



About the Speakers

Amy Bowring is the Executive and Curatorial Director of Dance Collection Danse and teaches dance history at Ryerson University. She is one of Canada's foremost advocates for the preservation and dissemination of Canada's dancing stories. Her book *Navigating Home: Artists of the NL Dance Project* will be released in fall 2019.

Yael (yali) Nativ is a choreography teacher and dance scholar. She began her academic studies in dance in Israel and then completed her degrees in Paris (choreography) and San Francisco, where she received her Master's degree in Interdisciplinary Education of the Creative Arts.

Dr. Nativ received her PhD from the department of Sociology of Education, School of Education at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, where she teaches today. In her research and writing she explores social issues looking at the linkage between body, movement, knowledge, ethics, gender and creativity.

To close out his first day in Canada, the President addressed a full crowd from Canadian Magen David Adom for Israel (CMDAI). He praised the organization for all of their hard work and contribution towards strengthening the Israel-Canada relationship.

Magen David Adom is a wonderful organization which actively raises funds to support Israel's team of trained volunteer and professional medical responders.





The next day, the President proceeded to Ottawa, where he was given an official greeting by members of the Canadian military and Governor General of

Canada, Julie Payette at Rideau Hall. That afternoon he met with Prime Minister Justin Trudeau at the historic Wilson House Estate where the two spoke about important issues in the Israel-Canada relationship.

Afterwards, the pair participated in an official luncheon where Prime Minister Trudeau re-affirmed his stance on the BDS movement and anti-Semitism stating, "our government will keep on speaking against the BDS movement and the singling-out of Israel." From there they visited the Canadian National Holocaust Monument where they laid a wreath together in memory of those who were so viciously murdered during WWII.

The morning after his return to Toronto (May 2) President Rivlin had the opportunity to sit down with Premier Doug Ford to discuss Israel-Ontario ties. He then spent the remainder of his final day of the state visit in Toronto. In the morning he opened the Canada-Israel Business Forum hosted by the Consulate General of Israel in Toronto and Western Canada and the Toronto Region Board of Trade. In front of a fully-packed event hall, the President praised Israel and Canada's shared values and mutual goals. President of the Toronto Region Board of Trade, Janet De Silva, Minister of Democratic Institutions Karina Gould, head of the Israeli Manufacturing Association, Shraga Brosh as well as Adiv Baruch, Head of the Israel Export Institute all gave remarks at the event. We appreciate all of our presenters as well as Canadian and Israeli businesses who participated in the business to business sessions. We are sure you made lasting friendships and new partnerships!





After the morning Canada-Israel Business Forum, the President visited Toronto General Hospital, part of University Health Network. Ranked as one of the 10 best hospitals in the world, they are currently using Israeli technology to produce the world's first 3D holographic image to be used during heart procedures. Unfortunately, the state visit of President Rivlin had to be cut short due to concerns over his wife's medical condition

The events continue however that evening. First a wonderful dinner hosted by UJA Federation of Greater Toronto and Israel Bonds Canada, followed by a Koolulam sing-along performance of Matisyahu's song "One Day". Mayor John Tory and Prime Minister Justin Trudeau were among the singers, side by side with 1600 friends and Jewish Community members.



The business delegation that accompanied President Rivlin on his visit to Canada spent its last day (May 3) in Toronto on a study tour. They started with a visit to MaRS Discovery District, a world-renowned innovation hub in Toronto. MaRS supports ventures in the health, energy & environment, finance & commerce, and work & learning sectors. Salim Teja, President of Venture Services and Rafi Hofstein, President and CEO of MaRS Innovation, gave two excellent presentations.

They continued to the Toronto Stock Exchange, where we were greeted by Loui Anastasopoulos, President of Capital Formation. Dani Lipkin, Head of the Technology and Innovation Sector, spoke about the activity of TMX Group in helping foster growth in their client companies, the advantages of doing business in Canada. The day finished with a spectacular view of Toronto at the offices of DLA Piper Canada LLP, they heard from Noam Goodman and Derek Sigel about legal aspects of foreign

business in Canada.





Ramon International Airport Opens in Southern Israel

An Israeli Pain Technology Could Ebb Opioid Addiction Post-Surgery

Tens of millions of inpatient surgical procedures are performed in the US every year, according to a report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the leading national public health institute of the United States. Millions of these patients become addicted to opioid medications prescribed to them following surgery.

And with the opioid crisis where it is, already named the worst drug epidemic in US history and claiming around 150 lives a day in the US, health officials are desperately seeking measures to halt it from growing even more. It could be wise for them to look to Ramat Gan, a city in the Tel Aviv District of Israel, home to one of the world's major diamond exchanges and high-tech companies. Here, in this city of 156,277 residents, sits Medasense Biometrics, a company that has developed a patented technology platform to objectively assess the physiological response to pain (nociception), and which could ebb opioid addiction post-surgery.



The long-awaited Ilan and Asaf Ramon International Airport is now fully open for business in Timna, 11 miles (18 kilometers) outside the Red Sea resort city of Eilat.

Spread across 1,250 acres in the Negev Desert, the airport is a game-changer for local and international tourism to Israel, Jordan and Egypt's Sinai Desert.

