
B.) **SETTING** is the **time** and **place** of a story.

Summer Reading Theme Essay Graphic Organizer

The theme of a literary work is its underlying central idea, or the generalization it communicates about life. As you read, think about the comment the author is making about his subject matter. What revelation about the behavior of human beings or the conduct of society, or insight into the human condition is the author attempting to convey throughout the novel? At times, the author's theme may not confirm or agree with your own beliefs, but even then, if it is skillfully written, the work will still have a theme that illuminates some aspects of true human experience.

Using the graphic organizer below, write a well-organized essay that identifies the theme you believe the author conveys through the novel. How does the author use characters, events and literary devices to illustrate the theme? Use evidence from the text to support your analysis.

Guiding Questions

1. What important idea or theme does this literary work convey?
2. What do characters *do* that helps illustrate this idea?
3. What do characters *say* that helps to illustrate this idea?
4. What *events* take place in the work that help to illustrate this idea?
5. Are there any recurrent images or clusters of images? Do these images support the idea or theme that you find in the work?
6. What does the narrator say that helps to illustrate this idea?

Introduction	
Opening Sentence: should include the title of the novel, the author's name, when it was written, and a short summary. For example, " <i>Hamlet</i> was a novel written by William Shakespeare in 1599 about a young Danish prince whose father tragically dies."	
Summary: provide a 3-4 sentence summary of the entire novel from beginning to end.	

<p>Connecting sentence: this sentence should connect the above summary to your thesis statement.</p>	
<p>Thesis Statement: This should state the theme that you will be discussing and three ways (characterization, symbolism, setting or conflicts, etc.) that the author uses to portray this theme.</p>	
<p>Body Paragraph #1</p>	
<p>Topic Sentence: The topic sentence should list the first example of how the author develops his/her theme.</p>
