Executive Summary

2018 was a very successful year for Hunterdon County Library. The Library checked out over one million items, added over twenty seven thousand items to our collections, welcomed over half a million visits, and over eighteen thousand people attended our programs.

2018 was also the year of movement at Hunterdon County Library. At the Headquarters Library a major project reunited the entire non-fiction collection on the same floor. We also created a more easily browsed New Book and Magazine area which has resulted in an increased number of checkouts.


Perhaps the biggest move of 2018, was the move of the South County Branch to East Amwell after six years in West Amwell. With the financial support of the Friends of Hunterdon County Library (FOHCL) and the support of the Hunterdon County Freeholders, East Amwell Officials and the library staff the South County Branch opened up at the new location in October 2018. Branch utilization and item checkouts have increased considerably since the move.

The library also successfully rolled out a new online meeting room/program registration service, implemented mobile printing and scanning options, expanded the book hold limit to one hundred, and worked with County IT to improve the wifi coverage at the libraries.

We would like to thank all the people who support the library, particularly the Hunterdon County Freedholders, the Friends of Hunterdon County Library (FOHCL), private donors, the library staff, and the Hunterdon County Library Commission.

We are looking forward to an exciting 2019 including strategic planning, opening North County Branch on Sundays, and much more.

Extension Services & Outreach

Highlights:

- The Hunterdon County Library Bookmobile travelled to the Somerset Patriots TD Bank Ballpark on Saturday, April 21, from 9 am – 12 noon, as part of Healthy Kids Day ® Swing for the Fences, co-sponsored by the Hunterdon County and Somerset County YMCAs.
- The library once again participated in Hunterdon County Community Day on Saturday, June 2, 2018.



The Hunterdon County Library Bookmobile was on hand for tours, while the Friends of the Hunterdon County Library (FOHCL) promoted membership in their group and ran a "fish" pond filled with books for younger children to win.

- In April, the library re-started our National Library Week promotional efforts with great success. Each branch library had an information table in the lobby, a board where patrons could post what they love about the library, and gift baskets (one for adults, one for youth at each location), donated by the FOHCL, to raffle off. In Youth Services, families created a number of library-themed crafts to express their love of libraries.
- A youth services librarian attended Career Day at North Hunterdon High School to represent librarians in a county library. The Library promoted the digital services offered by HCL and distributed over 50 YA books to students.



- The Hunterdon County Library Bookmobile was there to help community students when two of the grammar schools in the Flemington-Raritan School District (Barley Sheaf and Robert Hunter) were closed at the beginning of the school year due to a mold issue. The bookmobile visited each school, almost weekly from September till mid-November. Students, grades K-4, came through the bookmobile and checked out a variety of books on different topics. The school libraries have reopened and are back in business, and their staff have expressed sincere thanks for our assistance during their crisis.

Literacy @ HCL

Highlights:

- This year's Summer Reading Club, which ran from late June to early September, was another success. Countywide, 616 children ages 2 and up read a total of 19,460 titles! The YS Department held 109 programs which were attended by 3,506 – an average of 32 attendees per program. Programs included storytimes, magicians, musicians, animals, and hands-on science themes.
- The Adult Summer Reading Club had 164 members, who collectively read 1,617 books. They hailed from nine libraries and the Bookmobile, and included 68 brand-new members as well as 21 charter members who have participated every year since the first club in 2007. 85 members reached the goals they had set for themselves. 42 eager readers attended the Adult Summer Reading Party. Inspired by the national summer reading theme "Libraries Rock", the library ran an Escape Room program which placed attendees backstage at a rock concert, dividing them into Stage Crews for 8 different rock groups. Each Crew had a unique color, and members followed clues found only on their Crew's colors, all over the library, to discover which rock group they represented. The first crew who found their group's CD started the concert.
- The Paws to Read Program continues to allow children to read to therapy dogs in the library. Reading to a dog is often more comfortable for children than reading to adults or their peers. This popular program is held on Wednesday afternoons at the Headquarters Library and Saturday mornings at the South County Branch.
- The Fall Reading Buddy program started at North County Branch Youth Services in September. Thirty children read together once a week. After reading, they play a literacy-based game or make a craft related to their favorite book or character. This program pairs children in grades 1-4 with children in middle school or high school.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Math)

Highlights:

- NJ Makers Day 2018 at South County on March 10th was a major success. Nearly 100 people attended, over the course of six hours, enjoying demonstrations and hands-on activities. Patrons were able to use LittleBits circuits to blow giant bubbles, create a button with our button maker, try out hand tools to build a wooden coaster, create string art, and make a no-sew pouch.
- NJ Makers Day was held at the North County Branch on March 24th. The event was a fun day of exploring for the 600+ people who attended. The activities and demonstrations included weaving, sewing, spinning, origami, slime making, beading, virtual reality computer programming, circuitry, LED flower making, button making, recycled crafting, HAM radio, paper airplanes, Mazebots, pulleys & knotting, FTC robotics, motorized models, 3D printing nametags, and 3D printed bubble wands. Fourteen exhibitors/clubs, totaling over 50 people, joined staff to provide a variety of activities that kids found hard to leave.



