

Enrichment (science & art) with Mrs. Craig

Science

This week in science featured lots of magnet exploration. The PreK classes made magnetic spiraling snakes, kindergarten finished their unit on simple machines by making magnet powered cars, and Prefirst experimented with magnets and iron filings and learned how to turn paper clips into magnets. First grade continued to explore how animals and plants adapt to a desert environment and learned how to grow a new succulent plant from a single leaf.

Art

The 3s carried on with our magnet theme from science by creating paintings using magnetic marbles. Pre-k drew polar bears, then painted them with pompons dipped in white paint. Kindergarten recreated a scene from "A Snowy Day" by Ezra Jack Keats with a watercolor background, tempera paint snow, and a paper cutting of themselves in snow gear. Pre-first continued their winter theme by reading the book "Extra Yarn" and creating winter portraits with printed knit textured papers to make sweaters and hats. First grade learned about Australian artist Pete Cromer and his brightly colored birds. They used painted paper to make their own bird collage.

The pre-first children jumped right back into our routine from the holiday break and have been busy at work. In Language Arts, we did a story comparison of the book, The Mitten by Jan Brett and Alvin Tresselt. We discussed the many similarities and differences throughout the stories. We continue to work on our phonics skills and learned 8 new glued sounds with words ending in -ng or -nk. Currently, we are learning about consonant blends in words and sounding them out while reading and writing. Our handwriting remains to be a focus as well as punctuation in sentences when writing. In our next Math unit, we will learn all about money and the value of each coin. We will practice exchanging smaller coins for larger valued coins (EX. 10 pennies can be traded for a dime or 2 nickels.) Money is a difficult concept to grasp so we will continue to work on this throughout the year. Please ask your children to help you "pay" the next time you buy something using coins. Last week, we learned about Martin Luther King, Jr. and how he was such an important person in history. We created our own P-1 class book with each students' dream for the world, and what they would like to be when they grow up. Next week, we will focus on polar
