Overview

This guide provides information on the upcoming election that pertains to residents of Cary. The races covered in this guide are those for U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives, North Carolina Governor, North Carolina Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, North Carolina Treasurer, North Carolina Senate, North Carolina House of Representatives, Wake County Commissioners and Wake County Board of Education. Please note that the candidates are listed in alphabetical order, and that the information for each candidate was provided by the candidate themselves. All candidates in each of the included races were invited to participate.

Important Notes

- Early voting begins on Thursday, October 15th, and ends on Saturday, October 31st; more information on early voting, such as schedules and locations can be found here: <http://www.wakegov.com/elections/info/early/Pages/default.aspx>
- Absentee ballots must be requested by October 27th and returned in person or postmarked by November 3rd.
 - To request an Absentee Ballot, fill out an official State Absentee Ballot Request Form, available for download at NCSBE.gov, or pick one up at your county board of elections office. The request form comes with detailed instructions and is available in Spanish. You may also contact your county board of elections and request that one be mailed to you.
- After the regular voter registration deadline of Friday, October 9, 2020, you can register and vote in person at one-stop sites during the early voting period, which runs from Thursday, October 15, 2020 to Saturday, October 31, 2020. This process is known as same-day registration. Same-day registrants must attest to their eligibility and provide proof of residence. Within two business days, the county board of elections will review the registration and the registrant's address. Your vote will be counted unless the county board of elections determines that you are not qualified to vote

- Election Day is November 3 and polls are open from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

As North Carolina's Senator, my top priority has been protecting the health and safety of North Carolinians during this pandemic and defeating COVID-19. I have secured nearly \$2 billion for North Carolina's hospitals and have worked across the aisle to support and improve the Paycheck Protection Program, which has helped save or maintain 1.2 million jobs.

Our economy was the strongest in our nation's history before COVID-19 hit, and I will continue to lead on pro-growth, pro-jobs policies to rebuild our economy. I've supported comprehensive tax reform as both Speaker of the House and U.S. Senator, and I will push for additional tax relief to help North Carolina families and small businesses rebound.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services and Veterans' Affairs Committees, I've worked across the aisle to ensure our servicemembers and veterans are taken care of. I'd led the successful effort to secure the three largest pay raises for our troops over the last decade, and I've led efforts to provide more choices to veterans to ensure they get timely and quality health care. I believe we must also support our local law enforcement back home, providing them with the funding and resources they need to keep our communities safe.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

PPPs are critical for bringing together local stakeholders and leveraging resources to foster regional economic development. Organizations like local chambers are essential for attracting new businesses and retaining existing businesses in the communities they serve. That's why I've continued to fight for relief funding for economic development

organizations throughout this pandemic and have partnered with colleagues on the other side of the aisle to advocate for resources. As a former business consultant, I know what you know: PPPs like chambers are going to be absolutely critical for the economic recovery once we're on the other side of the pandemic.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

Combating COVID-19 has been an unprecedented crisis, but it shares similarities with how North Carolina has responded to hurricanes. We have to respond with our best understanding of the data at the time, but sometimes our information changes and we have to adapt accordingly. Since the outbreak of COVID-19 began, I've been working diligently to protect the physical and economic health of North Carolinians. I helped expedite testing for our state, secured nearly \$2 billion for North Carolina's healthcare providers, helped save more than one million jobs here in our state by championing the Paycheck Protection Program, and held 65 telephone town halls to keep constituents updated on the federal response to the pandemic. I've also laid out a detailed plan outlining how to keep North Carolinians safe, defeat COVID-19, and get us on the path to economic recovery.

I'm pushing for another federal stimulus bill that extends the Paycheck Protection Program, provides additional money for unemployment, and more resources for our health care providers and schools. I am also encouraged by the progress we are making on a safe and effective vaccine and believe that any vaccine made in the U.S. should go to Americans first before we ship it overseas, after our national investment in Operation Warp speed.

