



About the Awards

The Sequoia Awards was established in 1990 for the purpose of recognizing outstanding volunteerism in the community among students, individuals and businesses. For 28 years the Sequoia Awards Scholarship Program has awarded over \$2 million to outstanding high school seniors who have performed extraordinary, uncompensated community service. The Sequoia Awards provides opportunities to dozens of students each year and is the largest scholarship program awarded in Redwood City. This organization was founded by a group of community and business leaders and is run solely by their efforts. The Sequoia Awards is a 501(c)(3) corporation.

Our Goals

The goal of the Sequoia Awards is to promote volunteerism and to honor those within our community with extraordinary histories of selfless volunteer activism. Our Outstanding Business and Outstanding Individual awardees do not seek recognition for their efforts; they are nominated. High school seniors, who live in Redwood City, are selected for their exemplary volunteerism. They are recognized for their uncompensated volunteer efforts.

The Process

Every fall application forms are distributed throughout the community including all local high schools. The form is also available on our website: www.sequoiaawards.org. The application period deadline is October 31st and every applicant is researched by members of the Board of Directors of the Sequoia Awards. The recipients of the scholarships are interviewed by our committee who then gives their recommendation to the board for approval. The students are ranked by their volunteer impact and are selected to win from \$5,000 to \$25,000 in scholarship money. An additional amount is donated to a charity of the top scholarship winners choice. This year there will be 29 students winning approximately \$200,000 in scholarships. The Outstanding Business and Outstanding Citizen are selected via a secret ballot of majority vote.

Noelia began volunteering at a very young age and in an informal way, as a fifth grader, reading to children at the Fair Oaks Branch Library. Soon, her neighbors were asking her if she could tutor their children in reading and writing. By the time she reached high school, her tutoring had blossomed from happenstance to a formal structure through the Boys and Girls Club and the Fair Oaks Branch Library. Her volunteerism grew and expanded to include assisting younger students in electives, organizing sporting activities, leading the students in hands-on projects and continuing to read, all the while aware that she now was acting as a role model for elementary school students. All this emphasis on the written word also sparked an interest in journalism, and Noelia became an avid staff member of the Woodside Paw Print, the school newspaper, where her engagement went well beyond the requirements for class credit. She also took on the role of serving as a peer counselor for incoming freshmen at Woodside, helping them get comfortable at high school and prepare them for some of the issues that could arise.

Noelia plans to study journalism in college and wants to pursue a career as a political writer and reporter.

The Third Baptist Church of San Francisco has been a central element of Rachel.Amir's life and has played a critical role in helping to “uncover in me a personal passion for helping others.” At church, she has been an orator, speaking on issues of social justice, she has been long active in the Youth Choir's annual Christmas program and distributing backpacks to those in need. From there, Rachel.Amir launched herself into other volunteer activities, including leadership in the Key Club, undertaking a wide range of volunteer efforts, including coaching a “special needs” soccer team. She raised nearly \$1,400 as vice president of the Math Club for its annual math awards night. During the summer, she was a camp counselor in the Redwood City summer day camp program. And she even found time to lead the Teen Committee in support of the Belmont measures on the 2018 ballot, including walking precincts and stuffing envelopes. In the words of the venerable Reverend Doctor Amos Brown, pastor of Third Baptist, “Rachel.Amir will be a quintessential world leader. ... She will stand for the cause of justice, peace and enlightened government.”

Volunteering exposed Maria to younger kids and how she could lead them. Global Glimpse exposed her to another way of life in the Dominican Republic. The result is a young woman who wants to work with kids for a career. She has tutored younger students extensively through the Police Activities League and Project Read. At the Key Club, she volunteered at community events and has been a spirit coordinator. Her exposure to working with younger children came at Outdoor Education, where she was a cabin leader, an activity she has engaged in during three separate camp sessions. Global Glimpse required intense pre-trip preparation to learn the culture and prepare for a leadership role. Once she arrived in the Dominican, she taught English to teenagers twice a week and she led a project to build a basketball court. On this trip and at PAL and Outdoor Education, she realized she was someone young children could talk to and bring their problems and their worries to.

Career Goals

Maria would like to study Psychology in college and pursue a career as a family and marriage therapist with an emphasis on working with kids.

“When I first started volunteering ... I was afraid that I wouldn’t have time to hang out with friends and family, but the more I started doing volunteer service, the more I realize that is what I love and it was not something that took up time, but made me happy.”

