We'll be using our Shalom Shavuot extended curriculum unit as a model. It was a very successful endeavor that included singing, prayers, stories, art projects, cooking, games, movement and discussion. Participating students, ages 5-11, learned more about Shavuot than I ever did (up until about six weeks ago)! It was a holistic approach that brought together many ideas and learning modalities.

Once conditions allow us to be together under one roof without the stresses of the pandemic we will easily be able to pivot our program for in-person learning. I am counting the days...
