The Season after Pentecost

During the season after Pentecost, we meet Jesus during his earthly ministry. We learn of Jesus' teachings and Jesus' call to us. We use this time to learn more about the Messiah so that we can serve and love others as Jesus did.

The season after Pentecost is the longest season of the Church year, stretching from the end of Easter to the beginning of Advent. It stands between two periods of exciting activity: between the joyous celebration of Christ's resurrection and the beginning of the Church year (Advent) in which we begin again to anticipate Christ's birth.

The season after Pentecost is a season of growth and refreshment. The vestments worn by clergy are green, suggesting growth and renewal. It is appropriate that Pentecost spans the agricultural season—just as crops mature during the summer months with the help of sunlight, soil, and rain, so we grow in relation to Christ as we hear Jesus' words and teachings.

The Word of God

The people are seated for the reading and the psalm.

THE READING Genesis 45:1-15

Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, "Send everyone away from me." So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. And now do not be distressed, or angry with yourselves, because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life. For the famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt.

"Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, 'Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me, do not delay. You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. I will provide for you there—since there are five more years of famine to come—so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty.' And now your eyes and the eyes of my brother Benjamin see that it is my own mouth that speaks to you.

"You must tell my father how greatly I am honored in Egypt, and all that you have seen. Hurry and bring my father down here." Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin's neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

THE GOSPEL Matthew 15: 21-28

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." He answered, "I was sent

only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.

THE NICENE CREED

BCP p. 358

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

Who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified.

Through the cross of Christ, God have mercy on you, pardon you and set you free. Know that you are forgiven and be at peace. God strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in life eternal. **Amen**.

God's love is shown to us: while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.





If you wish to receive communion, you may dip the bread in the wine or drink from the chalice. Please assist the Chalicist by holding the base of the chalice and guiding it to your lips. If you would like Communion brought to you in your seat, please let an usher know. Consecrated gluten-free wafers are available; please inform the clergy if you have gluten sensitivity.

Monthly Mission Partner & Matching Gift – Backpack Buddies Foundation of Loudoun

During August, we are praying for, learning about, and financially supporting Backpack Buddies Foundation of Loudoun (BBFL).

The BBFL funds, facilitates, and educates a variety of Backpack Buddies programs throughout Loudoun County in providing food to underserved children and their families. In 2019, BBFL provided \$132,000 in funding to 55 Loudoun County Public Schools Backpack Buddy programs providing over 20,600 weekend meals. As the Commonwealth school reopening strategy evolves, we continue to work closely with the school BPB programs we support to assure the delivery of meals to the children and families in need, as we did during the Spring closure.

The BBFL Board is a volunteer organization with no paid employees. Over 94% of donations received directly fund food provisioning for Backpack Buddies programs throughout Loudoun County.

While the Coronavirus has taken children out of school, it has also exacerbated the problem of food insecurity for the community we serve.

St. James' is widely known for its generosity in times of need, and help is needed now to support this critical mission. This year, we are fortunate that a fellow member of St. James' has agreed to match "Dollar for Dollar" all donations to BBFL in the month of August. So, \$10 becomes \$20, \$100 becomes \$200 (enough to provide a full year of weekend meals to a child in need), and so on.
