

From the Executive Director

The past 7-8 months have been challenging for all of us. Not meeting in person, not being able to create the type of community we have for generations has felt...different. We've transitioned to virtual Hebrew School and engage in person, once a month for a theme based activity. We have a group of members dedicated to anti-racism work within our shul and the greater community.