By her own admission she is considerably shy, but volunteering has allowed Jasmine to blossom into a confident, effective and multi-faceted leader. Her volunteerism has included a three-day action project in Panama through Global Glimpse, in which she and others did everything from painting a dining hall to making a soccer field. She was a camp counselor at Outdoor Education, undertook leadership training at the Boys and Girls Club, helped freshmen adjust to school through the Sequoia Shadow Host Program and tutored through the Police Activities League and Project Read. But it is the Key Club that has had the greatest impact on her, providing a sense of belonging to a larger community and undertaking events and service opportunities as a group, including organizing a holiday party for children with a parent in jail. The Key Club also provided exposure to regional leadership opportunities and all this has left Jasmine with a determination to provide others with similar opportunities to grow into leadership roles.

Jasmine would like to attend University of Southern California or University of California at Santa Barbara. Her goal is to study communications and become an event planner and she wants to return to her community and coach students on how to get ready for college.

Parinaz’s desire to volunteer was instilled at a young age, first as a 6-year-old playing bingo with seniors at Lytton Gardens in Palo Alto, then through the senior care facility her mother started in Redwood City. By the time Parinaz got to high school, volunteering was part of her life. She has continued volunteering with the elderly and she has immersed herself in an Orange County-based school for autistic children called Ece4Autism (now known as the Lotus School). Through the St. Bernard Project, she made a trip to Puerto Rico to help rebuild a family’s home that had been destroyed in Hurricane Maria. She helped organize a mentorship program for 8th graders to help prepare them for high school. And she spent her summer at a UCLA’s Pre-med Summer School Volunteer Program, assisting incoming and outgoing patients. Parinaz also participated as a member of Sacred Heart’s Social Justice Teach-In core committee, helping planning and carrying out a daylong conference on the topic of mental health for more than 800 participants and attendees.

Career Goals

Parinaz hopes to attend UCLA, Stanford or Duke as a pre-med student, studying Biology. Her goal is to become a doctor.

Annika’s volunteerism goes back to kindergarten as a Daisy Girl Scout, making cards for veterans and singing at senior homes. Since then, she has engaged in a wide range of volunteer activities: tutoring elementary students in flute, viola and violin, creating arts and craft kits for needy children, making medical kits for the homeless, organizing a thank-you card-writing campaign for the staff at Carlmont and organizing weeklong summer camps to teach middle school students about computer-aided design and startup business plans. But perhaps the most dramatic moment came when Annika organized a tennis program for the new Sandpiper Middle School in Redwood Shores. On the first day, she expected a handful of kids to attend. Instead, more than two dozen showed up. She had to rethink everything on the spot. A year later, more than 30 signed up and she subsequently recruited classmates to help with coaching and instruction. Now, she has arranged “the handoff,” ensuring there will be others to make sure the program continues. All this, without dropping out of her other volunteer activities with the Girl Scouts, and school clubs.

Career Goals

Annika plans to attend University of Pennsylvania where she hopes to study Economics and, ultimately, pursue a career in social entrepreneurship.

Quote

“It’s what I enjoy most: not just finding solutions to problems in the community, but iterating, digging in, and, honestly, even often biting off more than I can chew is, as far as I’m concerned, part of the fun.”

A tutor at Project Read, Nikhitha is credited with leading enrichment programs that include small reading groups in the Summer Book Club program and helping out at organization barbecues and annual events. As a volunteer at the American Cancer Discovery Shop, prompted by the illness of her grandmother, she found herself building relationships with the shop's customers. At Second Harvest Food Bank, she started as a volunteer, packaging fruits, vegetables and canned goods to be picked up by Food Bank clients. But then she began to recognize the clients by face and name. Volunteering at the Boys and Girls Club summer school program, she talked with a 7-year-old who was wondering if his parents were going to be picked up by ICE. Volunteerism is the means by which Nikhitha sees the bigger picture, and acts to address it, often by going well beyond the minimum.

Career Goals

Nikhitha would like to attend University of California, Berkeley, or UCLA to study Biological Sciences with the goal of doing research in the field of Medicine.

"I saw that I was so focused on the issue of curing cancer that I forgot to think about the people who are actually impacted by cancer. I didn't think about the emotional and mental problems that came along with cancer. If we want to make a true impact through volunteerism, we first need to meet and work alongside those whose daily realities are shaped by injustices and societal issues."