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

As a state legislator, I've worked with both Democrats and Republicans to deliver for Wake County families, working to invest in infrastructure, passing bipartisan bills to help local families and small businesses, and finding common ground. In Congress, I'll continue fighting for affordable health care, prioritize relief and recovery that gets North Carolinians back to work, and protect and strengthen Social Security and Medicare. I'll put aside partisan bickering to focus on the fight for equality, justice, and progress for all.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

In the past three decades I've lived in Wake County, I've worked to build partnerships and broad coalitions to foster economic development that makes life easier for hardworking people. I've worked with local Chambers of Commerce, the Wake Education Partnership, and the RTA for decades. I regularly attend meetings of local partnerships and frequently have been a speaker on infrastructure and policy issues. I was honored to be named a Woman Business Leader of the Year in the Triangle Business Journal for my work in the community. From my early experience as a municipal bond attorney to my former position as General Counsel for GoTriangle, I know what it takes to fund the infrastructure we need for positive growth. With the coronavirus pandemic and accompanying recession, we need to work together to build our economy back better than before and get people back to work. The path to recovery is through investment in our workers, small businesses, and infrastructure. Infrastructure investments provide an opportunity to level the playing field and create good-paying jobs, and public-private partnerships will be a critical component.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

In addition to building and maintaining 21st Century infrastructure, we must have a strong and resilient healthcare system. We must work together to make healthcare more affordable and provide real relief for working families and small businesses. Health care costs are too high, and too many have lost health care coverage when the pandemic cost them their jobs. The COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted how important it is that our leaders come together to negotiate in good faith and put people first. I have a history of bringing people together to get results, even people I don't agree with. In the state legislature, 92 percent of the bills I introduced became law because I've always been willing to come to the table and sort out differences to do what is best for North Carolina. I know we can come together to expand access to health care and make it more affordable, and I will work with anyone and everyone to get it done.

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

1. Promote Work Freedom. I will fight for your right to earn a living by ending crippling licensing fees and requirements that have nothing to do with health and safety. Occupational Licensing puts up barriers for people who want to earn an honest living and primarily serves entrenched business interests.

2. Fight for Medical Choice. We all deserve affordable healthcare options and I'll fight to remove laws, such as Certificates of Need (CON) that prevent skilled medical professionals from providing the care people need at prices working families can afford. The government shouldn't protect medical monopolies.

3. Privatize the N.C. Alcohol Beverage Control Commission. The N.C. ABC has been weaponized against bars, clubs, and small business owners who are trying to earn a living in difficult times. A private model would put the power back in the hands of business owners.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

There are many types of public/private partnerships and the best ones are aimed at reducing costs to the taxpayer, managing risk, and ensuring high quality returns to the public/users of a given project. To this end Demand Risk partnerships, which give a franchise to a private entity to build some piece of infrastructure, allows not only for the collection of revenue by the private entity but ensures proper management so that costs don't spiral out of control as the private partner has assumed the risk that revenue may not cover cost. Another type of partnership is seen in the Charter School model where private companies take responsibility for the administrative cost of running an educational institution. The best charters avoid the Availability Payment model and stick with the Demand Risk model as mentioned previously so that our private partners remain in keeping with the initial promise

of the charter to provide greater quality to the public. In North Carolina I support Demand Risk Partnerships and oppose Availability Payment Partnerships.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

It is easy to Monday morning quarterback with a disaster like COVID-19 or the devastation done by Hurricane Matthew for example. What is important is to stay flexible and not allow responses to disasters be politicized or have our response hamstrung by political considerations. Greater coordination with private organizations, such as the Liberty Coalition for Disaster Relief as an example, will allow for needed aid to reach those in need quickly while the gears of a government response get up to speed. In this way we can have individuals, volunteers, and charities get into hard hit areas first while the lumbering machine of government bureaucracy is still signing forms and getting proper approvals. Once the lumbering machine of government gets up to speed we see people get help, but the sad truth is that it does take more time than some people have for this to occur. By leveraging nimble private and volunteer organizations we can pick up the slack in disaster response so those in need get help immediately.

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

Creating jobs. With more than 1 million North Carolinians out of a job, we need to quickly get our state back to work and repair the damage to our economy. This is more important than just subsistence: So many of society's ills can be cured by a good job. We need to make sure that all parts of our state have the infrastructure needed to land job opportunities and that people have the training and skills needed to fill them. 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Putting students first. For too long, our education system has prioritized the system over the student. Parents know best what classroom setting works for their child, and we must protect school choice options so all students have access to a good education regardless of ZIP code. Right now, that includes reopening schools so every family has the option of in-person instruction.

