



Preventing Child Heat Stroke Deaths in Vehicles

Due to the increase in temperatures, it is extremely important for parents and caregivers of young children to recognize that leaving children unattended in a parked car, even for short periods, can cause heat strokes that can often be fatal.

Heatstroke is the leading cause of non-crash, vehicle related deaths for children under the age of 14. There was a total of 793 child heat stroke deaths from 1990 – 2016. There has already been 12 child heat stroke deaths for 2017.

According to Kars for Kids, parents of every class and every background forget their babies in their cars. Even great parents can forget a child in the back seat. Other risk factors include caregivers who are not used to driving kids or whose routine suddenly changes. Whether you are a parent, child care provider or bystander of a child left in a car, it is vitally important to understand children are more vulnerable to heatstroke than adults.

Vehicles heat up very quickly, and that heat can be fatal to young children. Children are at a higher risk than adults of dying from heat stroke in a vehicle because their bodies heat up three to five times faster than adults. It only takes ten minutes for a car to reach deadly temperatures on an 80-degree day. Leaving car windows open does not slow the heating process or decrease the maximum temperature.
