The 2021-2022 Fulbright Distinguished Awards in Teaching Short-Term Program (Fulbright DAST) sends expert U.S. K-12 educators to participating countries to support projects in schools, teacher training colleges, government ministries, or educational nongovernmental organizations, as identified by U.S. Embassies and Fulbright Commissions.

The 2021-2022 Fulbright DAST Program is designed for K-12 educators from the United States to work with an educational institution in a participating country to address specific educational need(s) in that country. Project activities may include developing trainings, writing curricula, supporting pre-service or in-service educators, and collaborating with university faculty to update teacher training processes and curricula. Participants live and work in their host countries for two to six weeks.

Eligibility

- Eligible applicants include U.S. citizens who reside in the United States, a U.S. territory, or a school associated with the U.S. Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA).
- Applicants must hold at least a Bachelor's degree and have a minimum of three years of full-time experience in an instructional role at a K-12 institution or district in the United States, a U.S. territory, or a school associated with the U.S. DoDEA.
- Eligible positions include classroom teachers, curriculum coordinators, media specialists and librarians, instructional coaches and teacher trainers, technology specialists and others located in a K-12 environment. Applicants must be currently employed full-time in a K-12 institution or district in the United States, a U.S. territory, or a school associated with the U.S. DoDEA, in an instructional role or similar