Protecting law and order. The government's first priority should be the security of the people. We are watching murder rates climb in our major metropolitan areas. We must keep violent criminals off our streets and behind bars where they belong.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

The only way we are going to solve the education divide in our state is through public-private partnerships. Corporations want to play a role in assisting our public schools, but many times they are left out of the decision-making process. I have championed these partnerships as Lt. Governor, leading to several major initiatives becoming state law or policy.

For instance, every high school student will now have to pass a true economics and financial literacy course before they graduate. The only way we were able to get this through the General Assembly was by partnering with financial institutions around the state who not only pushed the legislature to pass this bill, but also provided nearly half the money needed to train teachers for the course. As Lt. Governor, I am also spearheading CS4NC, a computer science education public-private partnership. I look forward to fulfilling both of these partnerships as Governor.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

Our state moves too slowly in rebuilding after an emergency, natural and man-made. In my administration, we will approach disaster response with speed and creativity to keep any North Carolina communities from being left behind.

To better respond to natural disasters, my N.C. Emergency Management department will be retooled to become nimble, creative and fast-moving. We will bring in new leadership and employ advisors with private and public sector experience in logistics and supply-chain management. Our communities cannot wait years after a disaster to get back on their feet.

But disaster response also includes fixing our state's broken unemployment system. We need new leadership, creativity, innovation, better technology and a significant culture change to move away from a system that thinks in terms of weeks and months to one that acts in terms of hours and days.

This year, COVID-19 has shown that our state needs its own strategic stockpile moving forward. In much the same way that our General Assembly has set aside over \$3 billion in a rainy day fund to provide financial assistance in a time of crisis or economic downturn, we must also create a system of stockpiling the physical goods and products we need in a time of natural or man-made disaster. North Carolina should be dependent on no one. No other state, no foreign country, and not our federal government.

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

As Attorney General, I am focusing on a variety of issues, but below are three that will always be at the top of my priority list.

Protecting North Carolina families: As Attorney General, my most important job has been protecting families from crime by prosecuting cases, handling criminal appeals, overseeing the State Crime Lab, assisting local law enforcement, and championing criminal justice reforms. I've targeted robocallers preying on vulnerable North Carolinians, fought to combat our state's opioid epidemic, worked to enact policies that will make our justice system fairer for communities of color, and led the effort to eliminate the backlog of untested sexual assault kits sitting on the shelves of local law enforcement across North Carolina. More recently, I have gone after price gougers and scammers who are trying to take advantage of vulnerable people during COVID.

Defending people's access to health care: Access to healthcare can be a matter of life and death and is absolutely crucial in the effort to build a stronger North Carolina. During my time in office, I have consistently fought to defend the Affordable Care Act, maintaining health insurance coverage for millions of North Carolinians. I was also the first state Attorney General in the country to sue the e-cigarette manufacturer JUUL, which I allege has aggressively targeted teenagers. I am helping to lead the fight against opioid addiction by holding accountable the drug companies that fueled the crisis. And at every opportunity, I advocate for our legislature to expand Medicaid to cover the 500,000 North Carolinians without insurance, strengthen struggling hospitals, create tens of thousands of jobs, and save lives.

Protecting our environment: As AG, I have protected North Carolina's amazing natural resources. On behalf of the Department of Environmental Quality, my office helped negotiate resolutions with Chemours over GenX and Duke Energy over coal ash to preserve water quality. And when the federal government has rolled back vital environmental protections like the Clean Air Act and Clean Water Act, I have defended those laws so that the air we breathe and the water we drink are clean. I am also fighting to preserve our shores and the coastal economy that depends on them by opposing the federal government's efforts to put oil rigs off our coast.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

The coronavirus pandemic has thrown into stark relief the necessity of an increased public investment in our country's infrastructure, health care system, and postal service, among other areas. In areas in which the private sector has superior experience or knowledge, or when the government lacks the resources to adequately pursue a new project, it is vital to employ public/private partnerships so as to most effectively serve the people. For instance, the public investment and support used to further the creation of Research Triangle Park (RTP), the largest research park in the United States, is an obvious example of the potential success of public/private partnerships. We must encourage more endeavors like it, so we may continue to grow our region and state.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

