It's in the historical artifacts that were found on the property many years ago and rediscovered recently when we went through our files.

It's in the gravestones of people like George Hance, the Warden whose generosity enabled us to have our Rectory and expand our churchyard.

It's in the personal items left behind by Father Schmaus, our Rector for 37 years, and found in a safe at the Rectory several years ago during a restoration project.



It's in the picture of Father Counselman, who followed Father Schmaus and stayed for 33 years, that's hung in the hallway near the Parish House.



It's in the tree that hangs on the Parish House wall to honor those recognized by our Valentine Society, whose members provided major gifts to Trinity through their estates or during their lifetimes.

Unfortunately, much of our legacy is also a burden, and it's becoming increasingly difficult to bear.

Our buildings and churchyard require maintenance that we simply can't afford. We have been able to offset some of the cost through grants, such as the one that enabled us to get new windows at St. Martha's. But that only goes so far.

People like George Hance have always been few and far between. Now there just aren't that many people in our congregation, period. The pandemic accelerated a drop in membership that has been taking place for years. It poses a challenge in sustaining our ministries to ourselves and the local community.

And Mother Angie has become part of our legacy, just like Father Counselman, Father Schmaus and dozens of other predecessors. As we carry on, we have to figure out how best to move forward.

It's clear that we can't go on the way we did before. We aren't in a position to afford a new full-time priest on our own. Our Endowment Fund has been tapped for years to cover expenses.

The issue goes far beyond Trinity. After all, there's a second Episcopal Church in Woodbridge, another one in Edison, another in Perth Amboy, yet another in South Amboy, and on and on.

Having so many congregations in our area is also a legacy, of a time when churches were at the heart of the local community and families couldn't travel far. Neither is the case any more, and many churches are struggling as a result.

Our diocese is encouraging congregations to build relationships so they can support each other not only financially, but also spiritually. In our area, Christ Church, South Amboy, has an affiliation with Trinity, Matawan. There's also the affiliation between St. James, Bradley Beach, and St. Michael's, Wall, which was brought home to us because of my sister's attendance at our Sunday Zoom services the past few months.

During Mother Angie's time with us, Bishop Stokes raised the possibility of our affiliating with another historic congregation: St. James, Edison. We have worked with them before as part of a collaboration among Route 1 corridor churches.

The discussions have gained momentum since her departure last month. I recently met in person with St. James's senior warden, Harriette Ward, when we were both in Texas to attend weddings. There will be much more to come on the subject in the months ahead.

Yes, Trinity has a legacy. Now it's time to ensure that it also has a future. Your support and your prayers as we determine the best direction to follow would be most appreciated.

Dunham Family Visit

Trinity has a historical link to the Dunham family through the Rectory, also known as the Jonathan Dunham House. The house was named for former President Barack Obama's earliest American-born ancestor and was built by his son, Benjamin Dunham, who also put up the first of our three church buildings.

The Dunham family preserves its history and genealogy through a non-profit organization, founded as Dunham-Singletary Family Connections in 2004 and later renamed Dunham Genealogy Research Association. The group publishes a quarterly newsletter, which covered Trinity's 300th anniversary celebration of the house in 2018.

Gratia Dunham Mahony is the newsletter's editor. She toured the house and the church grounds, including some Dunham family grave sites, on June 27. Her daughter, Ann Mahony Cook, accompanied her on the visit. Warden David Wilson, who has corresponded with her in the past, showed her around.

After retiring, I wanted to become active doing something to care for God's creation. I stumbled across a great group: Citizens' Climate Lobby (CCL), a non-profit, non-partisan, grassroots advocacy organization focused on national policies to address climate change. CCL is an international organization with about 180,000 members organized into local chapters. There are more than 600 chapters in the U.S.

CCL empowers everyday people to work together on climate change solutions. The work includes building support in Congress for a national, bipartisan solution to climate change. In order to generate the political will necessary for passage of supporting legislation, CCL trains and supports volunteers to build relationships with elected officials, the media, and their local community.

And that is where Trinity fits.

Among the bills coming forward in Congress that include an economy-wide price on carbon, the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act is the primary legislation supported by CCL. The Act charges an increasing fee on carbon producers and returns the money as a dividend to the American people to manage any additional costs they may incur. Such a strong, economy-wide price on carbon could reduce America's carbon pollution 50% by 2030, putting us on track to reach net zero by 2050.

CCL provides the opportunity for organizations to support the Act by adding their names to an online list of endorsers. About a year ago, Mother Angie agreed to add Trinity to the list! We joined Episcopal brothers and sisters from Louisiana, Florida and Kentucky.

The Act has been reintroduced into the 117th Congress as HR 2307 and I look forward to Trinity endorsing anew.

- * Make all with whom you come in contact with feel heard and loved



Outreach Ministries

Trinity helps carry out God's work in the world and meet the needs of the local community through feeding and diaper programs and other outreach efforts. We have operated as a Jubilee Ministry Center, designated by the Episcopal Church for our support of the poor and oppressed, since 2015.

Trinity's feeding ministries were blessed with a \$6,800 grant from the Network Investment Initiative, a program of the Community Food Bank of New Jersey, Mercer Street Friends and Norwescap. The initiative was designed to help food pantries and soup kitchens across the state serve more people in need during the Covid-19 pandemic and beyond.

The grant was used to install new windows on the first floor of St. Martha's House, where the Food Pantry operates. The windows were custom made by Window World because St. Martha's, built in 1874 and listed on the state and national registers of historic places, doesn't have standard sizes.

Grant money was also used to obtain new storage shelves for St. Martha's and to buy more diapers for our Diaper Bank, among other necessities.







Volunteers help our Sextons, Joe and Mary Kovacs, move newly purchased diapers into a storage shed for our outreach ministries. Trinity was able to use proceeds from the grant to rebuild inventory at the Diaper Bank, which had been depleted during the pandemic.

Representatives of Sheet Metal Workers Local 27 joined us at St. Martha's House to help with the Food Pantry. Trinity appreciates all the support that our feeding ministries receive from the local community. Without its help, we would be unable to carry out our missing of serving others.





Food Pantry clients are now receiving laundry supplies that the grant enabled us to purchase. This represents an extra effort to assist families in need. We are grateful for the financial resources that allowed us to provide this additional support.



Volunteer Opportunity

Your Food Pantry ministry is in need of several volunteers to enable us to efficiently service and fulfill a most important role in our community. The number of people in need of our support is ever increasing.



Volunteers will pack and distribute food baskets. They will be able to experience the gratifying satisfaction and pride that helping other brings.

The pantry is traditionally open on the 1st Saturday of each month from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Thursdays from 10 a.m to 11 a.m. Currently, the pantry is operating every Thursday and Saturday.
