

Hunterdon County Library Continues Offering Virtual Programs

The Hunterdon County Library has been offering virtual and contactless programs throughout the pandemic, bringing books, education support and creativity to residents, and eventually opening back up, allowing patrons computer access and a chance to socialize while following all safety protocols, Commissioner Zachary T. Rich reported at the January 19th Board of County Commissioners meeting.

Commissioner Rich, the Library Commissioner liaison said, "I can report that the Annual Hunterdon County Library Amateur Photography Show will be held virtually this year.

It is open to students ages 12-18, and adults, who are invited to submit their best photo for the Library's digital photo gallery by Thursday, February 18. There will be awards in ten different categories and photos submitted must be suitable for viewing by all ages."

Rich stated, "I again express this Board's appreciation to Library Director James Keehbler and the Library staff for developing ways for the community to continue to engage in library programming while observing social distancing during the pandemic.

They have applied great creativity and inventiveness to bringing virtual programming to both children and adults. The recent 10th Annual Gingerbread Competition which was held virtually and was highly successful is an example."

Library Director James Keehbler said, "There are program options for all levels of school-aged children, adults and seniors. Concerts, book clubs, movies, webinars covering a wide range of topics, and several online connections for greater access and learning have been expanded."

All branches of the Library are open with social distancing and face covering guidelines in place.