Danny's desire to help others grew, he realized ultimately, out of his own need for help when he was in middle school – help he never really received. For reasons he didn't fully understand, Danny did his share of volunteering, as a drop-in tutor at the Redwood City Library, spending time with helping kids with homework through the Police Athletic League tutoring program, leading a group of "special needs" kids through the annual Games event, and even serving for a week as a camp leader at Outdoor Education. But it was when he began volunteering at the Key Club that, by his own description, he really began to understand what it meant to give to your community and, at the same time, give to yourself. Serving as both president and vice president, Danny engaged in too many activities to list, or, as he put it "small and big service events." It started, he said, with handing out cups of water at the annual Oktober Run, benefiting the Redwood City Education Foundation.

Career Goals

Danny plans to attend the University of Southern California, where he wants to study Business Administration with the goal of pursuing a career in business.

"To me volunteering meant, and still means, having the strength to tackle/be a part of something greater than yourself and your own personal needs, and in turn comes the most important part: influencing others to do the same, and setting off an unstoppable chain reaction across your community."

Volunteer Activities

As a young student, Sandra lacked the academic support she needed, and she struggled initially in high school. Far from being bitter or resentful, Sandra was determined not to let that happen to others. She began volunteering as a tutor at Project Read, and has continued to do so for three years. She was recruited to the Future Grads program at Boys and Girls Club of the Peninsula, and not only advanced her own academic career, but volunteered at several events to speak to underclassmen about her own experiences as a model for what they can achieve. She has led workshops and college knowledge activities. And she has returned to her own school, Taft Community School, as a teacher's assistant in the summer to help students with reading and math comprehension while ensuring that all students could participate and no one would suffer from a lack of effective attention.

Career Goals

Sandra would like to go to University of California at Santa Cruz or Sacramento State and perhaps study Sociology, or Child Development or even Law. She is considering a career in Criminal Justice.

Quote

“I am a first-generation and low-income Latina student of a family of four. I am the first one in my family to be on track to graduate high school and attend a four-year institution. ... Having experienced the lack of academic resources inspired me to give back to my community and help out students in similar situations I was in.”



Jenna Teterin • Carlmont High School

A descendant of Holocaust victims, Jenna's hunger for justice and service to others has drawn her to the plight of immigrants and volunteering with organizations that provide support and assistance to immigrants, including Services, Immigrant Rights and Education Network (SIREN) and the Immigration Institute of the Bay Area, organizations where she could help immigrants prepare for citizenship and weave through the complex naturalization system. She also has worked with Union of Students Serving the Russian community (USSRc), teaching Russian to younger students. Frustrated that there was no local organization to help undocumented workers that accepted high school volunteers, she started her own nonprofit, California Legal Aid Student Society (CLASS), a website providing access to legal assistance and educational and vocational opportunities.

Career Goals

Jenna hopes to stay in California for college, perhaps Stanford, University of Southern California or Claremont McKenna. She wants to study International Relations and Russian Economics (she is fluent in Russian), and ultimately wants to pursue a career as an International Human Rights attorney.

Quote

“It will take years for me to get a law degree and be able to meaningfully and significantly impact the lives of immigrants in need of legal protection, but I will get there eventually. Until then, I won't hide behind excuses of 'I can't do much' or 'It doesn't affect me.' Following the lead of many of the immigrants I've worked with, I shall start small, work hard, acquire the necessary skills and make my community better for everyone.”

Everywhere he has gone, Alé has had an impact and emerged in a leadership role. As a student at the St. Francis Center in Redwood City, he became a tutor and an athletics coach. He arrived at Sacred Heart “with a splash,” in the words of Religious Studies teacher Matt Carroll, and Alé was determined to make a difference. He was elected Freshman Class President, and quickly became a leader in the Social Justice Teach-In, a training program to teach young people how to participate in social actions, including teach-ins and sit-ins. From there, Alé twice participated in immersions programs: one to Homeboy Industries in East Los Angeles, where he worked with those struggling with drug addiction, gang violence and criminal history; and the other to Puerto Rico where he worked on recovery from Hurricane Maria. And, by the way, he helped found a nonprofit, Offering A Hand Up (OAHU), to assist the homeless, while remaining involved in student government and school activities.

Career Goals

Alé hopes to attend college in Colorado or Arizona and he wants to study Business Management with the goal of a career in business or entrepreneurship.

Quote

“Becoming involved with the community and speaking at town hall meetings as a 5th grader … allowed me to recognize I had a passion for speaking out for the voiceless and serving those who were often overlooked. To my surprise, I also learned that service required one to be humble and selfless.”

