



# COUNTY OF MENDOCINO

## Executive Office

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### Introduction

In September, the Grant Unit advanced several key County projects. The unit partnered with the Prevention, Recovery, Resiliency, and Mitigation (PRRM) Division to submit a \$9.5 million application for the Sherwood Corridor Hazardous Fuels Reduction Project. At the same time, team members continued to develop grant applications for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program Income projects, secured site access, and initiated vendor selection for the Covelo Community Clean-Up Project. These actions demonstrate the unit's ongoing commitment to securing grant funding, fostering resilience, and enhancing both community well-being and economic opportunity.


During fiscal year 2025-26, the Grants Unit partnered with County departments to submit 3 grant applications totaling \$11.3 million. Additionally, the unit supports management of 15 grants exceeding \$16.2 million for the Executive Office.

## I. Effective County Government Organization

### a. Amplifund Fall Updates

This fall, Amplifund implementation will focus on accelerating adoption among all County departments that manage grants. The plan features targeted outreach to both early and late adopters, refreshed training materials, and sharing departmental best practices. Follow-up interviews will assess current grant management processes, experiences with the system, capture lessons learned, and highlight areas for improvement. These efforts aim to promote broader Amplifund adoption and enhance countywide grant management.

As part of Amplifund's integration to Euna Solutions they will be rolling out a new look that launches in early Q4 (Oct). They have assured the County that the use and functionality of the product itself will not be impacted - just the look and feel will adopt some of the Euna branding. ## II. A Safe and Healthy County

### a. Covelo Community Clean Up Project, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

The County is collaborating closely with project partners and HCD to advance the CDBG Round Valley Community Clean-up Project. In September, the County and RVIT confirmed three eligible cleanup sites: Foothill, Biggar, and Refuse Road. RVIT signed Permission to Enter Agreements for Foothill and Biggar on August 5, 2025, and for Refuse Road on September 8, 2025. The County counter-signed all three agreements on September 15, 2025, finalizing site access for the

cleanup projects. Two RFPs, one for [solid waste](#) and one for [vehicle](#) removal, have been prepared and reviewed by all relevant County departments and RVIT. The RFPs were released on September 23, 2025, and will remain open until October 24, 2025. A site walk-through for vendors was held October 1, 2025. Service contracts are expected to be awarded in late January or early February 2026.

### III. **A Thriving Economy**

#### a. **Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) [Grant Application]**

On July 29, 2025, the Grants Unit held a public hearing to outline proposed uses for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program Income funds, present the results of the CDBG RFP, and seek direction from the Board of Supervisors. Since then, the Grants Unit has been coordinating with project partners and preparing grant applications for PI projects. Planning is also underway for new initiatives, including the 2025 Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA), which will be released on September 30. Staff have met with MCHC to discuss next steps and the application timeline. In the coming months, staff will return to the Board for authorization to submit the 2025 NOFA application and for guidance on allocating remaining PI funds to advance community and economic development priorities.

### IV. **A Prepared and Resilient County**

#### a. **\$9,500,000 - Sherwood Corridor Hazardous Fuels Reduction Project, Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) DR-4856, CalOES/FEMA [Grant Application]**

The Grants Unit collaborated with the Prevention, Recovery, Resiliency, and Mitigation (PRRM) Division to submit a Notice of Interest (NOI) for FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) DR-4856 on May 28, 2025, for the Sherwood Corridor Hazardous Fuels Reduction Project. They received notification on June 17, 2025, that the project was eligible and submitted a full sub-application for the project on September 15, 2025. The County received a CalOES Programmatic Request for Information on September 29, 2025. Staff will assist with the response and related sub-application revisions, which are due on October 21, 2025.

The Sherwood Corridor Hazardous Fuels Reduction Project aims to reduce the risk of loss of life and property by removing hazardous fuel loads in two key areas: (1) creating strategic buffer zones around critical infrastructure in Brooktrails, such as drinking water facilities and emergency services, and (2) clearing hazardous fuels along Sherwood Road and other essential emergency evacuation routes. Following the cancellation of the BRIC Phase 2 grant and based on CalOES's advice, the County revised the original project scope from BRIC to align with and pursue this funding opportunity.

### V. **Other/Additional Information**

#### a. **Executive Order 14332 – Improving Oversight of Federal Grantmaking**

- i. On August 7, the current administration issued a new Executive Order (EO) titled "Improving Oversight of Federal Grantmaking" that will affect both grantmaking and grant administration. This order directs federal agencies to ensure that grants align with the administration's key priorities and policy objectives.
- ii. Key provisions include:
  1. Grant Review Processes: Senior political appointees are required to review and approve funding opportunities and discretionary awards to ensure they align with both agency priorities and the broader national interest.
  2. Streamlining and Simplification: Grant announcements must use clear, accessible language. The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) will update its guidance to simplify application processes and eliminate unnecessary barriers.
  3. Selection Criteria: The EO states that agencies should select applications that "demonstrably advance the President's policy priorities," as well as to avoid projects that support controversial positions on race or gender, immigration, or "any other initiatives that compromise public safety or promote anti-American values." The EO

also encourages giving grant funds to a wider array of recipients and recipient types, rather than “a select group of repeat players.”

4. Accountability Measures: Agencies will conduct annual reviews of discretionary awards to assess progress and ensure alignment with administration priorities. Until formal review processes are established, new grant announcements must receive prior approval from designated senior officials.
5. Termination Risk: Agencies must include "termination for convenience" clauses in grants, allowing termination at any time if a grant no longer supports agency or national priorities. This increases funding uncertainty, especially for long-term or multi-year projects.
6. Financial Controls: Increased oversight will require detailed justifications for grant fund drawdowns, raising administrative demands on finance and compliance teams. The order also imposes caps on administrative and facility cost reimbursements, potentially impacting organizations with higher overhead costs, such as research universities and hospitals.

iii. Implications:

1. Counties rely on federal grant funding to support social services, health programs, public safety, disaster response, infrastructure investments, and other essential services. Changes to federal grant policy, especially those that apply retroactively, may create unintended administrative or financial consequences when implementing these programs.
2. Grant recipients are likely to encounter heightened oversight and an increased risk of retroactive grant termination. Administrative burdens will intensify, with stricter approval requirements for fund disbursements and project renewals. Consequently, the timeline for announcing and distributing awards may become considerably longer.



You'll begin to notice some changes soon with Amplifund. As part of their integration to Euna Solutions they will be rolling out a new look that launches in early Q4 (Oct).


