that the Gospel will bear much fruit and many lives will be transformed by the work of the Spirit.

We are pleased to announce the selection of Rev. Dr. Marc Gauthier as the proposed nominee for the next Conference Minister. The Search Committee began their work in mid-October to discern the Lord's candidate for our next Conference Minister. Much work was done in formulating a profile, setting benchmarks, and designing a strategy for engaging potential candidates. This process eventually led us to in-person interviews in Orlando, Florida, in early February. Follow-up interviews and "homework" assignments were conducted and assigned.

On Monday, March 3, the Search Committee unanimously recommended Marc as our Candidate of choice. The Board of Directors unanimously voted to recommend him as the nominee for the office of Conference Minister. It is with great joy, and a strong sense of God's leading, that we ask for your "affirmation" this August in Orlando, Florida.

Based on his doctoral research and almost thirty years of experience working with rising generations, this workshop will uncover the spiritual questions that each generation brings to uncover implications for our ministries.

CHURCH PLANTING BY THE AMERICAN HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY

Church planting is now one of the main priorities of the CCCC. This focus began in the late 1990s, so it is a fairly recent feature of this Conference, but it is not something that is new to Congregationalism as a whole. The nineteenth century in particular was a period when Congregational churches joined together in several great initiatives of starting new churches. Nineteenth century church planting by Congregationalists consisted of three distinct phases. The first, and largest, effort was starting new churches in the new towns on the expanding western frontier. The second was the establishment of churches among the former slaves in the southern states by the American Missionary Association. The third was an outreach to immigrants from non-English speaking countries. This article will focus on the work of the American Home Missionary Society on the western frontier.

Before a national home missionary society was founded, efforts to plant churches in the new settlements on the frontier were conducted by regional fellowships. As the western frontier was expanding dramatically it became clear that the separate and uncoordinated efforts of regional fellowships would not be sufficient for the task at hand. A national organization was needed. The American Home Missionary Society was established in 1826 as a national missionary association devoted to the spiritual needs of the new settlements to the west. Initially the AHMS was an interdenominational body, supported by Congregational, Presbyterian and Dutch Reformed churches, but as time went on it became predominantly Congregational.

The policy of the AHMS was to assist in the development of churches in the West by subsidizing them to the extent necessary to enable them to hire a full-time or even a part-time pastor. Churches were asked

to send in a membership application stating its location, membership, financial condition, with the name and credentials of the man it wanted to hire. Each congregation was expected to raise as much of the minister's salary as it could, and the Society supplemented this enough to give him a living wage.

The AHMS experienced phenomenal growth from the beginning. In its first year of operation the Society employed 169 missionaries in fifteen states with receipts of \$18,000. Within five years the numbers had grown to 506 missionaries and receipts of \$50,000.

The impact of the AHMS on the development of communities in the states west of the original thirteen colonies would be hard to overestimate. The records of the AHMS are now housed at the Amistad Research Center at Tulane University. A paper published for this center summarizes the impact of the Society as in this way: "From a purely statistical point of view, the operations of the American Home Missionary Society were a success. Total receipts for its first sixty-seven years amounted to \$16,006,504. More than 50,000 man-years of missionary labor were financed and directed by the society. Conversions or new memberships to the churches that received society support totaled 422,041. Between 1826 and 1893 the society had missionaries in every actual or future state of the Union except Alaska and Hawaii." The human side of all these statistics would be a story too massive to be recorded. It would be an epic of missionary heroism, souls won to Christ, and communities grounded in faith. This truly is a legacy of which Congregationalists can be proud.

THINGS TO NOTE

MACEDONIA PROJECT

God is at work in the Union of Congregational Churches in Macedonia. Pavle Kostadinov, President of the Union, and Pastor Nikola Ginevski attended the 2024 annual gathering and shared the story of their work to revitalize established churches and plant new churches. These works are led by gifted young pastors who are called to this ministry. These pastors need support since the economy in Macedonia is weak and unstable.

Macedonia is a country where Christianity is trapped in traditionalism and nominalism. It is also a country where the economic situation is difficult. This has led to much corruption and young people have a growing desire to leave the country and pursue a better life in the western world. The Union believes that God has put them there to shine his light in the midst of darkness. Regardless of the many challenges, these believers keep trusting and serving the Lord, and desire to be a voice in the desert that cries out: "Prepare the way for the coming of the Lord!"

Evangelical Congregational Church - Skopje is an urban church that is located in the center of the capital of Macedonia. The church was formed in the 1980's with the mission to reach the people with the Gospel. This church desires to build a strong spiritual community that will impact this region with the Gospel.

Nikola Ginevski (age 34) was called to serve as pastor in 2024. Nikola is married, with a child less than a year old. The church has not had a full-time pastor for almost 20 years. The church is not able to provide the resources to pay a full-time pastor at this time. It is vital that they have a full-time pastor to help the church pursue its mission and vision.

The Evangelical Congregational Church – Lighthouse is located in Drachevo, a suburb of Skopje. Drachevo is a community of around 20,000 people who have different ethnic and religious backgrounds. There is only one other Gospel preaching church of 5-6 people in the whole area. Angel Andonovski (28 years old), his wife Simona and their 2,5 year old son Petar serve there.

There were no young people at the church when he started in 2016. Today there are 20-30 regular attenders. There is a functional leadership that ministers to these people. Two years ago, Angel set a goal to take the gospel to every home in the municipality. This work has expanded other villages around Drachevo within a radius of 10 miles. These mission stations are growing and reaching people with the message of the Gospel.

The opportunity in Macedonia is great! We don't have to send missionaries because God has raised up pastors to do the work. But they need financial support. We trust that member churches and pastors in the CCCC will partner with

the Union to help the Kingdom of God is expand in Macedonia.

DANIEL NASH

PHIL NOORDMANS - WEST REGIONAL PASTOR

Most of us have heard of Charles Finney's (1792-1875) and the Second Great Awakening, but we have not heard about Daniel Nash. When Nash was 48, he decided to give himself to prayer for Finney's meetings.

"Father Nash," as some called him, would quietly slip into a town three or four weeks before Finney's arrival, rent a room, find two or three other like-minded Christians to join him, and start pleading with God. In one town the best room he could find was a dark, damp cellar; it became his center for intercession.[1]

Finney reported one of the secrets to the Great Awakening.

When I got to town to start a revival, a lady contacted me who ran a boarding house. She said, "Brother Finney, do you know a Father Nash? He and two other men have been at my boarding house for the last three days, but they have not eaten a bite of food. I opened the door and peeped in at them because I could hear them groaning, and I saw them down on their faces. They have been this way for three days, laying prostrate on the floor and groaning. I thought something awful must be happening to them. I was afraid to go in and I did not know what to do. Would you please come see about them?"

"No, it isn't necessary," I replied. "They just have a spirit of travail in prayer."[2]