Volunteer Activities

Anna has worked locally and globally. She has been a reading tutor at Redwood City Reads. Through Peninsula Covenant Church, she has taught Sunday school, led small groups for girls, partnered with a “special needs” child and served as a translator at holiday events to benefit local residents. And over several summers and spring breaks she has returned to Mexico to undertake community projects, to interact with young people and to be of service. Perhaps most profoundly, her work with Africa Inland Mission brought her to Spain and put her in contact with people from the Ivory Coast who had been scattered from their homes, often exploited and used. The first year, she ran a sports camp for children. The second year, she led programs to provide childcare to refugee children, organized a clothing bank, led a sport camp and coordinated a night of entertainment. All of it left her wanting to do more.

Career Goals

Anna is looking at Los Angeles schools to study Psychology with the ultimate goal of providing therapy to survivors of human trafficking, refugees and “those who have faced traumatic and unjust experiences.”

Quote

“When I was in elementary school, I once read the phrase: ‘Sometimes it feels like you’re emptying the ocean with an eye dropper.’ This phrase has come to influence my daily actions, as I have learned that every chance I take to serve, no matter how small, will ultimately impact the issues that face our world.”



Jaylin Zamora Duarte • *Woodside High School*

Volunteer Activities

In her freshman year, Jaylin heard people talking about volunteering, but she wasn’t sure how she could get involved. Her sophomore year she found AVID, the WHS program that helps economically disadvantaged students get ready to apply and go to college as first-generation students. Ultimately, she became an officer in AVID and then, in her senior year, co-president of the AVID Leadership Club, raising funds for AVID and also reaching out to students who have not joined AVID. That led her to Siena Youth Center, where she became a tutor, helped raise funds to support the center through food sales, funds that would go to the students and to families in the community. Also at the Siena Youth Center, she taught a women’s empowerment class to middle school girls, preparing lesson plans every week and facilitating the classes in partnership with two other high school students. With all this, Jaylin has worked part-time to support her family, but she still found time to volunteer at the senior home Palm Villas, participate in the school’s Octagon Club, a community service organization, and tutor at the Boys and Girls Club of the Peninsula.

Career Goals

Jaylin will be a pre-med student in college and then go from there into the medical field, most likely nursing.

Quote

“One of my main goals ... was to teach girls that they have power and that they have a voice in this world that needs to be heard.”

“Ask Nicole.” A student in AVID – where economically disadvantaged students are prepared for college – was struggling with a math problem and made a list of the steps necessary to solve it. Last on the list was “Ask Nicole.” It was a good choice. Raised in a Spanish-speaking household, Nicole was struggling with her studies in the 3rd grade. Her parents told her to seek help from a neighbor. Since then, Nicole has been determined to be the person others can turn to for help. She has proven to be that person in the Dream Club, where she has been a leader in fundraising and putting on conferences. She was that person when she worked every day at the summer internship program at Taft Community School, a summer school sponsored by the Boys and Girls Club of the Peninsula. And she has been that person at Project Read, overcoming her own shyness so that she could be the source of learning, reassurance and confidence for the struggling, shy student that she once was.

Career Goals

Nicole would like to attend either University of California at Merced or University of California at Santa Cruz. Her plan is to study Human Biology with the goal of becoming a physician’s assistant.

Eduardo's education schooling has been as much journey as education – a story about someone determined to rise above his circumstances and fulfill an internal desire to have a positive impact on those around him. Frustrated that the school he was attending was inadequate to his need to do for others, he began serving as a teacher's aide at the Boys and Girls Club of the Peninsula. That wasn't enough, so he applied and was accepted to the School for Ethics and Global Leadership in Washington, D.C., spending an entire year on his own in an unfamiliar town. There, his class volunteered at a local elementary school, and he tutored and played sports with the children. He returned to Redwood City, and, at a summer program at Stanford University, joined another student in expanding into the Bay Area a youth-run nonprofit – Financial Literacy for You (FLY), which seeks to bring financial education to youth. He and two others continue to work to bring the FLY curriculum to local schools.

Career Goals

Eduardo is interested in studying Applied Mathematics or "something in the STEM field," and in pursuing a career in business, or, as he puts it, "work with numbers perhaps running his own nonprofit."

OUTSTANDING STUDENT AWARD

Maria Casique • *Sequoia High School / Cañada Middle College*

The goal of the Sequoia Awards is not solely to encourage young people to volunteer in their community. It also is to provide them the opportunity for the personal growth, self-knowledge and empathy that comes with helping others. When we give, we also receive.