This new southern gateway to Israel is expected to host 2 million passengers per year, with a future expansion doubling that capacity. It handles domestic flights from Tel Aviv and Haifa as well as flights from Europe that previously used Eilat's Ovda Airport.

Commissioned by the Israel Airport Authority (IAA), Ramon Airport officially opened in January but daily international flights have been received only since April 2.

The building's minimalist futuristic design was overseen by Amir Mann-Ami Shinar Architects and Planners in partnership with Moshe Zur Architects working with more than 45 consulting firms.

This company has come up with a portable pain sensor that can tell doctors how much pain a patient is feeling and how much pain care they need. Using artificial intelligence algorithms and real-time data, the company's easy-to-use system is already changing precision medicine, allowing for personalized and optimized pain care to ensure that the patient doesn't get too many opioids.

"Unlike other aspects of anesthesia, there have not been good monitors of painful stimuli during surgery, and how patients react. It has thus been challenging for anesthesiologists to know how much medication is needed to blunt surgical pain in individual patients. The problem is that too much or too little pain medication (usually narcotics) can be harmful. A monitor that accurately measures how patients react to surgical pain might therefore help guide clinical care," Dr. Daniel Sessler, the founder and director of the Outcomes Research Consortium (the world's largest clinical anesthesia research group), tells NoCamels.

Indeed, the average rate of later opioid dependence and addiction among surgical patients hovers at 12 percent, according to a US national pain report.

Jerusalem's Old City Now Accessible to People With Disabilities




The Old City of Jerusalem and its walls are a UNESCO World Heritage site and the most visited place in the State of Israel, with some 10 million yearly visitors.

But navigating the narrow, crowded cobblestoned lanes and uneven stone stairs is hard or impossible for anyone with difficulty walking, let alone parents pushing strollers. Now, after a decade of work by seven government bodies, the historic district finally has greater accessibility to pedestrians, carriages, vehicles, children and tourists as well as to emergency vehicles and mobility aids.

All the Old City gates now are accessible and can be reached via the Free P&R Shuttle running from the First Station parking lot to the Dung Gate and back daily (including an hourly wheelchair-accessible shuttle).

Facebook has formed a new Artificial Intelligence (AI) research team that will work out of the company's R&D center in Tel Aviv, Haaretz reported this week.

The 10-person team, called Data.AI, "will focus on machine learning algorithms that can improve the company's internal interface and create new tools for data analysis, the company said in a statement cited by CTech by Calcalist. "The team will work to make Facebook's infrastructure smarter and capable of learning from previous experience in order to help engineers solve problems, predict future events and issues, and reach relevant data more quickly," according to the report. Facebook's R&D Center employs some 200 people and recently set up shop in a new office at Tel Aviv's Azrieli Sarona Tower. The company's Israeli operations are headquartered on Rothschild Boulevard. According to a recent report, AI is a major source of growth for the Israeli tech industry.

Israel is home to over 1,000 companies, academic research centers, and multinational R&D centers specializing in AI, including those that develop core AI technologies, as well as those that utilize AI technologies for their vertical-related

Passover, Easter Visitors Flock to Historic Jordan River

The Jordan River baptismal site of Qasr al-Yahud was much more crowded than usual on Monday, April 15, less than a week before Passover and Easter.

To find out why both Christians and Jews were gathering here on this day - the 10th of Nisan on the Hebrew calendar - ISRAEL21c joined a fascinating tour sponsored by the Government Press Office. Tour guide Katriel Ben David explained that every day of the week, all year long, Christian pilgrims come to the riverbank to immerse their bodies and fill bottles with water to take home from the very spot believed to be where John the Baptist baptized Jesus. No doubt John and Jesus chose this location because it is believed to be where the Israelites crossed into the Promised Land on the 10th of Nisan 3,440 years ago (some calculate it as 3,293), following their liberation from Egyptian slavery and four decades of desert wanderings. Three centuries later, the book of Kings 2 records, the prophet Elijah crossed the Jordan right here in the opposite direction and was taken to heaven in a miraculous fiery chariot.

Strong Start: Israeli Companies Raise \$1.55 Billion in First Quarter of 2019

Israeli high-tech startups and companies raised \$1.55 billion in 128 deals in the first quarter (Q1) of 2019, marking a 28 percent increase in capital amounts and a 15 percent increase in the number of deals compared to last year's first quarter, according to a report released Tuesday by the IVC Research Center and law firm ZAG S&W Zysman, Aharoni, Gayer & Co.

This past quarter was marked by two large deals of over \$100 million - that of Innoviz Technologies which raised \$132 million in

Series C funding late last month, and that of telecoms tech startup DriveNets, which emerged from stealth mode in February to announce a \$110M Series A funding round led by Bessemer Venture Partners and Pitango Growth. The two deals make up 16 percent of the total quarterly capital. There were also three deals of \$50 million or more this past quarter, with cybersecurity startup Cato Networks raising \$55 million in January, cloud technology startup Redis Labs raising \$60 million, and Lightbits raising \$50 million. In Q1 2019, according to the report, deals higher than \$20 million were responsible for 64 percent of the total amount invested, while seed and smaller rounds in the \$0m-\$5m range accounted for less than seven percent, continuing a downward trend observed since late 2015
