



## A word from Pastor Ramon Smith



### Seeing the Need

First, Good Friday was a powerfully immersive experience that included visual art, music, scripture, prayer, confession, communion, and pardon. Secondly, I am thankful for the hard work of Sandra Young and the volunteers in the children for a successful Easter Egg Hunt. We saw a lot of new faces, and the volunteers and staff demonstrated Christlike hospitality. Additionally, I

am thankful for the worship leadership of Shawn Bell, Mary Watson, Nathaniel Metz, and Ron Mayo. The music ministry was phenomenal during Lent and on Easter Morning. Our attendance for Easter Sunday was 254 in person.

The season of Lent gave us time to reflect on the work of Jesus on his way to the cross. In the gospel of Luke, Jesus heals and includes people living at the margins of the community. While Jesus's work on the cross is an example of sacrificial love which atones for our sins, Jesus' ministry to people at the margins exemplifies how to demonstrate love to others in our everyday lives. We are all pilgrims traveling through this life; perhaps, we should take notice of our fellow pilgrims. Who is limping through life? Who is abandoned on the side of life's road? Who seems directionless? Who is hungry and thirsty? Over the last year, I have emphasized the importance of inviting people to

church and sharing the good news of Jesus Christ with them. But unfortunately, the reality is that many do not come to church because they do not understand how the church can add value to their lives. As learners and followers of Jesus Christ, we know that all people need salvation. Yet, deliverance from the bondage of sin, death, and the devil is not exactly on most people's minds dealing with the challenges of securing food and shelter, raising children, being married, and having poor health. I know that many will take issue with that statement. However, please consider that people often came to Jesus because they believed he could address a need.

Saginaw United Methodist Church has the resources to address many of the conditions in our community. Currently, we are helping those who are thirsty through the Saginaw Water Project. We are feeding people experiencing food insecurity through our partnership with community link. We provide clothing and other items to people experiencing homelessness through donations.

There are other needs we have the resources to address. For example, many struggle with loneliness, managing their finances, parenting their children, and improving their marriages. People need to know that the word of God and the people of God can help them navigate life's challenges. Therefore, the Discernment Committee, in consultation with me, is working on a plan for discipleship that will help address the needs of people within our church and community. We cannot address all the needs at once. We will focus our efforts on the needs that we are best equipped to address and will gain the most participation. This plan will involve witness, fellowship, and intentional faith development. Please pray for our Discernment Committee and Administrative Council as we continue to fulfill the mission of our church. More information will be provided in the weeks and months ahead.

# Newsletter Spotlight: Church Leadership 101

### This is Part 2 in a series of articles on church leadership opportunities.

If you are new to the church, or just interested in knowing more about how it runs, this series of newsletter articles are especially for you. The Nominations and Leadership Development Committee hopes to inform and educate the congregation, and perhaps spark interest in your participation in an area of the church that especially speaks to your gifts and talents.

### What is the Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee (SPRC)?

This committee works to integrate the staff and congregational interests to focus on the mission of the church. It relates to all staff—those appointed by the Bishop and those employed. The SPR has some of the same functions as a personnel or Human Resource department in other organizations.

Some of the primary functions of this committee are: 1) Recommending needed staff positions and developing written job descriptions; 2) Making recommendations regarding compensation; 3) Support continuing education for staff; 4) Consulting with the district superintendent; 5) Annual assessments of the ministry of the congregation and staff.

The SPR committee has between five and nine members. The lay leader(s) and lay member of the annual conference are required members of this committee. Others are recommended by the Nominations Committee and elected by the Administrative Council and should be divided into three classes that rotate in three-year terms (except for the lay leader and the lay member to the annual conference.)

Because of the sensitive nature of topics that may be discussed by this committee, it is the only one whose meetings are "closed" to the congregation as a whole. Current members of the SPR include: Sandy Thompson (chair), Ray Jordan (lay leader), Jean James (AC Rep), Stephanie Morgan, Jerry Kirby, Barbara Henley, Linda Brown, Ryan Buchanan, Janet Page, and Pastor Ramon Smith. If you have questions regarding the work of this committee, you can contact any committee member.



### Community Link

The Sisterhood will continue to support Community Link's effort to end hunger in our community in 2023. Our next collection date is Saturday, May 6. We always appreciate your commitment and generosity to others. They are always in need of shelf stable items such as peanut butter, crackers, jelly, canned vegetables and fruit, rice, beans, instant potatoes, pasta, ramen noodles, spaghetti sauce, flour, and sugar. Household items and hygiene products are always appreciated as well; such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo and conditioner, laundry detergent and fabric softeners, and toilet paper. Dates for the rest of the year are June 3, July 1, August 5, with more dates to be announced.

### Ladies Day Out

The LDO group has arranged a guided tour of the Euless Heritage Museum this **Saturday, April 15**. The museum includes 4 buildings and hundred of historical artifacts dating back to the 1880s. The complex features the first brick house in Euless, a log house built in the 1850s, and a barn made of lumber from Camp Bowie after World War I. There is no charge for the tour. ### Save the Date!

We will be touring the famous "Top O'Hill Terrace" in Arlington on **Saturday, June 24th**. Originally built as a tearoom and restaurant, the "Top O'Hill" gained notoriety when it was sold and turned into an illegal gambling establishment. Escape tunnels and secret rooms were added to hide the gambling paraphernalia during raids. The tearoom and restaurant, both legitimate businesses, operated beside the casino, as well as a brothel. Years later the casino would be raided and shut down. It was later purchased by the Bible Baptist Seminary and operates today as the Arlington Baptist Seminary. Tickets are \$10 each and spots are limited! The tour is scheduled for 1 pm. It is a 2 hour tour so we will meet earlier for lunch prior to the tour. 