I believe that Gov. Cooper has handled the coronavirus crisis in the best way possible. There are no easy answers as to how to handle an unprecedented global pandemic, but particularly in light of the failure of the federal government to respond competently, Gov. Cooper has steered our state well through this crisis. He has been guided by science, not politics, consults with experts, and is steady and compassionate. Hindsight is 20-20, so, of course, there are different steps I may have taken if I knew then what we all know now. But I hope I would have responded as quickly, diligently, and effectively as

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

I think their function is vital, but not transparent enough. When these partnerships don’t “perk”, it’s sometimes determined that the deal was “priced” for perfection and the profits were to be privatized and the losses socialized.

Our response has been too secretive, inconsistent and not based on vetted assumptions that have enormous unintended consequences. The idea that one size fits all has created an economic inequality NEVER before seen in NC. As a member of the Council of State, I can certify that the 10 elected leaders have met less than 5 hours on the subject of flattening the economic curve since St. Patrick’s Day. I would have had “toothbrush” meetings; which

means cancel everything else and be prepared to meet in person until the job is done. North Carolinians are facing the highest levels of food, job, health and now educational insecurity and don’t give a damn what political party you are a member of. They just want their problems solved and a focus on flattening the health AND economic curve. Generations of business owners in NC have permanently lost their joy of achievement and upward mobility in 6 months.

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

My top three priorities will improve our public schools and ensure that every child flourishes. I intend to 1) expand equity across school districts using the WestEd report as a roadmap for supports, resources and school funding, 2) professionalize careers in education, which includes advocating for improved salary and working conditions, and 3) provide a healthy and safe school environment that meets the needs of our students' academic, social, emotional and physical well-being.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

Transparent and accountable public/private partnerships are helpful in that they often reduce costs and allow for shared risk. The Wake Ed Partnership, in particular with its SummerSTEM program and FAST initiative, is very beneficial because we all know that a community's success depends upon our high quality schools. I co-founded the UNCG STEM Teacher Leader Collaborative in partnership with the Cemala Foundation and Duke Energy so I know firsthand how beneficial these partnerships have continued to be for us.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

Governor Cooper has carefully led the way for North Carolina through this pandemic, but the current State Superintendent has been MIA. I have a thorough reopening plan on my website, which describes the Superintendent's responsibilities as well as the NC General Assembly and the State Board of Education in providing guidance, planning and funding. The NC

Constitution is clear that it is the state's responsibility to provide each child with a sound, basic education and they are not exempt during the time of crisis. The unfortunate reality is that this pandemic is going to negatively impact a large proportion of students. Despite the heroic efforts of educators across the state, we all know that remote learning is not as effective as in-person learning. Students thrive when we create well-resourced, integrated school communities that provide all children with equal opportunities to flourish. More specifically, that means requiring that the NCGA meet their obligation of increasing and modifying the distribution of funds to make sure schools have the resources necessary to meet their students' needs.

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Should you be elected to serve, what are your top 3 priorities that you plan to focus on?

1. Collaborate with the State Board of Education and the legislature to enact the best policy recommendations that ensure equitable funding and resources for our most vulnerable students.
2. Overhaul our school accountability and testing system so that it is student-centered, reflective of the work that teachers do to grow their students, and relevant to parents.
3. Launch a statewide literacy campaign centered around the Science of Reading that will strive to end the state's decades-long inability to ensure all students can read proficiently.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

For me, the answer to question involves the role of leadership. What does good leadership look like when there are many stakeholders?

We are at a crossroads in public K-12 education--one that has been accelerated by COVID-19. Public/private partnerships are going to be key as education begins to pivot to new ways of doing things. We are stronger when we work together and public education needs the input of the private sector as well as advocacy organizations. One of my biggest strengths is the ability to engage people in a way that allows for collaboration and compromise such that multiple voices are heard. Education is about relationships with both young people and adults and requires a growth mindset to innovate and solve our challenges.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

As of September 15, the General Assembly and the Governor have allocated \$838.5 million to COVID-19 relief in K-12 public schools. The legislature must continue to work very closely with the Department of Public Instruction and the State Board of Education to ensure that schools' needs are identified and funded appropriately. Because it is likely that we will need additional dollars in the future, we must maintain a close and continuing dialogue with state and federal leaders so that we are working towards solving these yet-unknown funding challenges.

