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Warden's Words

"Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day." (2 Peter 3:8)

This Bible verse is a reference to God's time, which is vastly different from the time that you and I know. It's especially relevant for us here at Trinity because events aren't unfolding as quickly as we might have expected.

The selection of a new priest-in-charge is one of those events. Our 2022 budget was based on an assumption that we would hire someone by midyear. It didn't work out that way. We're just getting to the point where our Discernment Committee will receive the names of candidates to lead Trinity and St. James, Edison.

We just went through the entire month of September without having a supply priest for Holy Communion. The priests lined up for the first two Sundays weren't available, and we couldn't even schedule one for other services. So we fell back on lay-led Morning Prayer, as we have done in the past.

Unfortunately, we'll have to go without Communion again on some Sundays in the next few months. There just aren't many supply priests to be had these days.

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Timeliness is also an issue with our facilities, specifically St. Martha's House. Early this year, we discovered that a leaky pipe was causing the floor to warp in our first-floor meeting room. The leak also resulted in mold, which was especially concerning because the supplies for our Food Pantry were stored in the house.

Since then, we have run into one issue after another in seeking to resolve the matter. The first is that the pipe had asbestos insulation, which posed a health hazard. We had to hire a specialized contractor to do remediation in the house. And we had to file a claim with our insurance company to cover the cost.

At the same time, we had to ensure that our pantry and other feeding ministries could continue to serve the people who needed them. That meant moving food items out of St. Martha's and into the Parish House, which was done over the summer.

We had hoped to be back in St. Martha's by now, and for a couple of reasons. First, it would have allowed the pantry to go back to normal operations. Second, it would have enabled us to do some much-needed maintenance work on the Parish House floor. This has to be done before we can start using the hall for fundraisers and rentals, as we did before the Covid-19 pandemic.

That hasn't happened either. The St. Martha's remediation is still playing out. Additional work needs to be done, and that means having to file for more money from our insurer. As a result, the pantry items are staying in the Parish House and the floor maintenance is on hold.

Yet in the midst of all this, we're still finding ways to carry out God's work. We're gathering in church on Sundays and also online, regardless of whether the service is Communion or Morning Prayer. When lay leaders run the services, we're able to appreciate their gifts.

The pantry and other feeding ministries are carrying on too. Visit the Parish House at the beginning of a week, as I have done, and you'll see the "Monday morning packers" hard at work. They prepare dozens of bags of food that will be distributed later in the week.

The Discernment Committee is busy as well. Preparations are being made to interview candidates as soon as they become available. Questions have been drafted, reviewed and edited jointly with St James's committee.

What's next? The answer is up to all of us. Pray that those working on our behalf will be able to move forward. Pray that priests will see Trinity and St. James as worth leading and want to serve us both as priest-in-charge. Most of all, pray that we may show the patience and understanding that comes with being on God's time.

JUBILEE

Community Ministry

Trinity helps carry out God's work in the world and meet the needs of the local community through feeding and diaper programs and other efforts. We have operated since 2015 as a Jubilee Ministry Center, designated by the Episcopal Church for our support of the poor and oppressed.

For many years, Trinity's participation in the local Family Promise network was a key component of our community ministry. We housed homeless families for a week at a time in the Parish House as part of a regional rotation managed by the Fish Hospitality Program, based in Piscataway.

The rotation ended when the Covid-19 pandemic arrived. Starting in March 2020, Fish Hospitality arranged for families to stay in hotels. The change was in keeping with an earlier shift by the national Family Promise organization, which had moved away from local networks.


Fish Hospitality decided in July to close at year-end. Details about the decision were included in a letter that's reproduced on the next two pages. While we're sorry to see this happen, we're grateful to have had the opportunity to help the organization and Family Promise carry out its mission.



Otherwise, our feeding ministries are carrying on their mission of helping people meet their needs. In August, we served 275 people in 85 families even though our Friday lunch program was shut down for the month.

