### POAMN's Winter Solstice Service Brings Comfort to Those Hurting at Christmas

Each year as Christmas approaches, the tidings everywhere are of joy and gladness - a "White Christmas" if you will. However, many folks who have experienced deep personal losses are hurting inside; hearing songs about joy and gladness does not help them. They are experiencing a "Blue Christmas."

To offer comfort to those hurting at Christmastime, the POAMN Conference Planning Team, under the able leadership of Adrienne Knight, hosted a virtual worship service on December 21, the Winter Solstice. This solstice marks the annual date with the longest night hours.

The service was led by Rev. Dr. Ella F. Busby. More than seventy viewers participated online for this deeply touching worship service.

Rev. Busby began with the words, "Though we are singing 'Joy to The World', others are humming 'Blue Christmas'. God knows your pain, and loves you unconditionally."

For Christ knows what it's like to be blue. Using a blue-colored Bowl of Tears as a symbol, Rev. Busby reminded us that "there is room in Christmas for sadness."



## What Do You Do When Your White Christmas is Blue?

Drawing from Matthew 1:20-23, wherein an angel appeared to Joseph telling him that Mary was with child by the Holy Spirit, Rev. Busby acknowledged that "Christmas can be blue, painful, and lonely." She offered the following suggestions:

- 1. Accept your feelings.
- 2. Be kind to yourself.
- 3. Take off the stress.
- 4. Reach out to others and help them.

She continued, "We will find comfort in God. The scriptures tell us, 'Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.' Mourning

### PAHSA Chaplains' Circle: A Fellowship of Support for Spiritual Caregivers Serving Older Adults

The Presbyterian Association of Homes & Services for the Aging (PAHSA) is a fellowship of senior living organizations that proudly point to their Presbyterian heritage when they describe their origins. PAHSA member organizations strive to exemplify Christian values and fulfill the physical, intellectual, social, emotional and spiritual needs of older adults, so that they may experience the fullest life possible.

Central to this commitment are the chaplains. Senior living chaplaincy is a unique calling, but one that comes with great rewards. PAHSA chaplains consider it a privilege to minister to older adults. Many older adults enter senior living trying to figure out what comes next and asking questions about their legacy and purpose. Chaplains focus on helping people move through a different phase of life. They accompany individuals and their families to find purposeful living through the aging process, including the end of life.

While some chaplains work within a pastoral team, most are in a solo ministry as the only staff member professionally dedicated to the spiritual care of the community. The work is as demanding as any parish ministry.

So where do PAHSA chaplains turn to find support for their unique service?

The PAHSA Chaplains' Circle is a bi-monthly virtual gathering of senior living chaplains, campus pastors and spiritual care providers. During their meetings, participants share experiences and resources unique to ministry in a senior living context.


The Circle found its beginnings in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. Faced with the restrictions and protocols of social-distancing, Chaplains found their ministry derailed when their usual practices of leading worship and bible

study, visiting and praying with residents came to a complete stop.

In the meantime, senior communities felt like they were under siege as the pandemic took a heavy toll on older adults in congregate care who were ill and dying. Unable to enter the buildings, family members felt disconnected and worried about their loved ones. The overwhelming nature of the pandemic also pushed staff members to their limits.

However, COVID-19 also redefined proximity, enabled by the newfound familiarity with Zoom virtual video conferencing. PAHSA stepped into this space in early 2021,

#### **Peace With God**

In a world of strife and pain, Christians can have peace with God. Many of us long for peace in the world, as have generations before us. Sometimes it feels as if our world is headed in the other direction! In contrast, Jesus said, "My peace I give to you... let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid." (John 14:27).

The late evangelist Rev. Billy Graham used three key words repeatedly in his preaching: Fact, Faith, and Feeling (in that order). Through Billy Graham's lifetime of preaching, thousands of people came to know the peace of God.

Fact: Christ came, lived, died, and was resurrected for our sins. This fact is often expressed through the words of poems and the words of hymns:

> "He came to pay a debt He didn't owe because we owed a debt we couldn't pay." (Author Unknown)

The Bible does not call upon us to believe something that is not credible, but to believe in something that transcends all history. To believe that the life, death, and resurrection of



Christ, done for sin and sinners, is effective for all who trust in Him.

**Faith**: Faith is rationally impossible when there is nothing to believe in; faith must have an object. The object of Christian faith is Christ. Faith involves more than an intellectual assent to the claims of Christ. Faith involves the will. It is volitional. Faith demands action. Faith actually means surrender and commitment to Christ. You and I do not know Christ through our five physical senses, but we know Him through the sixth sense that God has given every person, which is the ability to believe. Believing is an experience as real as any experience. In Romans 1:15 the Apostle Paul writes, "He who through faith is righteous will live."

Feeling: When we understand something of Christ's love for us, just as we are, we respond with love for Christ, and love has feeling. It is a love that frees us from self. Love for Christ is above human love, yet there is a similarity. In human marriage there is commitment. Feelings come and go. Commitment stays. We who have committed ourselves to Christ have feelings that come and go - joy, love, gratitude, etc. However, the commitment remains unchanged. In 1 John 4:18 we read, "...but perfect love casts out fear." And those who love Christ have confidence in Him that raises them above fear.

The peace of God does not mean that no ill will ever befall us. Rather, it means that God is always there with us. Through good times and through really tough times, God will be with us ALWAYS.

bringing chaplains across the country into fellowship with each other at a critical time, while no one needed to leave their workspace. A virtual community was born. One chaplain called it, "A place to breathe."

Since then, the circle has continued to meet bi-monthly for an hour. The participants determine the shape of the meeting including format, topics, leadership and more. In the past months, topics have focused on the Church seasons and holidays, end-of-life ministry and rituals, ministering across faith traditions, ministry to staff care professionals and the chaplains' own self-care. Resources and best practices are shared and the "chat" space is often filled with links and book titles. The atmosphere is conversational and collegial, including an opening "checkin" round to hear how life is going for each person and a closing time of intercessory prayer.

Rev. Will Randolph, chaplain at Longwood at Oakmont, Pennsylvania, a Presbyterian SeniorCare community, is a regular participant. He appreciates and often contributes to the sharing of ideas and resources but, he says, "I'm really here for the camaraderie. It's valuable to me to spend time with other chaplains who understand our ministry context." He also appreciates the relationships that he can call on, even between the Circle's meeting times.

Chaplain Nola Bozeman, who serves at Glenaire in Cary, North Carolina, a Brightspire senior community, agrees, "It's an opportunity to share sacred time together. Even in the virtual space, we give each other hope, support, laughter, celebrations and tears. It's just a great opportunity to connect with colleagues and share this special ministry."

The Chaplain's Circle meets bi-monthly on Zoom video conference. Chaplains serving in senior living settings are welcome to join, regardless of denominational affiliation. Participation is free but registration is encouraged. To learn more, visit www.pahsa. org.
