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Tom Dowd offers a variety of professional development programs at the UMaine Hutchinson Center this fall

Belfast, Maine — Speaker, author, trainer and coach Tom Dowd is teaching a number of in-person and online professional development programs at the Hutchinson Center in Belfast this fall, including Career Transformation, Public Speaking, Virtual Presentation Skills and Time Management. Dowd's in-person programs include [Career Transformation](#) on Friday, Sept. 23 from 8:30 a.m.–noon ET and [Public Speaking](#) on Friday, Oct. 14 from 8:30 a.m.–3 p.m. ET.

Career Transformation is designed to benefit people who are hoping to improve their career prospects or make a shift, including people who are midcareer, unemployed or just starting their careers. This program will teach participants how to leverage networks, resumes and interview skills to advance their careers and increase their job satisfaction.

“With the ‘Great Resignation’ upon us,” Dowd says, “there has rarely been a better opportunity to reach for your dream job than now. Much of the power is with the prospective employee in today’s career environment.”

Dowd's Public Speaking program has been held at the Hutchinson Center for five years. This time-tested program provides support and training to help improve public speaking skills through reflection, interactive activities, discussion and practice.

Online programs include [Virtual Presentation Skills](#) and [Time Management](#). These short sessions are designed to provide valuable information and build skills in a compressed amount of time. Virtual Presentation Skills is offered Friday, Oct. 21 from noon–1 p.m. and Time Management is offered Friday, Oct. 28 from noon–1 p.m. ET.

Though many professionals have been called back to their offices, the need for virtual presentation skills hasn't diminished. Virtual Presentation Skills will teach participants how

to maximize their video and audio presence, minimize derailers and distractions and command the virtual stage, helping to combat Zoom fatigue.

In Dowd's Time Management program, participants will learn how to better manage and organize their time to increase productivity and improve work/life balance.

Dowd has a communications degree from the University of Delaware. He is a prize-winning speaker, and an award-winning and Amazon best-selling author, trainer and coach. As a member of Toastmasters International, Dowd exhibits consistent success in speech competitions and achieved the Distinguished Toastmaster status in 2015.
