Visioning Together

I hope all is well with you and your loved ones. This article aims to improve the flow of information across ministry areas so that we carry out the mission. The mission is to make (cultivate) the disciples of Jesus Christ for transforming the world (Northwest Tarrant County). All that we do should align with the mission. So, what is a disciple? A disciple is a learner and follower of Jesus Christ. Our mission is to help people love and live like Jesus.

Who are we?

From my perspective, our church is a loving and welcoming community of faith. Our congregation trends 55 and older (empty nesters). We also have a small, committed core of young families. We are a mixture of longtime Saginaw residents and transplants. We are composed primarily of people from the following career paths:

- Educators (Teachers and Administrators)
- Business Leaders
- Railroad Workers
- Healthcare Professionals
- Engineers
- Government workers
- Other professions

We must also consider whether we are in a survival or growth phase. From 2012 to 2019, Saginaw UMC was in a growth phase, but due to the loss of key staff members and the pandemic Saginaw, like many churches, entered a survival phase. On the other hand, the community around us is in a growth phase, increasing by 30,000 people in the next five years. We are not on a mission to save the church but on a God-given mission to make disciples. Following God's command will lead to

prosperity and fruitfulness. After prayerful discernment, we must decide what the next year and a half to five years will look like: growth or survival. If we choose growth, it will require more of us, but God is faithful. The founding members of Saginaw United Methodist Church left a legacy that we are the beneficiaries of. What will our legacy be and how will we bless future generations through our actions over the next year and half to five years.

Given the mission field and Saginaw United Methodist members' spiritual gifts, talents, acquired skills, and experiences, what is God's preferred vision for Saginaw United Methodist Church?

We define a vision as "what fruitfulness or success would look like by the end of 2023". I need your input to include your voices in the visioning process. Please remember that our vision should be aligned with the church's mission, which is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world (the 3 to 5-mile area around our homes and church). How do we grow, care, and nurture the church membership and reach new people in our community? We must do both effectively. A few things to consider following opportunities given the acquired skills of our congregation:

Given the number of music educators in our congregation, this may give us an opportunity for some community music outreach/mentoring

Given the number of business leaders in our congregation, we should explore partnering with the Saginaw Chamber of Commerce to see how we can support the development of local small business owners.

Enter the creation of our Youth Spring Retreat. Three years ago, we decided to create a weekend where youth could unplug and spend time outdoors with each other, playing, hiking, resting, reading...whatever was needed for them to find some rest from their crazy schedules. One of the best parts of the weekend is that it is created and designed by THEM...the youth!

We are so excited to announce that we will be hosting our 3rd annual Youth Spring Retreat in April! This year we will be heading to Glen Lake Camp in Glen Rose, Texas. Glen Lake Camp has been host to numerous events/camps for youth, adults and families over the years. This year, Glen Lake has offered the opportunity for youth groups to host their own retreats, so we jumped on the opportunity and booked our weekend.

Spring Retreat 2023 will be the weekend of April 28-30. The retreat is for youth in grades 7-12. Cost is only \$100/youth and \$75 for adults (members of the same family will receive a 50% discount for each additional participant). Cost covers lodging for 2 nights, all meals, snacks, drinks, retreat t-shirt and any additional materials/supplies needed.

Save the Date!

We will be touring the famous "Top O'Hill Terrace" in Arlington on **Saturday, June 24th**. Originally built as a tearoom and restaurant, the "Top O'Hill" gained notoriety when it was sold and turned into an illegal gambling establishment. Escape tunnels and secret rooms were added to hide the gambling paraphernalia during raids. The tearoom and restaurant, both legitimate businesses, operated beside the casino, as well as a brothel. Years later the casino would be raided and shut down. It was later purchased by the Bible Baptist Seminary and operates today as the Arlington Baptist Seminary. Tickets are \$10 each and spots are limited! The tour is scheduled for 1 pm. It is a 2 hour tour so we will meet earlier for lunch prior to the tour. Newsletter Spotlight: Church Leadership 101

In January the church held a leadership training event and the leadership for 2023 was installed during both worship services on January 22. If you are new to the church, or just interested in knowing more about how it runs, this series of newsletter articles are especially for you. The Nominations and Leadership Development Committee hopes to inform and educate the congregation, and perhaps spark interest in your participation in an area of the church that especially speaks to your gifts and talents.

What is the Administrative Council?

The Administrative Council is the primary administrative body of the local church which oversees management and programming. According to the Discipline of the UMC, it should meet at least quarterly and should represent a broad spectrum of the congregation. Meetings are open to anyone to attend and give voice; however, only those who are members of the council may vote. Most members of this council are a result of their position on one of the church's committees.

Other tasks include filling vacancies in positions between meetings of the Charge Conference, approving the church budget, and making recommendations for the compensation, benefits and housing the pastor(s) and other church staff. It works in cooperation with the other committees of the church, particularly those required by the Book of Discipline: Staff-Pastor Parish Relation, Trustees, Finance and Nominations and Leadership Development.


