

IDA

Ida, receiving a 2015 Academy Award for the best foreign language film, is directed by Polish born British filmmaker, Pawel Pawlikowski. Set in 1962 Communist Poland, it follows a young girl who is about to take her vows as a Catholic nun. Orphaned as an infant during the German occupation, she meets her only surviving relative, a smoking, drinking, well-connected Party insider, a local judge, and here Ida learns her story.



The film explores the death of an old era in Europe and the beginning of a new one yet avoids being an ideological tract.

Based on actual events, this film takes place in a Jewish community in Mexico City. A young Mizrahi woman, a bit of



a cultural rebel who paints original wall murals and whose people arrived in Mexico in the early 20th century from Syria, escaping persecution, racism, and civil war. Leona struggles to come into her own as she is torn between her family and a non-Jewish man, and risks leaving behind her Jewish religion and traditions.

This is a personal journey of self-discovery in which Leona makes her own mistakes, discovers her own truths, and transitions into the woman she is meant to be.

A 2019 biographical drama, written and directed by Jonathan Jakubowicz, a Venezuelan filmmaker of Polish-Jewish descent. Inspired by the life of Marcel Marceau, originally Marcel Mangel, an aspiring Jewish actor, the 20th century's only universally beloved mime, who began working in the French Resistance as a young teen and helped save the lives of thousands of children orphaned at the hands of the Nazis.

The tremendous agony they have suffered has left a rage fuming within both of them and manifests itself in their harsh words. The film takes an intimate view of friendship to attempt to understand what links two individuals.


Arabs over one hundred and fifty years of history.
