## **MINI-SERIES: TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE ACROSS THE NICU TO PEDIATRICS CONTINUUM**

This webinar mini-series explores trauma-informed care across the continuum from the neonatal intensive care unit to outpatient pediatric practice. Designed for neonatologists, pediatric clinicians, and interdisciplinary care teams, the series examines how medical complexity, prolonged hospitalization, and high-stakes decision making can be experienced as traumatic stress for infants, caregivers, and clinicians alike. [Drs Samantha Kucaj, Psy.D.](#) and [Dena Hubbard, MD](#), will address the impact of NICU experiences on early relational health, caregiver confidence, and long-term child development, while highlighting practical, relationship-based strategies that can be integrated during hospitalization, at discharge, and in follow-up care. The series also centers clinician well-being by exploring secondary traumatic stress, moral injury, and organizational contributors to burnout, offering trauma-informed approaches to support healthcare teams.