We have moved to having two food distributions on Thursdays, one in the morning and the other in late afternoon. This scheduling change is designed to help us reach as many people as possible and address the growing issue of food insecurity, especially at a time when food-price inflation is accelerationg.

We are continuing to store food in the Parish House as remediation work on St. Martha's House continues. We are confident that the project will be successful and look forward to the day when we can relocate back into St. Martha's, our longtime home.

Dear FISH Hospitality Partners,

In this our 32nd year, FISH Hospitality Program has witnessed enormous global changes that have impacted the ways in which we assist our guests. Beginning in March 2020, with the onset of COVID-19, we shifted from our church rotation model and began housing families in local motels. Thinking that this change would be temporary, we continued to believe that returning to our previous rotational shelter model was just around the corner. Two years later we are still housing families in motels. These and other factors outlined below have led us to make the difficult and heartbreaking decision to close FISH Hospitality Program.

Recently our host church coordinators came together to discuss whether and how to resume our shelter program. Only two (2) of our churches said that they would be able to host soon; others felt that Fall was a possibility but were not sure. And three (3) of our host churches will no longer be able to host our guests. It is difficult to be sure in such an unsure world. Prior to the pandemic many of our churches struggled to provide volunteers, especially for the overnight shifts. Now, COVID-19 has affected many of our stalwart volunteers (the majority of whom are senior citizens), both physically and emotionally; the same people who would normally be ready, willing, and able to help host are now unable to do so. The pandemic has also caused churches to re-think their spaces. Is air quality what it should be? With only dividers, how are guests and volunteers protected from other sick guests? How do we mandate vaccines for our volunteers and our guests? Is congregate living the best and safest way to help our guests?

Several years ago, Family Promise, a national program for assisting homeless people, determined that their rotational shelter model was no longer sustainable. They have been utilizing a variety of different models across the country, including diversion. Union County Family Promise is renting short-term apartments for their clients. It is a massive undertaking, but they have resources and staff who can coordinate the logistical issues presented by renting temporary apartments.

Middlesex County has initiated a diversion program. Rather than refer people into a shelter system, the program is designed to keep people in their present housing, and to assist them with case work, apartment referrals and financial assistance. The program is successful, resulting in far

fewer potential families on the Middlesex County list each month. While we rejoice in the success of the Middlesex County program, the result is that there are far fewer people and families that meet the criteria for admission into our FISH program.

Norma Elliott and Anita Hoynes founded FISH in February 1990 to assist our homeless population. While most non-profits last, on average, for ten (10) years, FISH has existed for 32 years to help our homeless neighbors. Based on all of the above factors, however, the FISH Board of Directors has concluded that continuing our program is untenable. This decision did not come easily; we worry about what this closure will mean to the families whom we serve, as well as our church partners, our funders, our staff – indeed, all of you who have been supporting our efforts to help provide safe shelter for area families for many years. In the coming months, we will continue to do as much as we can to assist our families who are staying in motels. Our projected closure date is December 31, 2022.

To our coordinators and volunteers: we know that our FISH families whom you encountered and helped will remain in your prayers. Your kindness and willingness to connect with those families in their time of great need will live on in their hearts as well.

To our funders: we say thank you for believing in our mission and supporting it with your donations. FHP has always been very conscientious with the monies entrusted to us, helping our families as much as possible while operating with incredibly low overhead.

To the ministerial staff, administrators and maintenance staff at our churches: we give thanks for your willingness to give up church space a few weeks each year, enabling families to feel safe and secure on your campus. The challenges of having FISH Hospitality at your church were always resolved, thanks to your efforts.

As we prepare for our closure, we ask that you cease any recurring donations that you may have set up with your banking institutions. Coordinators, we no longer need meals nor gift cards for our remaining guests. Any remaining assets will be used to support the families who we are sheltering in addition to paying our debts and liabilities. We are required by law to distribute any other remaining assets to another non-profit 501(c)(3) organization under the direction of our attorney.


