- » Businesses that paid less than \$720,000 in sales and use tax in 2019 have been given an extra 30 days to file those taxes.
- » If employers would like to continue operating but need to limit hours, the Unemployment Insurance Agency's Work Share program is the best option. This allows employers to maintain employment levels and business operations during declines in regular business activity rather than laying off workers.
- » Employers will not be charged for unemployment benefits if their employees become unemployed because of Executive Order 2020-9 requiring them to close or limit their operations.

Gov. Gretchen Whitmer has called for a "Stay Home, Stay Safe" order that only allows essential businesses and workers to work on-site. The executive order is scheduled to run through April 13.

The coronavirus threat in Michigan has negatively impacted employers and employees throughout the state. The government response has also created difficulty, but there are resources available to help.



## RESOURCES FOR WORKERS

- » Given the circumstances, employees may be exempt from strict compliance created with several provisions in the Michigan Employment Security Act until April 14, 2020, at 11:59 p.m. The executive order would make it easier for employees to qualify for unemployment.
- » Under the executive order, the individual is considered to have left work involuntarily if they leave work for reasons related to the COVID-19, including a family care responsibility because of a government directive such as school closings. This allows these individuals to qualify for unemployment benefits.
- » The executive order extends the timeframe to claim unemployment benefits from 14 days to 28 days from the time that the employee last worked.
- » The executive order extends the eligibility timeline for unemployment benefits from 20 weeks to 26 weeks for claims filed before April 14, 2020, at 11:59 p.m. and after the issuance of the order.
- » Under new emergency rules order by the state, first responders in Michigan who are exposed to the coronavirus are now eligible for workers compensation for the next six months.
