The American Academy of Pediatrics, California Chapter 3 (AAP-CA3) and the Social Policy Institute (SPI) at San Diego State University have partnered to develop local **Networks of Care** – providing opportunities for pediatric providers, community-based organizations, and other stakeholders, to come together to lay a foundation for mutual understanding and trust, and build effective working relationships.

San Diego's Network of Care, through a series of engagements, will:

- Facilitate pediatric practices to meet community-based providers and hear about their approaches to providing support for children and families.
- Ensure pediatric providers understand how community organizations build protective factors and alleviate challenges created by adverse childhood experiences (ACEs).
- Support community organizations in understanding the challenges and needs pediatric providers encounter in their work with families.
- Establish referral pathways for children and families who are screened for ACEs during a well-child visit.