A Selection of HCL STEM Programs:

- Pearl Observatory came to Headquarters in April for the "Little Al the Allosaur" dinosaur program. Kids were a paleontologist for a day, learned about dinosaurs, and reassembled the bones of a large allosaur.
- Mad Science presented "The Science of Magic" to a group of 25 Tweens who learned the secrets of making water disappear, how a toy bunny disappears in a seemingly empty box, and many other magician's secrets.
- An Intermediate Micro:Bit class taught participants how to build a mini water pump using a Micro:Bit, servo motor and straw. Kids learned how to code the Micro:Bit so it could detect when soil was too dry and automatically water a plant.
- The North County Branch library participated in the national Hour of Code, Saturday Dec. 9th. Library patrons passing by watched on the large screen as participants animated their name using Scratch. The kids coding were complimented on their skill by many patrons.



Friends of the Hunterdon County Library (FOHCL)

The Friends is an all-volunteer organization dedicated to supporting the library system and providing enriching services to the community.

Here are highlights from the Friends' productive and busy year.

- In October, the Friends made a \$25,000 grant to partially fund the move of the South County Branch Library to Ringoes and to purchase new carpeting for that location. The attractive, cheerful carpet is a welcome addition to the library's new facility.
- The FOHCL Board arranged a one-time, in-kind donation of 177 chairs from Ericsson Company. The chairs were for patrons and staff use.
- The Friends continued their ongoing funding of popular programs such as the movie series, Summer Concert Series, NJ Maker's Day, Library's annual Outdoor Art Show, and much more.
- The "Books for the College Bound Scholarship" awarded five county graduating high school seniors a scholarship grant for college textbooks.
- Friends volunteers delivered library materials, including books and media to County residents who were unable to visit the library. The "Outreach Program for the Homebound" served approximately 25 patrons.
- Last year saw the expansion of several library programs. The Friends increased funding for the Library's e-book collection to reduce the wait list. They also added two new museums to their Museum Pass Program: the Morven Museum & Garden (Princeton) and Eastern State Penitentiary, an historical site (Philadelphia). Lastly, the Friends increased their grants to the County's seven affiliated libraries to \$1,000 each.
- The Friends supported new library initiatives, including the funding start-up activities for a new Youth Services enrichment program, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics).

The Friends' valuable contributions are made possible through fundraising, membership dues, and countless hours from our dedicated volunteers. The annual FOHCL Used Book Sale, the major fundraiser, 2018 proceeds totaled over \$49,000. The Friends latest fundraiser, a Tricky Tray Basket Raffle continues to grow in popularity. The event was held in October and raised \$7,000.

Sadly, this year saw the passing of J. William Newitt on September 5. Bill was a founding member of the Friends, longtime leader, book sale volunteer, and member of the Library Commission. Bill's family requested that donations be given to FOHCL. Jean Allured, Library Commission Chair and former Friends Board member, collaborated with the family to honor Bill's contributions with a memorial to be installed at Headquarters in 2019.

South County Branch Returns to East Amwell



On October 20th, the South County Branch of the Hunterdon County Library hosted a grand opening at its new location at 1108 Old York Road, in downtown Ringoes. The grand opening represents a return to East Amwell after a 2012 move.

East Amwell Mayor, Tim Mathews, told the Grand Opening crowd, "Our Community needs, craves and deserves a safe, quiet and curated place to investigate ideas, think critically, and dream.

This re-boot of the South County Library at Ringoes Village will provide just that – a quiet oasis to dream, explore ideas, and validate information. East Amwell appreciates the efforts of the Hunterdon County Freeholders, the Library Commission, and all those involved in bringing the Library back to our community."

East Amwell area residents joined Freeholder John King, Freeholder John Lanza, Freeholder Director Matthew Holt, East Amwell Mayor Tim Mathews, Library Director James Keehbler, President of the Friends of Hunterdon County Library Ann Marie Queeney, and Library Commission Chairwoman Jean Allured for the ribbon cutting.

Director James Keehbler talked about the reception the library has received from the community.



The new branch features wireless internet, new carpet, an expanded seating area, and library only parking on the Route 31 side of the building. The cost of the professional library movers and the new carpet were fully funded by the Friends of the Hunterdon County Library (FOHCL).


