Hello White Bluff, Barry here. I pray you and yours are doing well today!

I recently read an article about Acts 29 written by Monica Wilkinson, who is a Discipleship Pastor in Beaufort, SC. It is about something we all experience but few of us enjoy: change. Excerpting from her article, she says

"Here are four ways Jesus experienced transition during his earthly ministry, and how that provides comfort for us today.

Change of Heart

Jesus was masterful at this—he touched the untouchable, showed kindness to the lonely, and met their tears with compassion. Jesus never left a conversation without offering an invitation to receive forgiveness and to enjoy an eternal relationship with him. He sought to heal hearts, and we can do the same.

Change of Pace

Jesus recognized the need for prioritizing both public and private ministry. He never worried about slowing down and didn't live in a state of hurry. Many around him expected him to be a prominent leader, but his care for others was gentle and focused. Jesus's example of serving publicly and then pulling away for time alone with the Father should compel us to think about our own ministry. The world is fast-paced, but Jesus didn't let that affect his approach. What would it look like for us to do the same? We must prioritize time alone with our heavenly Father, just as Jesus did. Not everything has to be seen. A slower pace sets realistic expectations and allows us to truly see people where they are.

Change of Location

Churches changing locations is nothing new. Many churches now meet in renovated buildings that used to be something very different than a church or rent spaces from local schools or organizations. It's difficult to borrow physical space, knowing it isn't yours to permanently inhabit. But even with a permanent building, transition and change still occur because it's a normal part of life and ministry.

Jesus didn't stay in one place very long; he was constantly traveling. He slept in a new place many times, but he never let that mobility of ministry distract him from his purpose. Locations bring expectations and may carry a certain sense of status, but may we keep the perspective of Jesus in our minds as we steward what he's provided.

Change of Role

Jesus physically grew from an infant to a toddler, to a teenager, and eventually became a man with a ministry. He then invited men and women to learn from him because he knew the time would come for him to return to heaven. He was forming disciples who would eventually make more disciples. Just as Jesus grew, his disciples grew, too."

I pray you will view our current change at White Bluff as a stepping stone to an even brighter future. The church is not a building or a steeple, the church is the people. Certainly, there is much history here at 11911 White Bluff Road, and I know that makes this decision especially difficult for some. I remember the first house we left in Cairo. I cried all the way to the new house. The new house was great, but my first memories were from that Gray Road house. It took a little while, but in time, my new house was home. Most of us have worshipped in multiple houses of worship during our lifetimes. The possibilities for the future are many, and you will be able to look at every possibility and decide the best possible path for White Bluff, should we sell. My hope is to facilitate this process for you and remain with you. Erin, Maddux, Paxton, Lennox, and I have found a home here, and are grateful for each and every one of you.





Tom Johnson
Greenhills High School
Class of 1961



Tom Johnson was a standout basketball player at Greenhills high School from 1959-1961, earning three varsity letters under Coach Ralph Staub. A 3-year starter, Tom led the team in scoring, rebounding & field goal percentage during his senior season, earning MVP honors. He held the title of all-time leading scorer at Greenhills for the next 19 years.

Highly recruited by Division I programs, Tom chose to continue his basketball career at Miami University, 1961—1965, playing under Coach Dick Shrider. Following college, Tom entered the coaching profession, serving as head basketball coach at Cridersville High School before returning to the Cincinnati area to coach in the Wyoming School District, & eventually becoming the head varsity basketball coach in the mid-1970's.

Tom later pursued a career in officiating, beginning with high school football. After 5 years, he advanced to officiating in the Mid-American & Big Ten conferences. In 1982, he was selected to join the officiating ranks of the National Football League, where he served with distinction for 22 seasons. Tom's lifelong dedication to athletics, as a player, coach & official, exemplifies the spirit of excellence honored by the Winton Woods Athletic Hall of Fame.





Recap of Gardening Tips with
JoAnn Harita-Master Gardner

House plants help us bring nature inside. JoAnn highlighted four plants that purify the air. These plants are non toxic to animals and dogs. NASA study revealed the best air cleaning plants for your home.

1. Snake Plant-works best at night. It works to remove toxins and produce oxygen while you sleep. Helping you feel much more rested and ready to tackle the day.
2. Pothos-Plant to purify the room.
3. Spider Plant-Known for its ability to filter out common air pollutants and is also pet safe.
4. Areca Palm-Removes dust from the air.

Plants purify air through a process called phytoremediation where they absorb pollutants through their leaves and roots. They release oxygen through photosynthesis which can improve air quality.

Indoor plants enhance mood, reduce stress and increase humidity which can contribute to healthier indoor environment.

Week 2: What Wind?


- Bible Story: Mark 4:35-41 (Jesus Calms the Storm) Key Bible Verse: Mark 4:39

HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS TIPS FOR OLDER ADULTS

Hurricane season is June 1st thru November 30th.

A hurricane can develop at anytime during this time. Are you prepared if a storm is formed. Make an emergency plan. Create a chain of contacts. Ask family, friends, and neighbors. Plan how you will communicate with one another before, during and after a disaster.

Make Plans to stay safe. Think through these questions: Can I stay safely at home without power? If the power is out for an extended time or you don't have adequate air conditioning in a heat wave, consider evacuating to an appropriate location. Will I need electricity to operate medical equipment or keep medicine cold? If I need to evacuate-Where will I go? How will I get there? Where will I stay? What will I bring with me? How can I care for my pets? Are pets allowed where I am evacuating? Will I have the food and medication they need?

Plan to stay connected: Listen to the guidance from your local authorities. Have a battery-powered radio, and cell phone, chargers with a backup cell phone portable charger.

Gather Emergency Supplies: Gather food, water, and medicine. Organize supplies into a **Go-Kit** and a **Stay-at-home kit**. **Go-kit:** At least three (3) days of essential supplies if you need to leave in a hurry. Gas up your car if you will be driving. Have cash on hand. You may need non perishable foods and water depending where you are going. Include backup batteries and chargers for (cell phones, CPAP, Wheelchair, etc.) Three days of clothing and sturdy shoes. Talk to your doctor or pharmacist to make sure you have enough medications. Make sure you have your prescription eyewear and cane, also include pet medications and supplies. Lock up your home and leave.

Stay-At-Home-Kit: at least two (2) weeks supplies. Include basic such as non perishable foods and water, first aid kit, flashlights, sturdy shoes. Make sure you have enough medications. The stores and pharmacies may be closed. Stay away from windows, skylights, and glass doors. Bring your pets inside.

Prepare and Protect Key Documents: Keep personal, financial, and medical records safe and easy to access. Keep an up to date list of medical information: conditions, allergies, medications, instructions and dosages, prescription records, doctors phone numbers, health insurance cards, homeowners insurance account and phone numbers. Include a similar list for your pets or service dogs. Locate and keep copies of important documents including household identification (such as ID, social security card, driver's license, marriage license), financial and legal (deeds, loans, credit cards, banking, wills, property insurance) and a list of individual or companies that normally make repairs for you. Consider keeping copies of paper documents in a waterproof box or safe, store electronically or with a trusted family member. Keep in mind, some of these are required for recovery financial assistance.


Take care of yourself. It's normal to be stressed or have anxiety after a disaster or other emergency. Eat healthy food and get enough sleep to help deal with the stress.

After a disaster, scam artists, identity thieves, and other criminals may try to take advantage of some people. Work with vetted, trusted sources, and safeguard your personal and financial information.