Plan A should have been on the table for districts as soon as July 2020. The state should require local districts to offer a choice of in-person or remote instruction to accommodate those teachers and families who cannot safely return to the classroom. All districts should follow healthy/safety guidance provided by DHHS when reopening for full-time in person instruction, including masking and social distancing recommendations.

mortgage payments and utility bills. The County has opened a "Healthy Hotel" to care for 160 homeless residents. In addition to shelter, residents are supported by a case manager and provided meals, medication and transportation. Twenty of these families have moved into more permanent housing, making room to help additional families.

The Wake County Commissioners have put \$5M toward a small business loan program called Wake Forward and are working with our municipal, state, and federal partners to provide even more resources as it becomes available.

Wake County should continue to engage in data-driven decision-making that prioritizes public health while encouraging a rapid and robust economic recovery.

Hopefully we will not experience another pandemic, but were we to do it over again, I would look to provide various services and other relief more swiftly. I would also expand our economic support programs to more fully include local nonprofits (and am currently advocating for doing so with remaining CARES Act funds).

Although not ideal, we are learning how best to do it considering the situation.

Invest in Public Health

The 2021 Wake County Budget allocation to Human Services and Public Health will not be sufficient to get us out of this pandemic, prepare us for potential crisis in the future or address the health disparities that are worsened by COVID-19. We must invest more in our county's health and well-being.

Have a Plan

Wake County and the municipalities within our county must develop Pandemic Preparedness Plans. Implementation must include working in unison.

Communication

Within Pandemic Preparedness Plans, communication to people in the community is key. Information provided regularly and often helps so

much in protecting ourselves, our family, and our friends, and provides reassurance that all things are being done to work toward the health of our community.

We must make sure we elect representatives who understand, prioritize and continue in this commitment.

I am quite proud of Wake County's response to the demands of the pandemic. At the outset, our Board and staff worked with all Wake County municipal leaders to develop parameters for stay-at-home orders with consensus to mitigate the spread. Our County manager and staff pulled together a sophisticated emergency response center that has been staffed around the clock to guide our residents

with their health issues and any questions regarding good practices. Once our schools were closed we immediately worked with the school system and other partners to make food available to our most vulnerable students. We have provided assistance to those facing evictions and put together a program to move homeless people with high risk health issues to vacant hotels and worked with partners to find housing and other support services. The county made free testing widely available to our residents as soon as the test kits were readily available. The Commissioners approved funding to support local small businesses affected by the shut down with interest deferred loans. This was not the year our board or our staff had envisioned but we have been thoughtful and nimble in our approach.

Public/private partnerships are crucial for providing much needed resources, support, and expertise in our schools. For example, each school relies on private business partners for their business alliances that provide important lessons for students in financial literacy, and skill building opportunities. Non-profits like WAKE Up and Read provide books to school children to build grade-level reading, while Rotary Club of Cary's teacher of the year event provides much needed recognition and support of local teachers. Larger organizations like the Cary Chamber, Wake Education Partnership and others provide vital education and advocacy about important issues of education and their intersection with other community concerns.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

As a community, response has been difficult. Shifting scientific and regulatory guidance (no masks vs. masks, lockdowns v. open with social distancing, etc.) has proven taxing for everyone and we will see the impacts for months to come. The level of

cooperation and compliance with safety protocols by members of the community has varied, and that has reduced its effectiveness.

Likewise for schools, guidance and restrictions from the state has shifted several times since schools went to remote-learning in the spring. WCPSS was unprepared to shift to virtual learning in the spring but has made great strides in the quality and rigor of the instruction it now provides and has greatly increased student access to laptop devices and wi-fi resources, better preparing us to provide remote learning when potential disasters in the future than could lead to temporary school closings.

