Dear Lauren:

We met a few years ago when I was a member of Project W. I am not here to ask for a grant or for any financial assistance. I do hope, however, that you can assist me in spreading the word about the project that I am involved in with another Delaware County volunteer.

Judy McKinney, and I have initiated a private project to honor those in Delaware County who passed away due to Covid-19 by creating memorial fabric squares and forming them into larger Quilts. The completed quilts will be displayed around the County with a related Web site to tell a short history of the person depicted in the quilt.


We are reaching out to prominent community partners to help us spread the word of this project. Due to HIPAA, we are limited in our ability to obtain personal family information, so we need to depend on word of mouth to make sure that all Delaware County residents can honor their deceased loved ones. We are accepting donations of 8-1/2" x 8-1/2" fabric squares with any décor to commemorate a lost relative; alternatively, we will accept clear photographs, drawings, poems, clear signatures, emblems, patches, sports logos and our quilters will design a fabric square for families.

I have enclosed a flyer with a form that we are using to gather information. Feel free to copy and distribute to anyone who may be interested. The submission can be mailed with any personal material or actual Quilt squares that people may wish to provide.

Over 1800 lives were lost in Delaware County to date from this horrific disease. If we can, we want to make sure that none of them are forgotten. We welcome squares from all who wants to honor anyone in our County who passed from Covid.

Volunteers launch quilt project to remember COVID-19 losses

Two women and volunteer quilters have initiated the DelcoPA COVID Quilt Project as a way to permanently remember and honor the 1,800 lost to the virus in the county while also helping family and loved ones to heal.

Judy McKinney of Media and Barbara Smith of Havertown have enlisted the help of Brandywine Valley Quilters and Undercover Quilters to create 8-inch by 8-inch panels for each Delaware County resident who died in the pandemic.

As of Saturday, there had been 1,827 deaths related to COVID in Delaware County, according to the Pennsylvania Department of Health. McKinney and Smith have both been long-time volunteers.

McKinney was serving with the Citizens Corps of Delaware County as she volunteered at testing sites throughout the pandemic.

As cases numbers have begun to decline, even though she personally didn't know anyone who had died from COVID, she asked herself, "What can we do to help heal? It's time to start healing."

McKinney recalled the

Cleve Jones in 1985 to com-

memorate a memorial for those who died of AIDS in

a way to create understanding for the impact of this disease. Two years later, it was displayed on the National Mall in Washington.

By 2012, the quilt was seen for the last time at the National Mall as it has gotten too large to be displayed all at once.

"That's what came to my mind," she said when she was thinking of what

the appropriate gesture to start this process."

So, she and Smith spearheaded this volunteer effort, enlisting the help of the Brandywine Valley Quilters and Undercover Quilters and creating the website and Facebook page last month.

They haven't yet had a panel made.

"It's hard to find out about people who passed away," McKinney said, explaining limitations with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, better known as HIPAA, in acquiring information about the deceased.

There's also sometimes hesitancy for loved ones to acknowledge the death re-

lated to COVID-19 or ex-

hope that this will provide family, friends and loved ones with an avenue of remembrance and healing, particularly as mitigation requirements prevented many from traditional viewings and funeral ob-

servances.

These volunteers see the quilt as a way "to pro-

vide an outlet to friends and families who never

got that final chance to say goodbye by offering a meaningful way to perma-

nently memorialize their loved ones."

panels do not need to be submitted solely by family members. People who have

come to make a submission.

The project organizers

also intend to honor groups

such as nurses, teachers, es-

ential workers, and front

line workers in hospitals

and assisted living com-

plexes, national or theme places, national or theme parks, cities or tourist spots. Poems, song lyrics and book titles can be incorporated into a panel.

"It's a living project, it's a permanent spot so that there will be a place for reflection. "It's a living thought, so we'll evolve as it happens," she said.

They are hopeful to have panels to display at the Brandywine Valley Quilters bi-annual show July 22 through July 24 at the Mifflin Center for Sport, Spirituality and Character Development at Neumann University in Aston.

"That's our first goal is to have something displayed there," McKinney said.

Their sustained mission is to provide healing and remembrance for those grieving and for the community as a whole.