There may be no more compelling example of this than the remarkable journey of Maria Casique and her determination to turn her own difficulties into something positive.

By the 7th grade, Maria, in her own words, had “mentally checked out.” She already had begun struggling with an eating disorder and by the 8th grade, “I couldn’t retain information, became distracted and felt hopeless and stopped eating and lost weight.” Diagnosed with anorexia nervosa and depression, she was committed for treatment and missed five months of school. It was her second hospitalization.

“I listened to my doctors and parents discuss my future and not once was my education mentioned,” she said. “... Although the future looked dire, I didn’t lose hope.”

She had loving parents who, nonetheless, have only a middle school education, speak little English and have demanding jobs. A hospital tutor wasn’t always available, Maria realized she had to become her own advocate for recovery and to avoid falling behind in school. By the time she returned to school in mid-year, “I had caught up with my peers. I learned to advocate for my education and to access academic support and resources,” Maria said.

“This experience is my main motivation to give back, to make sure other students have access to academic resources to succeed. ... I wanted to combat the lack of academic resources available to younger students.”

She began by volunteering as a tutor at Project Read. But she wanted to do more.

Maria decided to start an after-school tutoring center at her former middle school so that she “could have a bigger effect by serving more students.”

The program became the Connect Tutoring Center and by her Junior year, Maria had recruited classmates as additional tutors. They provided one-on-one tutoring and mentoring “and we served as role models who are succeeding in advanced STEM classes.” She found space for the program in downtown Redwood City that could serve as a “safe, designated environment for teens to spend time after school.” And she raised funds for a mental health pop-up, where teens could learn about mental health resources in an environment of understanding, support and safety.

“Mental health is important and I seek to change perspectives and raise awareness of issues teens face beyond stress from school,” Maria said.

“Not many with similar background as mine – mental health struggles, first-generation, low-income, Latina – make it as far as I have, and volunteering motivated me to continue to fight my eating disorder, and to voice my battle to the community to change perspectives on mental health, education and identity,” Maria said.

Maria will go to college to study neuroscience and, eventually, head to medical school with the goal of becoming a neurosurgeon.

She continues her journey with an internal strength and an abiding desire to make a difference in the lives of others.

“Through community involvement, I have learned I am not alone,” Maria said. “Volunteering has taught me to become a better advocate. ... My time is my community.”



OUTSTANDING INDIVIDUAL AWARD

Annette Soby

When in nature, it is said, leave only footprints.

In the world, Annette Soby leaves fingerprints. As a result, there is hardly a part of our community that remains untouched by her generosity, her giving spirit and the unceasing and diverse nature of her energy.

For more than 30 years, and with continuing support from her husband, Paul, she has helped countless lives in dozens of ways, and she continues to leave a lasting impact on those with whom she has come into contact over decades of volunteering and giving of herself to others.

She has been a volunteer at Kainos Home and Training Center for more than 25 years. She began as a mentor to Kainos clients, an activity she continues. But some years ago, she expanded into speech therapy, using her training as a speech pathologist to teach improved enunciation and expanded vocabulary. In the process, she has built the confidence of countless clients as they seek to build a mainstream life.

At Peninsula Covenant Church, she has provided speech therapy and counseling in addition to serving as a Sunday School teacher and a leader of the church's Christmas choir. She has been a mentor to new parents. Through PCC, she has traveled to China to teach English to children. Numerous times, she has hosted travelers from China, The Congo and Japan, providing them a place to stay while they attend to studies at PCC. And she has opened up her home on a moment's notice to people suddenly rendered homeless.

The list grows ever longer.

Annette teaches Sunday school for Kainos clients. Every month, she sets up the refreshment table and serves the members of Hearing Loss Association chapter in Redwood City. She participates in a women's Bible Study Fellowship and Bible School to children. She has tutored students in the school district, advised parents of children with special needs how to advocate for their children. Every fall, she leads a drive to collect blankets, coats, hats and socks to donate to the homeless through Streetlife Ministries. And she has been a tutor at Project Read for hard-of-hearing students.

A woman of deep and abiding Christian faith, her faith and her good works are intertwined. The Bible has much to say about being of service, summed up in the familiar phrase, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." But the steadfastness of Annette's giving – that she is a continuing blessing to her community -- brings to mind a passage from the Book of Matthew:

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'"


