student, a natural leader and determined to succeed. She graduated early from high school and is now a college student and a single mom with three young children. She is pursuing a B. A. degree in Social Work so she can make a difference in the lives of foster kids. She will continue on for a master's degree.

Tyra has endured traumas as a young woman but has maintained her open and loving outlook toward those around her. Tyra is determined to be the best mom possible and an example for her children of resilience and positivity.





Stephanie is a survivor in the truest sense. She is the mother of a three-year-old son who was eight months old when she was able to escape an abusive relationship. She and her son spent time in and out of homeless shelters and transitional housing but she was determined to create a stable situation. She understands that education is the path to her dreams, and is resolute in her quest for a Bachelors degree in Environmental Sciences. Stephanie has a passion for making a difference in environmental sustainability, addressing environmental challenges and finding practical solutions for a healthier planet. She has an AA in Natural Resources and is continuing her

SIGS Olive Oil

Good job Paula and her sales people! She reports that we sold 140 bottles plus one gallon size (Susan reports we made \$2,796!). Twenty-six bottles were sold last October at Bliss Marketplace Faire, 15 bottles at the It's In The Bag event, the rest to members and friends. She still has lots of EVOO in these flavors: Plain, Garlic, Lemon, Jalapeño and Basil. Call me whenever you are in need and enjoy your summer with lots of fresh tomato Caprese Salad, or Pasta Pesto and Peas! Yummy!

And, with all the basil available at farmers' markets or in your garden, here's a good and easy recipe via Ina Garten for our olive oil.

Homemade Pesto

1/4 Cup Walnuts, 1/4 Cup Pine Nuts, 9 cloves Garlic (chopped), 5 Cups fresh Basil Leaves (packed), 1 tsp.Kosher Salt, 1 tsp. fresh Ground Pepper, 1 1/2 cups good EVOO and 1 Cup freshly grated Parmesan.

Place the walnuts, pine nuts and garlic in bowl of a food processor fitted with a steel blade. Process for 30 seconds. Add the basil leaves, salt and pepper. With the professor running, slowly pour the olive oil into the bowl through the feed tube and process until the pesto is finely pureed. Add the Parmesan and puree for a minute. Serve, or store the pesto in the refrigerator or freezer with a thin film of olive oil on top.

Sierra Nevada Region Conference

Our club is part of the SNR region, which covers much of Northern California and Nevada. I attended a day of the 48th Annual SNR Conference at the Atlantis Hotel/Casino, Reno. (For a conference, this can be an enjoyable location....especially if you are a gambler - which I am not - although I used to have fun sneaking a coin in on the craps table when I was near one!! Also it is also entertaining if you are a people watcher!!)

I would REALLY encourage you to attend this conference next June as it is filled with valuable information about Soroptimist but also filled with fun, interesting women who want to meet and greet, and improve their knowledge about what is Soroptimist and how can they be more effective member.

The theme of this year's conference was "Making Dreams Soar," and ran from Friday to Sunday. There were approximately 200 women attending. There also is a "Marketplace" in the foyer set up for clubs to vend their products as a fundraiser. Products such as jewelry, glassware, hats, quilts, beauty products, etc. But, no Olive Oil..... we might have done well with ours!!

I was not able to attend on Friday, but there were breakout sessions designed to inspire clubs to take meaningful action in their human trafficking outreach efforts by "equiping you with tools, inspiration and network of support to turn awareness into action," as well as a session on "Creating an Effective Club Website." In the evening, SNR's Governor Stacey Jensen and other leaders were introduced, and there was a Pajama Party "Movie Night."

I attended the all day conference Saturday....from 8 AM to 9 PM with breaks in between sessions. We were in a large conference room with tables of 8. The day went quickly, filled with speakers of all things Soroptimist. Topics of the day:

- A discussion/information about the importance of having a club ABC license.
- Combating the Great Membership Decline, speaker Holly Nash "Klub Kindness Kounts"....Keep Klubs Kind. Some of the audience suggestions on building membership: Be positive; Track your expenditures and show how we are involved with helping women and children; go to bars be sociable, get friendly people who are always talking; don't be resistant to change young people are open. One club gets members after a Wine Tasting! Set a goal of how many new members you want by the end of the year. Partner with local businesses. And, the Truckee club banned the word "retired!"
- Awards: Blanche Edgar Award, SOLT Award, Stop Trafficking award,
- Voted to amend the bylaws to combine the Soroptimist Development Retreat (SDR) with the Annual Conference. Amendment passed. This will reduce costs (facility and travel) and increase attendance.

Our dinner speaker was Jenna McKaye, Author of Grit and Grace - A Journey of Resilience, her story as a survivor of Human Trafficking. Jenna founded the Jenna McKaye Foundation to aid trafficked victims. (Grit and Grace was the June read for SIGS Book Club).

Sunday's programs included the Celebration of Life, and Live Your Dream awards.

A final note: it would have been lots of fun to have several of us together at the conference, so let's plan on more of us going! You won't regret it!

SIGS Committees

(from the Bylaws approved April 2025).

Service: make recommendations and coordinate members' involvement in service projects, including receiving and summarizing applications for service awards and grants (e.g. Live Your Dream and Dream Grants). Sservice may take the form of hands-on activities and/or recommendations for funding.

Ways and Means: make recommendations and coordinate members' involvement in one or more fundraising activities and to coordinate Superstars and fine programs.

Program: secure and publicize luncheon speakers; plan mixers and retreats, coordinate luncheon reservations; receive membership applications and orient new members, maintain the roster; and provide for club communications (e.g. newsletter, social media, public relations.)

The Club as a whole shall approve committee recommendations, including service projects, fundraisers and financial awards. The President may appoint a committee for technical functions of the club, such as Bylaws and Policy, and Finance.
