



Young Breast Cancer Survivors Learning Collaborative

for PCPs who serve female patients aged 45 and under

Although nearly all cancer survivors (91.6%) visit their primary care physician (PCP) annually and more than half (54.6%) rely primarily on their PCP for care ([Pinheiro et al., 2022](#)), many PCPs lack training to effectively manage the unique needs of cancer survivors, underscoring the urgent need for enhanced integration of cancer survivorship care in primary care, which is currently less emphasized in medical education compared to other chronic diseases ([Crabtree et al., 2020](#)).

To address this gap, the [Family Medicine Education Consortium](#) (FMEC) is recruiting primary care providers and clinics to participate in a 2026 learning collaborative focused on Young Breast Cancer Survivors (YBCS), particularly Black women, and their caregivers and ongoing care needs.

Understand the risk and incidence of breast cancer in young women and the challenges survivors face in accessing ongoing care, psychosocial support, and other services.

Identify and **implement breast cancer screening and improve processes for referral** to genetic counseling and testing

Explain how providing fair, respectful, and personalized care can address gaps in treatment, and identify practical strategies to ensure all patients feel heard and understood;

Increase access to evidence-based tools and other supports for cancer survivors, including Survivorship Care Plans (SCPs), patient navigation and peer-based support programs, group psychosocial interventions, and access to clinical trials