Specific to what I would have done differently for schools, I would have liked to have had better communications, through all departments of WCPSS, and more transparency around our decision-tree process. Having better communications of plans and options, and the factors used in weighing decisions, available to the public in tools like dashboards would have helped parents, schools, and the community to provide input, understand options, and plan better together.

1. Quality, unbiased education - A return to educational focus on performance at all levels, teaching critical thinking, and a focus on helping every student reach their full potential.

2. Empowering families - Family engagement is the #1 indicator of educational achievement in K-12 and has long been ignored by my opponent and the current school board. The lack of a choice and the one-size-fits-all plan in the re-opening process is a perfect example of failing to engage with the families of Wake County.

3. Leadership - The lack of leadership by my opponent and this school board has been evident in the re-opening process, curriculum choices like MVP Math, callous reassignment decisions, budgetary mismanagement and so much more. I will lead, and I will engage and listen to families.

What do you think the function or role of public/private partnerships are? (Ex. Chambers of Commerce, Wake Education Partnership, Regional Transportation Alliance/RTA, etc)

Public/private partnerships are essential in providing collaborative and innovative solutions to the issues facing our community, as well as providing students with the unique understanding of what some employers and industries are looking for in their employees. My opponent and this school board are reluctant to utilize and focus on this vital partnership. The private sector sees the benefits of offering internship and job shadowing opportunities to produce a better educated future workforce. Students get real-life work experience that helps them gain a better grasp of the precise skills and education employers are looking for. These experiences prepare students to enter the workforce following graduation. In many public-private partnerships, businesses collaborate with

educators to support curriculum development and give awareness to what employers need from future employees. For example, recent studies have shown that workers have inadequate communication skills and a lack of basic math concepts (this gap is widening for Wake students that are being forced to endure MVP Math). This type of cooperation can help educators refocus teaching techniques and curriculums to better prepare students in these key areas. Businesses also may provide computer and technology-related training to educators to keep them on the cutting edge.

We are in a year where the importance of Disaster Preparedness and Response has been highlighted. What are your feelings on how we've responded? Would you have done anything differently?

Given that North Carolina is hit every so often with hurricanes and other natural disasters, one would think that education officials would have an emergency plan in place if schools were closed. They do not. Bill Fletcher, speaking for the school board, said parents should, "reflect on the complexity of creating a virtual school district in three weeks.... Rome wasn't built in a day and nor will a robust, fully functioning distance learning program be built in a day,".

It shouldn't have to be built in a day. Nor was this school board only given three weeks - they had 4 months. There should have already been a plan in place. Because there was nothing in place, and because the board failed to act from day one, we have seen the massive failures. Not the expected short-comings - the massive failures exacerbated by poor decisions. 40K Chromebooks not delivered one month into the school year. Teachers over-worked, under-trained for the virtual environment, and under-resourced. Lack of professional development to teachers to host virtual lessons or techniques for distance learning. Frankly, it's appalling teachers have not been offered this kind of training and yet are forced to sit and listen to lectures or training about agenda-driven initiatives and wonder why their students are failing. Special education children, those on IEPs, and others with needs that are being left to fend for themselves. These are all things this school board has failed to address.

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The question should be why wasn't there a plan in place for it in the first place? Was the lack of even the most basic plan because this board never thought it would happen on their watch? The issue is found in an apparent lack of leadership training and qualities.

There are three military veterans running for school board (Bergstrom District 8, Hahn District 2 and Moore District 5), all highly trained in disaster management and leadership. All of us have been highly critical of the lack of communication, preparation, preparedness and decisiveness displayed by the current BOE. In April, the board should have immediately begun the planning process by polling invested parties, seeking out medical expertise (and following their counsel), communicating a plan (and creating flex dates to allow for re-evaluation and adjustment), and collaborating with other districts nationwide. To this day, they have failed to do these things fully. In the meantime, other larger districts are fully re-opening with a safety plan in place. Houston is one example.

Because of this lack of leadership, families are hurting, pediatricians are warning of significant long-term damage, the achievement gap is widening, and our students are losing ground in education as well as post-graduate resumes to students in other states who are benefitting from in-person instruction. Wake County schools need to re-open for all students. More importantly, we need leadership on the school board.
