High Holiday Services Reinvented for a Pandemic!

Oh, how we wish we could gather in our sacred space to see each other, hug and wish each other *L'Shanah Tovah!* But this year, we must keep each other safe. And so our sacred space will be broadcast, and our hugs will have to be virtual.

Cantor Steve and I, with help from our team, are pulling out all the stops to offer engaging High Holiday services online, with many creative new additions to help us to be connected, uplifted and inspired.

Cantor Steve has been working with the singing community and the use of new hardware and software to create a virtual chorus to bring greater beauty to some of our major High Holiday melodies.

We have worked to divide all of our services into clear segments which will be professionally recorded in advance. We will be able to upload all the segments so you can access them individually, if you'd like. We will also be working with a terrific tech professional—our wonderful Dan Rome—who will help us to stream the recorded segments live from the sanctuary. Cantor Steve and I will be in the sanctuary on the Holy Days to offer live comments in between the recorded segments of the main elements of the services.

You will be able to turn on Zoom and remain present with us for the whole time, or tap into the segments as you wish.

We have learned a lot in these last months about how people best relate to Zoom services, and have shortened our services for this year to hold the flow and inspiration of the essential prayers.

We are working with wonderful volunteers who are recruiting others to record the English readings (mostly poetry) and also the Torah/Haftarah readings. These will be seamlessly woven into the service recordings by our amazing videographer, Teo Zagar.

You will be able to enjoy Dan Rome's exquisite shofar sounding on the second day of Rosh Hashanah and the end of Yom Kippur. We will also have recordings of many of our members and children sounding the shofar at the end of Yom Kippur. It will be awesome!!

Two teams of our teens are working to produce two very special slide shows of member photos to be viewed at particular times in our services—"Photos from the Bima" will stream at our Torah services, and "Yizkor Photos" will show our beloved family members (and names) for whom we say Kaddish during Yizkor. This will be shown at the Yizkor service on Yom Kippur.

We are working with two teams of talented OZ artistic folks to help us prepare sharings for the month of Elul preceding Rosh Hashanah and for the days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. We have fabulous talent in our community—wait 'til you see what they offer us! This will augment the messages that Cantor Steve, Rabbi Edleson and I are preparing to send out during Elul, and the special four-part workshops we are planning together.

And, on the second day of Rosh Hashanah we are collaborating with my friend and dear colleague [Rabbi Debra Newman Kamin](#) of Am Yisrael Conservative Congregation in the Chicago area for a very special add-on service. Yoel Sykes, one of the talented singer-songwriter-liturgists from the wonderful [Nava Tehila](#) prayer group in Jerusalem, will be offering a one-hour contemplative and musical service, following our morning service on Rosh Hashanah Day 2. Without Zoom we never could have imagined collaborating in such a way. I can't wait!

Along the way, we are looking for every possible opportunity for open Zoom schmooze time. We wish we could be together, and we crave being in the synagogue, but we will do our best to re-create the communal experience even while we are in our own homes.

These are the highlights—we have even more planned, including *Selichot* with Temple Sinai, *Tashlich*, and more. A team led by Naomi is working on children's services and programs. Stay tuned for our uplifting, healing, and inspiring High Holy Days.
